

8 accidents on Thursday

Cantonites slip and slide on slick streets

Thursday was not the day to be driving in Canton.

At least seven accidents happened between 10 a.m. and 5:30 p.m., with most of them the result of rain-slicked roadways. Another accident at 9:15 p.m. sent a Livonia man to the hospital.

Six of the accidents were rear-end collisions.

"That's very typical of the first day of a rain after a long period of dry roads," said Lt. Larry Stewart, of the Canton Police Department. Automobile oil and transmission fluid spilled on the roads, mixed with the rain makes driving conditions extremely slippery, Stewart said.

"The first rain you get turns roads into ice ponds," he said. "I

noticed it in my police car."

Stewart advised drivers to allow three times the space cushion between the car in front of them during rainy conditions.

In all, eight drivers were cited for failure to stop a clear distance from the car in front of them. Four of the mishaps were three-car accidents.

One of those three vehicle accidents involved a Plymouth-Canton Schools bus, which was stopped in traffic to turn left onto Plum Hollow from Canton Center Road. A car rear-ended another car stopped behind the bus, which was then forced into the back of the bus. There were no injuries in the accident.

Canton police, fire mill increases proposed

Millage increases for police and fire protection levies in Canton were to have been discussed at a special meeting of the Board of Trustees last night.

The police millage was 3.33 last year, and the proposed rate for this year is

3.65.

The fire protection millage was 1.56 last year, while the proposed millage rate is 1.75 for this year.

Including millage for the general fund, last year's millage rate was set at

9.89, with a proposed 10.4 millage rate for this year.

The board was also to have discussed the township budget last night in detail, and look for ways to trim in certain departments, according to officials.

Landfills up trash rates in P-C

Taking out the trash has never been anyone's favorite task.

In the future, residents in The Plymouth-Canton Community will probably grow to like this necessary evil even less, with escalating costs for garbage collection beginning to hit the area.

Last month, area landfills reportedly doubled rates for garbage haulers, which in turn will cost the three local municipalities more money and somewhere down the road this increase will likely be passed on to individual homeowners.

The first rate increase was asked of Plymouth and Canton Townships last week, with similar increase requests likely to go before the City of Plymouth in the near future.

David Denski, owner of Canton Recycling, told the Plymouth Township Board that the three landfills in this area have all raised rates for refuse in "astronomical" amounts in the last month.

"We are literally losing hundreds of dollars a day," Denski told the board.

Denski collects trash in residential areas in both Canton and Plymouth Township and has asked both boards

On Moore sheep farm site

Jabara condos near groundbreaking

If everything goes as planned, Jim Jabara could break ground on his new condominium project in the next month and have the foundations set by winter.

The developer said Monday that the final site plan specifications and modifications have been sent to the Department of Natural Resources for final approval, and that work could begin on the project very soon, although a specific date was unavailable.

The DNR made recommendations that there be ground elevation changes made in the original site plan, Jabara said.

Jabara plans to build 36 condominiums behind the Farmer Jack store in Plymouth, on a spot that used to be Clarence Moore's sheep farm.

Jabara, who now sits on the city council, said that none of the apartments have been pre-sold, but he has a "list of very interested parties" who would likely purchase once final site approval has been granted.

"We hope to break ground soon, and have all of the underground work done by the time cold weather hits," Jabara said. "And by the middle of next summer the project should be near complete."

The developer also said that he sees the project as a positive addition to Plymouth.

"These are going to be very nice additions to the town. They will be three stories, instead of the usual townhouse type -- something a little different," he said.

Tallest pole hits Plymouth

It was an argument that had been run up the flagpole once too often.

Today, almost three years to the day after the struggle over a 70-foot flagpole began, the owners of Jerry's Bicycles and officials at Plymouth Township have reached a settlement.

The township and Jerry Loiselle agreed on a flagpole that will peak at 52 feet in the air, after more than seven hours of debating behind Judge Michael Conner's closed doors last week.

