Treasurers: No holiday tax bill gifts

Tax bills from Plymouth and Plymouth Township are off to a late start this season and have left many citizens wondering whether they're in for a complimentary holiday tax break.

Ending the mystery in the township, Supervisor Maurice Breen issued the warrant last Friday for Treasurer Mary Brooks to distribute the 8,000 tax bills to Plymouth Township residents. Despite the delay, Brooks is confident that township residents will be able to pay their taxes before the end of 1987.

This year's billing delay can be attributed to a case of untimely paper shuffling in the Michigan House of Representatives.

The millage for the Plymouth District Library had to be added to this year's tax authorization, following the Nov. 3 voter approval of the library's 0.4-mill increase. The millage applies to both Plymouth city and township residents.

Winter taxes also include millage for schools, police and fire, Wayne County and Huron-Clinton Metro Parks, along with the Dunning-Hough Library millage.

Unfortunately the library millage increase was dropped from the two tax bills up for certification in the House of Representatives. The mysterious deletion caused the delay of tax billing in both the township and the city, Brooks said.

"I'm not sure how this happened," said Pat Thomas, director of the Dunning-Hough Library. "Two years ago when we passed our first millage, we were allowed to file for state certification after the September deadline. We assumed that we were okay."

The reason the library millage was initially dropped is unclear to both the city and township clerks and to Pat

Canton post to be filled in January

The search for a Canton superintendent has been narrowed to two candidates, according to Dan Durack, Canton personnel director.

The committee interviewing candidates for the newly-created position screened six people before deciding on the two remaining candidates, Durack said. The committee -- Trustee Robert Padget, Thomas Yack and Phil LaJoy -- was joined by consultant firm Bartell and Bartell, Ltd. in its interviews for the position.

"My guess is at this point it's going to be after the first of the year" before a candidate is presented to the board of trustees for a vote, Durack said.

The board would probably call a special meeting for the review, he said.

The committee wanted to get more background information on the two candidates before presenting a candidate (or both) to the board for consideration, Durack said.

The board voted 4-3 to hire a fultime superintendent to handle the day-to-day operations of the township on August 25. The board had directed an implementation committee to look into the procedures regarding the hiring of a superintendent in September of 1985. That committee reported back to the board about one year later.

Preceding the August 25 vote, a public vote on the matter had been proposed and then scrapped after the state attorney general's office ruled a special election would be improper.


The four trustees - Padget, Stephen Larson, John Preniczky and Loren Bennett - voted in favor of the superintendent system while Supervisor James Poole, Clerk Linda Chuhran and Treasurer Gerald Brown voted against the move.

The salaries of the supervisor, clerk and treasurer's positions will be reduced to part-time in conjunction with the November 1988 elections as part of the move. The superintendent will not have a vote on the board of trustees.

For Plymouth shops

Shopping trends erratic

Opinions on this year's holiday shopping trends vary among downtown Plymouth merchants.

While Plymouth continues to be a stomping ground for holiday shoppers, a few storeowners have noticed some peculiar patterns at work in this year's consumer fleet.

"It's been very erratic - very strange. It's been hectic on the weekends and light during the week," said Debbie Exe, manager of the Willow Tree, a women's clothing store. "Who knows -- we had 'Men's Night' in here last Thursday and nobody showed.

"We're running pretty close to last year, but the buying patterns have been completely different," said Exe. "It's like they held back at the beginning and now they're coming back. It could be the weather."

Down the street at The Mole Hole, holiday sales have slumped slightly compared to years past.

"We're doing well, but we're down from last year," said store owner Maria Shaw. "It's starting to come on strong now and I think that we'll make up for our slow start.

"I really think that the stock market situation scared a lot of people, even though it may not have directly affected them," said Shaw. "But, people are starting to charge up a storm now, which is an indication that they're no longer afraid."

Shaw expects her final sales percentage to equal that of last year.

Next door, at the Little Professor on the Park bookstore, sales have been up and the shop is experiencing its best holiday sales in the store's four year history.

"We didn't start out slow, we started out fast and we're still going

fast," said owner Jackie Powers.
"We've experienced a substantial percentage increase in sales this season."

Powers attributed her sales increase to the store's growing reputation and clientel. Weather and economics, she maintained, have made little difference.

On Forest Avenue, store owners are also rolling with the holiday flow, though some are undergoing varying sales experiences.

