### In 12 per cent turnout

## Battishill, Walker take election

Fresh-faced Carl Battishill and veteran Lester Walker swept to victory in Monday's Plymouth-Canton Community Schools Board of Education race.

Unofficial results Monday night showed Battishill leading the field with 4,874 votes. Walker, a former board trustee, finished second with a total of 3,801.

Trailing by a distant 2,200 votes were the Citizens for Better Education (CBE) supported candidates, Robert Anderson Jr., with 1,635, and Diane Stamp, with 1,611.

About 12 per cent of the voters, or 6,989, went to the polls for Monday's non-millage election. That's just under half the 15,840 voters who cast ballots in last year's all-time record turnout on an important millage increase question.

Anderson, the CBE's main candidate in the last three board elections, also lost in total votes compared with his last run in 1989 when he garnered 3,100 votes. A combined vote total of CBE candidates would not have been enough to win one of the two four-year seats up for grabs this year.

The rest of the field in the school election finished like this:



K.C. Mueller, fifth, 887; Toni Hartke, sixth 385, and Richard Sumpter, seventh, 363 votes. John Engdahl, whose name remained on the ballot despite withdrawing near the end of the race, picked up 137 votes.

"I'm honestly surprised by the totals," said Battishill. "The differential there is real satisfying. I felt I put everything into this race. Win or lose I gave it everything I had.

"It's real gratifying. It's such an honor to have that many people support you," he added.

**Police union demands Vachher retraction**

The union representing Canton police officers is demanding the retraction of statements made by the family of Paul Vachher, who was shot by police on May 21 and remains in critical condition.

In a letter sent to the Vachher family Friday, the Police Officers Association of Michigan (POAM), which is representing two of the three officers involved, Dave Boljesic and Brian Darow, demands "cach and every word of your press release be retracted."

. The union's letter, written by

general counsel Frank Guido, says the Vachher release has "jeopardized the career and reputation of two fine Canton Township police officers."

The retraction is demanded by July 1, according to the union letter.

Dr. Prchiad S. Vachher, father of Paul, declined to comment on the union letter Monday, saying he would comment after the family's attorney reviewed the letter.

No charges have been filed in connection with the incident as of press time.

The incident is currently being inevestigated, by the Michigan State The City of Plymouth resident picked up the most votes in all 15 voting precincts Monday, as well as in the absentees, while Walker captured the second most votes in every precinct.

Battishill said he hopes he can "live up" to the voters' trust. He said it's very different when you go from

## Tattan leaving post at Canton High

BY KEN VOYLES Thomas Tattan is leaving the helm

of Canton High School. Last night the Plymouth-Canton Community Schools Board of Education was expected to name Canton's principal as director of secondary education.

The 41-year-old Canton resident -- if approved for the post by the board -will say his goodbyes to students and staff at Canton tomorrow on the last day of classes at Centennial Educational Park (CEP) this year.

"I'm sad to be leaving Canton," Tattan said Monday before the official appointment by the board. "In my five years there I've met a lot of very fine people among the staff, and a lot of outstanding students.

"It was topped off Sunday when we had our graduation (for the Class of 1990)," he continued. "I'm proud to have spent five years at Canton."

Tattan came to the district five years ago and moved right into the principal's post at Canton. His wife, Cynthia, is a teacher at Isbister Elementary School.

Tattan will be the district's first director of secondary education since Kent Buikema left the post more than three years ago. (Buikema was the principal at Canton before Tattan).

## Among public, elected officials ben tops P-C salary list

School administrators, police officers and firefighters are among the top public-funded wage-earners in The Plymouth-Canton Community.

At the top of the public pay scale in the four local governmental units -including the Plymouth-Canton Community School District, Canton, Plymouth Township and the City of Plymouth - is John M. Hoben, schools superintendent.

Hoben's pay, at \$96,054 a year, does not include fringe benefits, which are estimated at an additional eight to 10 per cent. With 18 years on the job as superintendent, Hoben is by far the longest serving top official of the four units.

All 20 top earners in the Plymouth-Canton Schools were administrators. and earned \$60,266 or more, plus fringes.

In the City of Plymouth and Canton and Plymouth townships, the men with guns and fire hoses are at or near the top of the pay scale. Overtime accounts for much of their reported pay.