Loiselle wanted a pole that would have topped out at 70 feet -- while the township was drawing the line at 35 feet, claiming the pole was classified under its 'structure ordinance.'

Loiselle declined comment on the case, but let his lawyer John Vos do the talking.

Maurie Breen, Supervisor of Plymouth Township said the agreement would sit with the township.

"We would have liked 45 feet better, but we believe the settlement will not apply to everyone in the township, and is a special case," Breen said.

The settlement saved the case from going to a trial hearing, which was scheduled for December in Wayne County Circuit Court.

The first hearing in the case took place before Judge Conner back in June, when the judge called the case "ridiculous and an abuse of the (judicial) system."

Last week's meeting with Conner was a successful attempt to settle the case without a trial.

With the close to the case, Loiselle ends up with the tallest flagpole in Plymouth, at 52 feet. The National Bank of Detroit at Sheldon and Territorial Roads sits at 51.8 feet, while the Hines Park Mercury dealership on Ann Arbor Road peaks at 51.6 feet.

With the distinction of the tallest legal flagpole assured, Loiselle might also take the most expensive pole in town.

With legal fees approaching \$13,000 according to Vos, and another \$8,000 for the pole and installation -- it appears a \$20,000 flagpole has found its way to Plymouth.

Kids report strangers

Police: No connection in incidents

Canton police are investigating two incidents last week involving strangers allegedly trying to pick up children near schools.

On Thursday, two seven-year-olds were walking to their bus stop at 8:45 a.m. in Windsor Park subdivision when they said they were approached by a man and a woman in a maroon, two-door hatchback with sparkly paint, according to police.

The man told one of the boys, "Your mother said to pick you up and take you to school," but the kids refused to get into the car and ran to their bus stop at Parkside and Irongate, according to reports.

The children said the man was between 16 and 19 years old with dark brown hair, and clean shaven face.

Another incident was reported to police on Friday, when two youngsters

say they were approached by a stranger after leaving Hulsing Elementary School.

The two kids said a young man in a red car told them their parents wanted them to get into his car. They walked away and the car drove off, according to reports.

"It's tough to tell if there's any

relationship," between the two reports, said Canton Police Lt. Larry Stewart. "Right now, it doesn't look like it."

Stewart said descriptions of any suspects were very sketchy, and in some cases, the stories given by the children conflicted.

Canton Bd.: This sewer deal isn't super

The Canton Board of Trustees voted unanimously to not participate in the North Huron/Rouge Valley Project, or "Supersewer," stating that Canton would have to bear an unfair proportion of the cost of the sewer project compared to other municipalities in the project.

Canton would be assessed almost 32 per cent of the total cost of the sewer project, while getting less than six per cent additional sewer capacity out of the project, according to the board's resolution.

Canton Supervisor James Poole said the state Department of Natural Resources, the state, Wayne County and the City of Detroit wanted a "blank check" from Canton on financial support of the project. Poole said if Canton agreed to pay into the system, residents' sewer rates could triple.

Canton and Plymouth townships are suing the DNR, state, county and Detroit, charging that delays in the sewer project have caused the

municipalities to lose federal funding for the project. The case will first be heard Dec. 8 in Wayne County Circuit Court in front of Judge Ada Kerwin.

Hotel planned for Canton

Canton may be home to a new hotel and conference center soon, according to Canton officials.

Developer Carlo Galuppi is in the process of buying 226 acres of property in Canton and Westland from Michitech Center, which now owns the parcel, east of I-275 and south of Ford Road.

"We're dealing with him as if he's the owner right now," said David Nicholson, of Plymouth, Canton director for community and economic development.

Nicholson said Galuppi plans a "comprehensive light-industrial, commercial/office project" for the property. Between 80 and 90 acres of the parcel are located in Canton with the remainder in Westland.

The property is bounded by Ford, Lotz, Cherry Hill and John Hix roads, but the most visible part of the property is the quarter-mile of Ford Road frontage about ¼-mile east of I-275 in Canton, Nicholson said.