Pam Kosteva, owner of the Cheese and Wine Barn, admits that at this point it's impossible to compare her holiday sales to those of last year.

"It's hard to evaluate my sales because I do a large commercial basket business," said Kosteva. "I'm ahead on my commercial sales, but retail is still a question.

"If business is slower, I really don't believe that it has anything to do with the stock market. It would have to be for other reasons," Kosteva said.

Across the street at Sacks of Forest Avenue, Patricia Mee notes that business has been a "little sluggish."

"I was saddened by the turnout at the Christmas Walk (on Dec. 6)," said Mee. "It didn't bring in as many shoppers as it has in past years."

Mee added that Sunday continues to be a busy day, and despite the smaller number of shoppers through Sacks, those who come usually buy.

"So far, I don't see the weather as a factor," said Mee. "Maybe the stock market has had some effect. It's hard to say for sure."

Twp. cops near contract

The first contract in the history of the Plymouth Township police department was to have been voted on last night.

Township police officers in the Police Officers' Association of Michigan (POAM) union and the Plymouth Township Board of Trustees were working on an agreement of the terms of the document last week.

The police officers were to meet late Tuesday afternoon for a discussion of the contract terms. Trustees were scheduled to discuss the progress of the collective bargaining agreement with the POAM in a closed session that same night.

Deputy Chief of Police Chip Snyder described the contract as "including all of the rules of the work environment" for police officers on the Plymouth Township force.

Township police officers became unionized in April of 1985, nearly six months after the formation of the Township police department.





Canton water plan may ditch landfill

Canton officials are hoping that a little water will go a long way.

The Board of Trustees voted at its Dec. 8 meeting to approve an engineering study for a project to extend a water main south along Lilley Road past Michigan Avenue. The water main would be used by a proposed recycling project planned for Lilley Road near Van Borm Road by David Denski and Ed Bretzlaff.

But, that's only half of the story.

Another reason township officials want the water main extended is so two right-of-way strips of property along Lilley Road will be owned by the township. And if those strips of land

are owned by the township, the proposed Sauk Trail Hills landfill would not be able to incorporate Lilley Road into the project.

Sauk Trail Hills is being proposed by Wayne Disposal, Inc., which is seeking to vacate Lilley Road south of

Michigan Avenue for purposes of building a landfill operation that would cover the roadway. Wayne County Office of Public Services officials will have to rule whether Lilley Road can be condemned and used for the landfill project.



Pick Canton trustee on overall merits

The remaining six members of the Canton Board of Trustees can make it easy on themselves by replacing a fellow trustee using common sense rather than political brokering.

With the imminent resignation of Trustee Stephen Larson, the board must vote on a November, 1988.

The board should consider the several wellqualified Canton citizens who have demonstrated an interest in serving as a public official. Phil LaJoy, Carol Bodenmiller, Frank McMurray, Elaine Kirchgatter. Thomas Yack and others have been mentioned as possible replacement trustees.

All are qualified. However, the candidates may not share a common view regarding the move to a superintendent form of administration. That's where the remaining members of the board could

make a travesty of the replacement process.

The board should consider qualified candidates solely upon the merits of the individual, and not on the positions those candidates hold on several complicated issues.

Three of the remaining trustees support the replacement trustee to fulfill his term until superintendent hiring. The other three board members voted against the move.

> If the board lets one issue stand in the way of an appointment of another trustee, a special election could be the end result. That would be a sorry waste of the taxpayers' money.

> The board should appoint a qualified trustee based on their record of involvement and level of municipal interest.

> Letting one issue prolong the absence of a seventh trustee is not serving Canton residents

Growth Works, Inc., the first line of defense in combatting youth problems in this community, needs your help.

As Stephen Harper, president of Growth Works, said: "Today it's a different world from when we were growing up. Kids now have a lot of new opportunities, but also face new obstacles."

But Harper notes also that federal, state and even county funds are rapidly drying up, leaving the burden of supporting Growth Works in the hands of private donors. Even the school district has been forced to curtail its support of the agency.

Growth Works is currently the only comprehensive youth service agency in all of western Wayne County, southern Oakland County and eastern Washtenaw County.

It offers four primary programs — Learning Options Program, Youth Development Program, Substance Abuse Program, and the Community Employment Service.