In the city, three police officers -Commander Michael Gardner,

Sergeant Wayne Carroll and Sergeant Robert Scoggins -- were the top public-paid employes. Their respective 1989 salaries, including overtime, were \$58,165, \$53,041 and \$49,240.

Firefighters account for six of the 12 highest paid employes in Plymouth Township, with salary and overtime totals ranging from \$45,886 down to \$41,739. Fire Chief Larry Groth ranked fourth at \$45,910.

Township Supervisor Maurice M. Breen topped the township list at \$50,535, plus he gets an additional \$4,000 in expenses.

Police Chief Carl Berry was the next

highest paid in Plymouth Township at \$49,566, while his counterpart in the city - Chief Richard Myers- made \$46,186, eighth on the list, below four of the officers he supervises.

John Santomauro, public safety director in Canton, was at the top of the scale in that booming township with a salary of \$53,015.

Also in Canton, Supervisor Thomas Yack ranked 16th on the highest paid list in 1989, below six police officers and four firemen.

The figures used for this comparison were supplied by the governmental units in response to The Community Crier's request under the Michigan Freedom of Information Act.

## Last look at 90-91 plan **Board expected to give budget OK**

The Plymouth-Canton Community Schools Board of Education was expected to complete its discussions of the district budget last night and adopt the 1990-91 plan.

Among the items in the budget to be discussed include a 14 per cent increase in school operations, an 8.1 per cent increase in major maintenance projects and a \$318,720 to start an extended day care program.

Last week Ray Hoedel, associate superintendent for business in the district, presented the proposed 1990-91 budget at a special meeting of the board.

The district's figures released show an increase in revenues of nine per cent, along with an 11 per cent increase in expenses.

The total operating budget for the 1990-91 school year is \$68,168,354 (expenditures). Total revenues will reach \$69,877,597, resulting in some \$1.7 million in excess revenues. The school district's fund balance is projected to be \$6.3 million.

An 11.2 per cent increase in local revenues is partly responsible for the added funds of the new budget. A large portion of these funds is forecasted to come from tax abated properties.

Increases in local tax revenue and the Headlee rollback millage will result in the district levying only 35.39 mills of the 41 mill authorized by voters. This

will result in a 1990 operating levy of 1.55 mills less than 1989.

Various reasons are cited for the increase in the 1990-91 budget. Items such as \$310,000 for re-roofing Miller Elementary School and part of Canton High School, and \$250,000 to provide partial restoration to the bus replacement program added to the increases. An increase of \$138,886 to the athletic budget is also projected.

Approval for the budget is expected. to come the final week in June.

Hoedel said the budget has a "healthy outlook" due to local growth in SEVs (State Equalized Valuation) and a stabilization of projected student enrollments. Plymouth-Canton is an out-of-formula district.

For the first time in several years the administration has been able to present a district budget without major fun-

In fact, the new budget calls for "restoring" funds in some areas where cuts had to be made in previous years.

They include: transportation, textbooks, athletics, capital outlay, major maintenance projects, and staff development.

## orbin facing murder charges

William Roy Corbin, 27, of Van Buren Township, will stand trial later this month in connection with the shooting death of a Westland man in Canton on June 3, according to 35th District Court records.

Corbin allegedly shot Terrance Lee Serman, 36, of Westland, to death at the Canton apartment of Kimberly Ann Boland, according to Canton Police.

The trial is scheduled for June 22 in Wayne County Circuit Court at 8:30 a.m. He was arraigned last week in 35th District Court.

Corbin is being charged with first-degree murder, first-degree felony murder while perpetrating a breaking and entering, and using a firearm in the commission of a felony, court records indicated.

Police said Corbin, the ex-boyfriend of Boland, kicked in the door of the apartment and went up to the second floor of the unit.

Corbin discovered Boland and Serman, who had just returned to the apartment from a date the previous night, said Canton Police Officer Pat Nemecek:

Nemecek said Corbin, armed with a .357-caliber revolver, fired two shots, one hitting the floor and the other striking Serman in the left abdomen.

Serman died a short time later after being taken to Annapolis Hospital inWayne, Nemecek added.

# The race: good, bad.

Monday's Plymouth-Canton Schools elections proved a few points.