DNR warns local co.

The Cap Development Company, of Plymouth, has been notified by the state Department of Natural Resources that it has violated state law by not obtaining a permit to alter wetlands area on a property being developed in Canton.

The DNR notified Cap Development that "filling, rerouting and grading has occurred in an emergent, scrub-shrub wetland and in a warm water stream,"

at Koppernick and Haggerty without a state permit.

The DNR warned in a letter that development on the property must stop, where it affects the wetland, or criminal prosecution could result.

Cap Development representatives will meet with DNR officials to resolve the issue, according to a DNR spokesman.

Hunter program set

The Canton Police Department and the Dept. of Natural Resources are presenting a Hunter Safety Program Sept. 21 and 28.

DNR regulations require persons between the ages of 12 and 16 to obtain hunter safety certification before they can get a hunting license. This program is offered to girls and boys 12 years old and up.

The classes will be offered on consecutive Sundays at the Canton Municipal Building, 1150 S. Canton Center Rd, in the meeting room. Both sessions will run from 8 a.m. to 2 p.m.

Students should bring a sack lunch and a pencil. Class size is limited to 100 students, and both sessions are mandatory in order to qualify for a license.

Landfill wants expansion; Canton Bd. wants appraisal

The Canton Board of Trustees voted unanimously to have a piece of property appraised where a solid waste landfill company wants to expand.

The board took the action to determine what the value of the property is before voting to recommend or not recommend expansion of the Sauk Hills Landfill, on the southwest corner of Michigan Avenue and Lilley Road.

Wayne Disposal -- Canton In-

corporated is proposing to expand its landfill to a 106-acre site at the southwest corner of Michigan Avenue and Lilley Road. The expanded landfill would accept solid waste, but hazardous waste would not be accepted at the site.

The expansion must be approved through Wayne County government, but a township government recommendation is required.

to revise contracts. Plymouth's contract was just signed in July, while Canton's was signed in 1979.

Both boards agreed that an increase was appropriate and asked their respective supervisors to meet with Denski and authorize increases which would make up for the landfill increases.

Although the City of Plymouth deals with a different collector, Midwest Sanitation, City Manager Henry Graper says the city will soon find itself in a similar position as the townships with increased costs.

Graper said Midwest has informed him that they too will ask for an increase in their contract.

At least in the first year, however, none of these increases will be passed on to local taxpayers. Both Plymouth and Canton Townships say they will be able to absorb the cost the first year, as will the City, Graper said.

In Plymouth Township, the collector has asked for an increase of 82 cents per residential stop per month. The current contract agrees to pay the hauler \$3.56 per stop, per month which is collected through taxes.

If passed the new contract would give the hauler \$4.48 per home, per month.

Residents in Plymouth Township

currently pay the township \$4 per month, with \$3.56 given Denski, along with a \$.44 stabilization fee which the township saves for large rate increases.

In Canton, residents now pay \$3.09 per month. The rate increase would mean paying \$3.95 per month.

The rate increases asked by the haulers is a direct result of the landfill increases, Denski said.

"They just dropped a bomb on us," Denski told the board. "We never expected anything like this, this was really uncalled for."

"Everyone seems to agree that the answer to this problem lies somewhere in alternative methods of disposal of trash -- but that method remains to be found.

"They have been looking for new ways, but Plymouth Township has been looking to the County for too long to find the answer, and I think it is time for the township to take a more active role in finding a solution," Breen said.

In Canton, Poole had preliminary discussions with the owners of a waste-energy plant company to talk about the possibility of having such a plant in Canton. Poole said Canton Recycling had always provided good service in the past, and that Canton's garbage collection rates would still be low compared to other communities.

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
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Why you

You're driving down Sheldon Road... just going "to pick up a few groceries."

WHAM!

Suddenly, not even in an intersection, you're in a three-car-accident where you actually have two separate collisions.

