school issues have attracted attention more often than most others in The Plymouth-Canton-Community. During the past year, the contested March 1997 school bond; district labor relations; Proposal A; the MEAP test; and the location for a third high school at CEP have helped shape local news. The October bond to build a new middle school and buy buses sits on the horizon.

Such issues have inspired community debate and emotional testimony from audiences at School Board meetings.

They did not inspire much of an increase in voter turnout.

This year, 5 per cent of registered voters cast ballots in the board election; just under 4 per cent voted last year and in 1996.

Despite this trend, "you've still got to think of what's best for the community at large, even though the community at large doesn't support you," Davis said.

Among the projects Davis says she'll pursue in the coming term is a new alternative high school to replace the Starkweather Center. She also said she would like to hear more about locations other than Joy and Beck roads for a third high school.

"I've heard why it will work, but I haven't heard why it wouldn't work at another spot," she said. "I've only heard that it won't."

Davis says that an "air of compulsion" in the district has ruled-out the exploration of other sites. "I think there's a loss of creative

Schools in court:

N'ville Twp. sues district over new high school

Judges hear appeal of Vorva's dismissed case

BY BRYON MARTIN

The soil in Western Wayne County is proving tough to turn when it comes to building new high schools.

As the Plymouth-Canton School District entered yet another phase in the lawsuit slowing construction of its new high school, Northville Public Schools were drawn into a lawsuit which may impede that district's \$40 million project.

Construction of a new Northville high school was set to begin last week, but an injunction filed in Wayne County Circuit Court by Northville Township charges the district has refused to follow local ordinances

in its plans

A hearing on the injunction is scheduled for Friday at the 35th District Court. According to Township Supervisor Karen Woodside, Gov. John Engler has agreed to help mediate the dispute, too.

The school would be built on a 48-acre parcel on Six Mile Road, between Beck and Sheldon, and would replace the district's aging high school in The City of Northville.

The township says 48 acres is too crowded, especially with the Woods of Edenderry subdivision next door. That subdivision was built on 77 acres the district

Jessie W. Hudson, called by some "the mother of Plymouth-Canton Schools' fine arts program," has died at age 84.

Many Plymouth-Canton Community artisans were taught by Jessie or learned from those who were. "Old Plymouth High School" often saw many after-hours students still painting, drawing, sculpting in Jessie's classroom long after other students went home.

City may spend \$150,000 on a high-tech State Police radio system designed to wow, if not work

Michigan State Police tout their digital dispatch system like it's the Cadillac of radios, but some who have been using it might say it's more like an exploding Pinto.

And as Brighton police and other departments express their regrets after a rough ride with the system, The City of Plymouth has earmarked \$150,000 in the 1998–99 budget to bring it here.

The 800 megahertz digital dispatch system would replace the City's VHS system, now on its last legs.

"It's a very old system," said Bob Scoggins, Plymouth City police chief. "We're in the last few years we're going to get out of it." The lifetime of most dispatch systems is around 15 years, he said, which is how old the City's system is now.

The State Police system operates on an 800 megahertz frequency that all police will soon use. According Scoggins, a federal mandate will require enforcement agencies to be on digital 800 megahertz systems by the year 2002. State Police said most departments still operate on system that dates back to the

"Everybody's behind on the upgrade," Scoggins said. Many police departments, like the City's, use older, technologically limited systems. "This would put us well into the future."

Ideally, the digitally based system would allow police to communicate with other departments more easily and over much greater distances, Scoggins said.

It would also allow police, fire and other users to talk on the same line, an obvious

advantage during emergencies.

Eventually, digital information such as police reports saved in computers could be transmitted directly from the station to a cruiser on the move. This could help officers during calls for service, save time and help reduce data errors, according to Scoggins.

The state has committed \$187 million in infrastructure spending, mostly on building the 181 towers that would link all radios on the system across Michigan. City officers could radio back to the station while on business hundreds of miles away from Plymouth — in theory.

In practice, however, the radios "sound like you're underwater," according to Sgt. Tee Rayment of Brighton Police.

Brighton has been on the State Police system for about a year, he said. "We

would've never bought into this system if we'd known how ineffective they are."

Rayment said before his department purchased the radios, State Police told them they would be "90 per cent effective 100 per cent of the time.

"Now they tell us that reliability doesn't apply to the portables," he said.

Portable radios, the "walkie-talkies" officers carry, don't work on the State System unless they're used out in an open area, according to Rayment. Mobile radios, those mounted in police cruisers, have worked better.

"It's hard to understand paying \$3,500 per portable for them not to work," he said.

Brighton's portable radios don't work well because there are no relay towers in

McCotter, Patterson to sue for 'Super Majority' issue

Elections commission dropped proposal from ballot

The two Wayne County Commissioners representing The Plymouth-Canton Community are leading a charge to sue the Wayne County Elections Commission, they announced late Tuesday.

According to County Commissioner Thaddeus McCotter, the Elections Commission voted not to place a "Super Majority" tax limitation question on the ballot for Aug. 4. That resolution, passed 8 to 7 by the full county board last Spring, would require two-thirds of the county commissioners and 60 per cent of the voters approve any county tax hike.

McCotter said the Election Commission refused to place the referendum on the ballot because the members felt it was unconstitutional. "They don't have the power to do that," he insisted.

He said he and County Commissioners Bruce Patterson and Kathleen Husk decided to sue the Elections Commission to compel them to add the resolution.