Each program is important in its

own way:

The Learning Options program gives high school dropouts a place to turn for alternative education, which may someday enable them to return to school.

The Youth Development program is aimed at first time juvenile offenders. It helps keep those youths out of the Wayne County Youth Home by bringing together the youth and his or her parents in a program designed to correct delinquent behavior.

The Substance Abuse program is directed at drug and alcohol users. It "challenges" them to remain drug-free and sober during their first year of recovery.

And the Community Employment Service matches local residents seeking jobs with local employers who need workers through the use of a job bank.

Contributions will hopefully keep Growth Works a viable alternative for those youths on the fringe, many of whom have nowhere else to turn.

Besides contributions, Growth Works could also use some volunteers to help work with the community's youths. Either way, here is a chance for those who believe in helping troubled youths to really make a difference.

After seven years as executive director of the Plymouth Community Fund United Way, that's not surprising.

DuCharme is retiring from the directorship of the Fund after the successful 1987 campaign, which as of Dec. 10, had raised \$434,172.95. The goal set in August was \$425,000.

He has also been active with Our Lady of Good Counsel parish, the Plymouth Rotary Club, and the Plymouth Elks.

"Clarence has always been an excellent source of information about the Community Fund and the United Way," said Marcia Buhl, chairperson for the 1987 Fund campaign.

"He's so knowledgeable about the history of the Fund," added Minnie Johnson, vice-chairperson of the 1987 Fund campaign.

Bob Cann remembers Clarence DuCharme back in the days when "we had no modern plumbing."

Nobody knows Clarence DuCharme better, however, than his spouse, Louise DuCharme. "He has spent a lot of time at it and he always enjoyed

doing it," she said of his Fund work.
"I think he has helped a great deal on the drive."

Now that the DuCharmes are both retired (Louise was a nurse), there will be more time to spend with each other.

"We hope to do a little more traveling," Louise said.

And the DuCharmes can go on their journeys knowing that the community of Plymouth has benefitted from one honest man's work.

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


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Dreaming of a white Christmas



The job of the Christmas holiday is being able to share with family and friends. Thank heavens that's one tradition that won't change!






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Property procedures studied

What happens when a land developer wants to buy property in Canton that the township owns? What happens when the township wants to buy property?

The answers to those questions will be more clear in the future, after action taken by the Canton Board of Trustees

At that meeting, the board granted a request from township Community and Economic Development Director David Nicholson to develop a set of procedural guidelines regarding the selling and buying of township-owned land.

"It's important and long overdue." Trustee Robert Padget said of the guidelines.

and the county Office of Public Services, Nicholson said.

Many of the property sale issues. involve people like Harold Rosin and Michael Horowitz.

Rosin and Horowitz were at the Dec. 2 meeting to talk about their roles as developers trying to purchase township-owned land. Horowitz, president of The Selective Group, made an offer to buy some township-owned property near Haggerty Road recently, he said.

"After the offer was made, we were told that the community didn't want to sell the property, that it wanted to achieve a goal," Horowitz said. "We're not land speculators, we're property developers" he said of his





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
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Getting down to business






"A Very Victorian Christmas" awaits residents who visit the Plymouth Historical Museum this holiday season.

"Tax bills were ready to be mailed on Nov. 30, but they couldn't go out because the library millage had not been certified by the state," explained Brooks. "Thanks to the efforts of Sen. Robert Geake, the bill which included the library millage increase was passed in the (state) senate today (Friday)."

Brooks is confident that the bill will pass in the House. State Representatives are expected to vote on the bill this week, Brooks said.

"I bet we've had over 2,000 calls into this office from people wondering

where their bills are," said Brooks. "We're going to make every effort to accommodate those people who wish to pay their bills before the year end."

In fact, the treasurer's office will be open during extended hours to accommodate year-end bill payers. The hours will be 7:30 - 5 p.m. on Dec. 21, 22 and 23. On Dec. 28, 29 and 30 the office will be open from 8 - 6 p.m.. On Dec. 31 the office will be open from 8 - 2 p.m.. There will also be a drop box in the parking lot.

These hours are to accommodate tax payers only.

In the City, Treasurer Ken Way stated that the treasurer's office will not bill residents until the state House gives its final assent.

"We're going to wait until the bill makes it back through the house just to be sure," said Way. "If for some reason it fails to pass, we won't have to go back and issue refunds."