If you were not wearing your seat belt, you would have hit the windshield with the second impact — and you probably would be a part of the melted car once the gasoline exploded.

Dramatic fiction?

Not to the several witnesses who saw last Thursday night's accident on Sheldon just north of Ford Road.

Not to John Blackwell Jr. who was driving the car that now looks like a National Safety Council experiment reject. (You can't tell the front from the back of the car. They didn't haul it away, they swept it onto a truck. The initial thought from the Canton fireman who responded to the accident call and saw the burning car isn't printable.)

John didn't even mess up his shirt. (His trousers are his personal business.)

John, being vice president of Blackwell Ford car dealership, "always wore my seatbelt."

He took the accident calmly, but admits, "If I

hadn't had it (the seatbelt) on, I'd have hit the windshield on the second impact." He didn't say it, but if he'd have hit the windshield and been unconscious when his car burst into flames, the firefighter's comments would have been even less unprintable. Same with the funeral director's comments.

What impact will this have on John?

"Now I don't even move cars around our (dealership) lot without my seatbelt on," insists Blackwell.

What impact will this have on you?

Maybe you weren't at the scene of Thursday night's crash.

Maybe you don't wear your seatbelt on just the average run to the grocery store. Mind you, this wasn't in a dangerous intersection, just on an average stretch of road.

That's OK: The Community Crier will save space for you on the obituary page.

John got a few years' extension on his space reservation for that page by wearing his seatbelt.

Are public schools as good as private ones?

I am replying to the letter Ms. Hosking wrote in the Sept. 10th edition.

Ms. Hosking makes a point of letting the readers know the Plymouth-Canton School System "is completely within its rights" to countersue parents withdrawing their children from the system. She goes on later to state she can not belittle the reasons couples withdraw...their youngsters from their respective systems into parochial institutions or homeschooling situations." Adding to this statement, she questions their validity.

Ms. Hosking, I ask you if you are aware that parents sending a child to a private school, pay their local school taxes in addition to the tuition, books and sometimes uniforms for the private school. These added expenses are not tax deductible.

I resent your supposed open-mindedness at the same time adding the innuendoes about the Bennett family. I do not know these people but I respect their right to do as they feel is necessary in this situation.

If indeed your letter had addressed specific problems and possible

remedies I might be able to understand the reasons for such a letter.

A few years ago, this district had teachers in areas in which they were unqualified to teach. Wasn't it the state who warned them about this practice? How about a district whose math and reading scores were in the high 70s and low 80s? Tell me why out of the combined high school senior population of approximately 1,200, why were there only five National Merit semi-finalists -- that's one in every 240 students? I challenge you to find the two parochial schools (your term) that have ratios of 1 to 8 and 1

to 12. Tell me what would you say to the local teachers and administrators whose children attend private schools?

Viculin's young musicians succeed

When Charlotte Moore-Viculin speaks of her students' accomplishments she beams with pride.

As the proprietress of the Charlotte Moore-Viculin Studio of Music in Plymouth, she fills her day giving lessons in piano, organ, voice and music theory.

"I try to bring out the best of what a student is capable of. I help them fulfill their potential and reach their own goals," said Moore-Viculin.

By aiding the student in setting and achieving personal goals Moore-Viculin says she helps her students see the best in music.

"Music is a social activity," she stated. "If a person is going to enjoy making music they need many performance opportunities.

"Public performance helps build confidence to play in front of others, and in your own abilities.

"I start off the year by scheduling Halloween and Christmas recitals and end with an honors recital.

"The early recitals give the students something to be motivated for. A goal they don't have to wait all year to realize.

"This helps to mobilize efforts and eliminates haphazard and aimless study," said Moore-Viculin.

She also encourages her students to participate in the competitions held each year by the Michigan Federation of Music Teachers (MFMT), the National Guild of Piano Teachers (NGPT) and other organizations.

Recently Moore-Viculin's teaching expertise brought remarkable results.