For example, the War of the Lawn Signs is best summarized by one observation: "I never met a lawn that voted." Clearly, the number of signs did not greatly affect the election, although it did affect campaign expenses. Based on preliminary estimates and unofficial election figures, some candidates spent \$6 per vote while others spent'less than \$1 per vote.

Also, the conservative' Citizens for Better Education (CBE) has run out of steam. With two seats open, the top CBE candidate garnered fewer than a third of the votes he won a year ago in a couple key precincts. The vote totals of the top two finishers were more than double that of the CBE hopefuls'.

Rancor and bickering was more evident this election than in the past couple years. (Although reaching further back in history here, even this was nothing new.)-Some of the disagreements were childish: burning lawn signs and the like represent new lows. But as petty as it may seem, signs are others' property and there are laws protecting them, just as there are laws protecting the public by banning signs from public property and requiring campaign disclaimers.

Now the Plymouth-Canton School District must put the election behind it and move on.

With the transition to an "out-of-formula" state aid district still underway, with a projected classroom shortage looming at the high schools, with a bond issue on the agenda for next year, the district has a full plate.

The campaigns produced a few good, new faces and another look at others. These hopefuls can benefit by providing input through the decision-making process during the upcoming issues.

Meanwhile, the needs of education go on. THE COMMUNITY CRIER

## Mettetal study clouded

If you attended the Mettetal Study. Committee meeting May 23 chances are you probably left more confused than when you got there.

The committee heard from a number of "experts" in their quest to make a recommendation to the Canton Board of Trustees on the township's role in the fate of Mettetal Airport. The committee will vote "yes" or "no" to recommend if Canton should buy the airport, which is owned by the Klochko family.

Depending on which expert you choose to believe, buying the airport will either be an "asset for many years" or a potential "white elephant" to the community.

Ashley Heimbaugh, who is the major occupant of Mettetal Airport with 104 of its hangars, said buying the airport would be an asset to Canton because of its "unlimited potential." With the addition of 100 to 150 more "t-Hangars," which are larger than a good portion of Mettetal's current hangars, and "external improvements," such as a re-built runway, the airport would be more suitable for business aircraft, he said.

Heimbaugh added that he would be willing to finance the cost of building the new hangars and then let Canton use them on a lease-buy plan. He said the cost of repairs to the airport could be paid, in large, by grants from the government.

Combining increased business traffic to the already substantial recreational and training usages would make Canton "fortunate to own the airport," Heimbaugh said.

Supporters of buying the airport also point to the fact that it would cost Canton little or nothing to purchase

### Keep recycling!

Aviation Administration (FAA) supervisor for Michigan, 90 per cent of the purchase cost would be paid through grants from the FAA.

At least half of the remaining 10 per cent of the purchase price would be covered by the state, again through grants, said John Wagner of the Michigan Aeronautics Commission. He said there has been discussion of the state covering all 10 per cent of the remaining cost to Canton because of the importance of keeping Mettetal as a link in the aviation system.

Sounds convincing. But, before you say "buy the airport," listen to the other side.

Along with the federal grant money to buy the airport would come some important restrictions. Nitz said grant rules wouldn't permit the airport to be sold by Canton - ever - even if it were losing money. He added that if the airport was losing money, the township would have to provide funds to keep it running, year after year if need be.

,Thus, the potential of the airport being a "white elephant," said study committee member Sam Marshall.

Eric Mueller, who did a study of the possible revenues generated from either airport or light industrial use, said light industrial use would likely provide Canton with 10 times more revenue than an airport use would.

Mueller, who's objectivity was called into question by study committee member Vic Gustafson because his family owns the airport in New Hudson, doubted that a municipalowned airport would make money.

"I don't understand how a government run facility could do better (make a profit) than a privately owned airport," said Mueller. If Canton doesn't buy the airport it's

If Canton doesn't buy the airport it's unlikely that another municipality or private business would.

Tom Klochko, who represented the family at the meeting, said no formal offers have been made for the airport.

"I don't consider this a dangerous proposition for Canton," said Heimbaugh. "It is a great chance for the community."

# With malice toward none

A favorite kid's book is "Where the Sidewalk Ends."

Its title brings up a frightening topic - The Plymouth-Canton Community is almost completely crossed by sidewalks.

Call it "Progress," call it "Growth," call it "Invasion." It's one and the same.

What once were corn fields, now are subdivisions. They're almost all the way to Napier Road -- the western border of our world here.