Way also noted that once the bills are issued, they can be paid at First of America, National Bank of Detroit and Comerica Bank on Wilcox Road. The City will also have a drop box in the City Hall parking lot.



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
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


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Balloon race documented



Rocks tumble to state hoop champs

Another frustrating loss.

Salem High's girls cage squad made its second appearance in as many years at the Michigan Class A State Semi-Finals on Friday, and for the second year in a row the Rocks came up empty, suffering a 63-48 loss to Detroit Cass Technical.

The Rocks did battle with the highly potent Lady Technicians, who displayed an explosive offense and tough inside game.

"Tech has the best inside game in the state," Salem head coach Fred Thomann said after the heartbreaking

Although the Rocks lost to Cass Tech by 13 points, they were in the game until the closing minutes.

Salem started out slowly with senior sensation Dena Head missing her first nine shots from the field. She ended up 2-14-from the field in the first half.

"Dena has never had such a slow start in her career here at Salem," Thomann said.

"After the slow start it was really hard to get into any kind of rhythm,' Salem guard Jill Estey said. "It was a game where nothing clicked."

Cass Tech jumped ahead 11-6 by the end of the first quarter, but then it appeared the Rocks-Had settled in and were ready to play as they made a run. at the Technicians in the second quarter:

At the 5:15 mark of the second stanza, the Rocks took the lead for the first time in the game behind the shooting arm of Stacy Sovine.

"Stacy played the best game of her high school career tonight," Thomann said.

But the Rocks couldn't hang on to the lead, losing it just 28 seconds later:

Still the Rocks kept hammering away at Cass Tech, and even pulled within one point before the intermission, as Cass Tech held a slim 23-22 margin at the half.

"I thought that pulling within one point at the end of the second quarter was a real positive note for us," Thomann said. "But we could not maintain any kind of rhythm."

Johnson wins coaching honor

The 1987 Salem girls soccer team, which captured the Class A state title in May on a blistering hot afternoon, is continuing to earn awards from around the country.

The Rocks' head coach Ken Johnson was recently named as the All-Midwest Coach-of-the-Year for girls varsity soccer teams.

"It feels great," Johnson said after learning of the honor.

Johnson has been coaching the Salem girls soccer squad since 1982, when the team's record was 8-5-2. But as the years went by, the record, and the quality of the players, has continued to improve.

In 1983, the Rocks were 12-6-1 and finished ranked fifth in the state; in 1984 they just kept above .500, with an 8-7-3 record; in 1985 the Rocks were runner-up in the first annual Schoolcraft College Soccer Tournament; and in 1986 they went 13-3-2 overall and were ranked among the top 10 teams in the state.

Then came 1987.

The Rocks went 17-2-2, scored 108 goals and allowed only 19 goals against all season. They eventually captured the Class A state crown.

"I've really worked hard to get here," Johnson said.

The girls soccer team was also honored once again. Well, junior Jill Estey was anyway. She was named to the National Association of Secondary Schools All-American team by the

National Soccer Coaches Association of America.

"After coming home from losing the state semi-finals in basketball, I was quite surprised to find out I was an all-American," Estey said. "It made me feel a little better about the loss."

Estey, who has been on the Rocks varsity soccer team for only her freshman and sophomore years, has broken almost every record in the school's record book.

During the 1986 season she set a record for most goals scored as freshman with 25 goals. She also finished with 14 assists, and was named to the Western Lakes Activities Association (WLAA) All Lakes division team.

In 1987, Estey tallied 32 goals, breaking her own record of 25 goals scored the previous year. And she finished with 28 assists, which was also a new Salem girls soccer team record.

Estey also got named to the WLAA All-Conference team this year, and was unanimously voted to the Class A All-State team. That automatically qualified her as a member of the All-Midwest squad.


And now, on top of it all, she has just been named to the first team All-American team.

"It really summed up the girls soccer season for me," Estey added. "It's the icing on the cake."

How do you top such a year?

"There is always room for improvement," Estey said.

The Rocks may have lost in the Class A semi-finals, but it was a season of accomplishment, according to Thomann, and the final loss cannot overshadow an outstanding year.




Above, Jill Estey launches a shot late in Friday's game. Below, Dena Head eyes a Cass

Tickets are \$5 and a can of food, and may be purchased at the door the night of the show.






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