Fourteen of her students between the ages of six and 18 received high competition grades, three received scholarships awarded by the Plymouth Community Arts Council

to attend the Blue Lakes Fine Arts Camp and one student performed before thousands at a packed baseball park.

The Junior Festival, sponsored by the MFMT, is open to students under 18 open for performance on all instruments and voice.

Students compete to show their personal best and not against each other. Two memorized pieces are performed before a judge who rates them on several aspects of performance.

Students are graded and return in successive years, the ultimate goal being a awarded a gold cup.

Of the 14 of Moore-Viculin's students that attended the Festival there were 13 A's and two B's (one student competed in two areas) awarded.

The Guild Auditions sponsored by

the NGPT, are only open to piano students but have no age limit.

Each year a student attends the Auditions another piece is added to the list of works they are to perform before the judge. For this competition grading includes a theory exam.

The reward after years of study and competition is an internationally accepted diploma in music qualifying the person as an accredited piano teacher of the National Guild, a part of the American College of Musicians.

All eight of Moore-Viculin's

students that entered received an A rating.

"I'm very specific with a beginner because they need basic training," stated Moore-Viculin. "I'm inflexible in basics but after that I'm agreeable to why a student came to study.

"I've no preconceived idea that a student must only study a certain style. I don't try to mold my students in the same way," she said.

As a teacher Moore-Viculin said a highlight of her career occurred after the Guild Auditions when a judge came out to meet her exclaiming, "A student must be very fortunate to have you as a teacher."

Another memorable moment occurred when Ashley Whitt, age 9, sang both the Canadian and American National Anthems in the packed Exposition Stadium before the Aug. 3 game between the Toronto Blue Jays and the Baltimore Orioles.

Whitt is the daughter of Jays catcher Ernie Whitt.

Moore-Viculin is quick to point out that it is the student that deserves credit for their success.

"They develop the sense of responsibility and discipline needed for exceptional performance," she stated. "I just guide them along."

Moore-Viculin's students are often asked to perform at various community and social group functions.

On Sunday afternoon, Sept. 21, a group including adults will perform Gay 90's songs for the Trenton festival, "Somewhere in Time."






or middle school, and happens in March. The winner's work of art is framed and displayed throughout the school system for two years, and then returned to the artist.



Screech!

Live show's energy beats feedback

Omnicom Cablevision's "Videotunes Live" show lives and dies by the seat of its pants.

Monday night, the show was headed in the wrong way even as it opened: screeching, unintended feedback greeted viewers tuning in to the live music video show on public access channel 8.

Host Dave Daniele covered his ears in pain but escaped the tight spot by introducing a taped, extended play video while technicians rushed to correct the live show's sound.

"We make mistakes," said "Jimmy Ray" Leinbach, the show's co-host. "A lot of the time, we don't have control over what's going on."

But some sloppiness and on-air mistakes don't seem to put much of a smear on the show's success. Leinbach and Daniele were recently honored for producing one of the best local video shows by the Washington-based National Federation for Local Cable Programmers.

Daniele said that as many as 30 people call the show; he estimates about 1,000 of Omnicom's 17,000 subscribers tune in.

"It's such an unpredictable format," Daniele said, as Leinbach laughed and added, "We never practice a song before we play it live. The show's energy won us the award."

The two said they didn't predict much of what happened to them that night: the sound never mixed quite right, one crew member couldn't hear the director's camera instructions, and some of the musical equipment wasn't hooked up right.

Things fell into place, though, once Daniele and Leinbach — also musicians and technicians for the show — began performing with the rest of their group, the Assorted Jellies Players.

To bridge between the Jellies act and pre-taped videos, the two hosts try out the studio's electronic visual effects and some experimental humor.

Even though things don't always work, Daniele said, the show is "10 times more exciting than any other video show."

"Videotunes Live" airs 9:30 Monday and Wednesday nights, and 7:30 p.m. Saturday on Channel 8.