My father once gave a speech on the Napier Road Line. Even 25 years ago, he saw the urban sprawl crawling towards the family farm just west of Napier in Salem Township. His joking speech suggested erecting a wall at Napier to stave off the onslaught.

As usual, he was way ahead of his time.

Just recently, the sidewalks were completed along Powell Road for Plymouth Commons (a Rossi and Sons development of finelooking houses). They end about half a mile from the county line.

It's not that their subdivision is any less an intrusion than other construction of the past 20 years in The Plymouth-Canton Community — it's not. Simply, their sidewalks seem to signify the "almost-to-the-line" wall-to-wall sprawl.

The sidewalk isn't the only recent manifestation.

Ridge Road south of Five Mile Road is being paved, even though no one lives on that part of the road, nor are there businesses there. (The governmental grant monies for that U.S. Census tract in Plymouth Township had to be spent in that area somehow.)

Canton government officials are fighting the locating of a third McDonald's in the township at the same time those politicos are bragging that the population has hit 55,000. That's growth, folks. (Remember, "Flow with the grow.")

Pretty soon, there will be no sidewalk endings.

The Plymouth-Canton Community is near the edge.

### Says site is safe Compost committee report due

A citizens committee formed to research residents' concerns over a proposed composting site at Geddes and Beck roads in Canton has found no negative impacts to the program, according to committee chairperson John Osborne.

"We haven't found any evidence that it would be damaging to the en-vironment at this point," said Osborne.

The committee is expecting to get test results from the Michigan Department of Natural Resources (DNR) later this week that will clairify the possibility of ground-water contamination from a composting operation, Osborne said.

The committee will wait until the study is complete before making a recomendation to the Canton Board of Trustees, Osborne said. He said the committee will likely make the recommendation to the board in a few weeks.

Osborne said Peter Rekshan, owner of Composting Systems Inc., which would run the 80-acre site, has agreed to guidelines formulated by the committee that would provide for strict. regulation of the site.

Among those guidlines, Rekshan said he gave Canton permission to inspect the site at anytime, without notice. He said the public would also have access to the site at anytime.

Osborne said other guidelines include: the elimination of noxious odors from the site, no work at the site before 7 a.m. or after 7 p.m., removal of any refuse that may be dumped at the site and control of noise from trucks entering and leaving the site.

"They (CSI) have been cooperative with the committee," said Osborne. "I am very pleased with Rekshan's handling of the situation."

Rekshan said he believes most of the citizens concerns have been addressed. He said the committee has been "very friendly" and eager to learn about the composting operation.

"I don't have any problems with the committee's guidelines," Rekshan said.

Osborne termed the involvement of Canton's government as "positive" in resolving the residents concerns. He said the committee agrees with the township's finding, by the township's land use attornery, that the site's current zoning does permit a composting operation.

The site is currently unprepared for composting, Rekshan said. He said roads into the site need to be built as well as a garage to house equipment.

"I'm prepared to start work (on the site) now," Rekshan said.

Rekshan said all of the work needed to open the site could be done in about a month. A July opening is possible, he added.

Officials from the Western Townships Utilities Authorities (WTUA) said they are proceeding with the site "according to our orginal timetable."

being a candidate to a soon-to-be seated member of the board.

"Right now it's just a learning process," he said. "I want to get involved in the process, in the policies ands direction of the district. I want to be part of the process, but I also want to be part of the inspiration for new direction."

The Plymouth resident said he wants to "resolve" some of the differences in the community which surfaced again during the election, and "reach across and touch hands"

"I see the need to make a stronger effort," he said.

acknowledged receiving a copy of the letter.

The union's letter called the Vachher family's statements on the incident "destructive" and a "flagrant" misrepresentation of the events.

"It is readily apparent that your selfserving press release is intended to remove blame...from your son," the letter states, and to "transfer such blame to the Canton Township police officers."

Guido said Monday that the union would not "stand-by" while two of its members were being attacked. He added that he was unsure how the officers would respond if the Yachher family dosen't retract the statements.

Paul Vachher, 25, remains in critical condition at St. Joseph Hospital's intensive care unit in Ypsilanti, according to his father.

The union letter states that the "actions of the officers was clearly justified" in light of the fact that Vachher had the "clear intent to maim if not kill the police," when he threw a knife at one of the Canton Police officers.

The younger Vachher suffered three wounds during the incident, the family said.

Vachhers' letter said Canton Police, and other agencies which assisted, could have subdued the man without shooting him and that police overtreacted during the three-hour long early-morning incident.

The POAM letter denies that police made "no attempt to talk with Paul (Vachher) or to reason with him," as the Vachher family stated. The letter said police "pled with your son to drop the knives and surrender."

The Vachher family's press release "contradicts" statements made by the family to witnesses and police at the time of the incident, the POAM letter states.

The officers involved in the incident have been exposed to "public hatred, contempt and ridicule," according to the tetter. "The defamation of these officers has caused them serious and irreparable harm."

Senior Rob Kowalski (8-2) relieved in the third inning and the Rocks tied the game in the fourth inning, and took the lead with a run in the fifth to make the score 5-4. Farmington, however, scored an unearned run in the sixth to tie the game and then scored in the bottom of the seventh to win and hand Kowalski his second loss of the year, both coming at the hands of Farmington.

Kowalski, an All Lakes division pitcher, was named pitcher of the year at the team banquet Monday night. He led the team in victories, while Paluk had the team's lowest earned run average (2.01).

Darin Thompson, an 11-year-old goalkeeper for the Livonia-based Vardar III 78 Little Caesars Premiere soccer team, helped his team win the State Cup tournament in the 12 and under category Sadurday in Livonia.

The West Middle School student, who is just finishing up sixth grade, was in goal for the team's 1-0 victory over Livonia-Wayne. Teammate Mike Minicilli scored the only goal of the game.

The Vardar team is coached by Morris Lupence, who is the Marion High School girls soccer coach and an assistant coach at Oakland University.

The 16 team members include boys from all over metro Detroit: Jeff Backus, Ali Curtis, Louie Gavriloski, Tim Guest, Marko Jovanovic, Richie Keith, Ryan Kyes, and Minicilli. And Tony Moucoulis, Sammy Piraine, Jason Roy, Todd Smith, Thompson, Jeff Urbats, Chris Wasen, and Corey Woolfolk.

Thompson started playing soccer after his parents, Allan and Sue Thompson, signed him up for a Westland YMCA team when he was four years old. He then played for the Plymouth-Canton recreation leagues before joining the Vardar team two years ago. "I've been playing goal for the two years I've been in Premiere," said Thompson, whose older brother, Derek, is on the Salem soccer team as stopper and center half. "I plan on playing soccer at least through the end of high school.

"I've always played soccer," he added. "I used to play basketball but I don't anymore. I like all sports -especially tennis and golf -- but soccer is my favorite."

Vardar III 78 won the national indoor soccer tournament sponsored by Soccer Kick in Atlanta, GA over Memorial Day weekend. In the tournament, the team dominated, allowing only one goal while scoring 37. Thompson, who did not allow a goal in the tournament, won the tournament's most valuable goalkeeper award, Keith won the tournament MVP award, and Curtis won the scoring title with eight goals in six games.

In order to win the 18-team national tournament, the team had to defeat regional champion teams from across the country.

In their first igame, the Vardar III 78 team defeated the Rockdale Rockers from Rockdale, GA, 7-0; In other games, the Little Caesars team defeated the San Raphael (CA) Stompers, 9-0; DerBullen (Oklahoma City) 6-0 and 5-0; and Oakwood Select (Glastonbury, CT) 7-1. Vardar III 78 won the tournament by defeating the KY 102 Rockers from Wichita, 3-0 in the finals.

The Vardar team had advanced to the nationals by defeating teams from across Michigan, Toronto and London, Ontario, and Cleveland, to win their regional.

"I play year-round," said Thompson, who has also traveled to tournaments in Virginia and Washington D.C. in the past. "We practice two or three times a week and play a couple times a week usually."

At the present, Thompson's team is in first place in spring soccer. This summer the team will practice and play in tournamients before fall soccer begins, then it's on to indoor soccer in the winter.

And when he has some extra time, Thompson will play on the Canton teams as a guest player.

Thompson, who stops opponents cold when he's in goal, doesn't have any secret formula for success, it just seems to follow his team.

"We've just always been number one in our league," Thompson added. "We practice and, in a game, I just try my hardest."

Which seems to be more than enough to win.