Ironically, the chair of the Elections Commission is Chief Wayne County Probate Judge Milton Mack who once held Patterson's County Commission seat.







A fifth grader at Saint Raphael Elementary School in Garden City, Hynes said he continued with the contest serendipitously.


"I didn't really think I would win." Hynes said. "But someone else in the class who I'm always competing against bet me \$50 that his speech was better than mine."

City wants options open

Livingston County, according to State Police. Of the 181 towers planned, 30 are now standing.

One of them is located at the former State Police post on Seven Mile Road in Northville, about four miles north of the Plymouth Township Police department.

Despite this relatively short distance, reception on portable radios was "absolutely horrid" when the Township tested them, according to Lt. Bob Smith. "We were all set to (join the system), but we found out it doesn't work."

According to Chief Lawrence Carey "it really didn't pass our requirements for reliability"

Cpt. Jeff Steffle, commander of the State Police communications department, said the radios didn't work in Plymouth because their signals have to hit a dish on the Northville tower. That dish faces north, he said, not south toward the Township.

Steffle said the State Police "haven't encouraged anyone to come on until we get the bugs worked out of the system." Adapting the Northville tower to pick up signals from the south is a project under way but still down the road, he said.

Township police radios already operate on an 800 megahertz frequency, but on an analog system. Upgrading to digital would cost about \$50,000 according to Carey.

A move to the State Police system hasn't been ruled out, he said, but it's not

one he wants to make now.

Although the City Commission has directed him to pursue hooking up to the State Police system, Scoggins says he's going to wait. He has more research to do, he said, before any commitment is made.

The City wants to keep its options open, according to City Manager Steve Walters. Even with the bugs it has now, the state system may end up the best option since all departments will have to be on 800-megahertz frequencies within four years.

According to the budget, which takes effect next month, the City has two other options: replace the current VHS system with a new one, or consolidate with Township dispatch and buy the analog 800-megahertz radios they use.

According to Walters, the City could also buy their own digital 800-megahertz system independent of the state or Township.

But that wouldn't make sense, he said, since merger with the Township dispatch is still an option being investigated. "The idea is to stay flexible," he said.

Whichever system the City selects, Walters said he expects a decision within the next year.

In that time, he and Scoggins are hopeful the State Police will work out the bugs in their system.

Until then the City will keep using its older VHS dispatch which, while no Cadillac, hasn't blown up yet.


It was his signature that is holding the process up, according to Hopkins. Prendergast did not return calls for

For 32 years, the Tom James Company has claimed to manufacture and sell only the finest quality clothing.


With about \$250 million annually in sales, it could be the biggest business you've never heard of.

And, although the company maintains offices in places such as London, New York, Beverly Hills, Tokyo and Detroit, you won't find a Tom James store in a mall or commercial outlet.

That's because Tom James' salesmen bring the store to you.

Plymouth's Thys Jones is one such salesman. Armed with a sample of fabrics and an arsenal of catalogues, Jones meets clients wherever they ask him to, whether it be home, office, or even, as on one occasion, a boat.

"People like it because they don't have to spend a lot of time shopping," Jones said. "Any type of clothing they could find in a mall I can bring to them, and I can show them in 10 minutes what they wouldn't be



able to find in 10 stores."

Suits range in price from about \$300 to more than \$10,000, Jones said.

sold to developers in 1993.

Now, the township charges, the district's plans make unsafe adjustments to accommodate the new school.

According to a series of letters between Township Hall and the School Board offices, ordinances governing tree protection, lighting, landscaping, proximity to housing and land use density are at the heart of the debate.

Joan Wadsworth, president of the Northville School Board, says the plans meet with standards set for high school construction. They also meet some local ordinances, though Wadsworth says the schools are under no obligation to do so.

State officials approved the plans while reviewing the bond proposal earlier this year, she said.

Whether local ordinances have jurisdiction over public schools has been a question for years, one Engler has agreed to help answer.

Woodside said she asked the Governor for his opinion on the issue during a meeting of Western Wayne County administrators Friday.

"He called Monday and said he would work through his local office and with the State Superintendent of Schools to hopefully resolve this issue," she said.

The judges could decide to uphold Rashid's decision, send the case back to circuit court for retrial or require another action, such as a new election.

Boak said a decision from the judges could come in late August or September.

Both Vorva and school spokesperson Judy Evola described the judges as efficient and direct during their interviews. The lack of dramatic testimony, as was seen in circuit court, was noteworthy Evola said.

Echoing pre-election statements, Mardigian says she will concentrate on promoting the October bond to build a Canton middle school, and on resolving the March 1997 bond lawsuit

Sale of that bond has been on hold since last summer when Jerry Vorva first challenged the election, in which 716 votes were miscast. The lawsuit was dismissed from circuit court in the fall, and is now being appealed. (See related story.)

Meanwhile, Mardigian says, students face crowded CEP as they move into the district.

"We've got to go for that fall 2000 opening (of the third high school), otherwise what are we going to do with those kids," she said.

Watts also stood his campaign planks and says he wants to maintain the open dialogue begun in the last year between the board and district labor.

Watching as precinct totals came in at the district offices Monday night, Richard Ham-Kucharski kept a positive view of his first race for the board, and his first loss.

"The election was a lot of fun," he said. "I learned a lot about the district."

Ham-Kucharski said he will work for the October bond and may be back for another run in a year or two.

"I knew it'd be a close race, but I thought I'd be a little closer. I should have pushed more for absentee voters, because it looks like

that's where I did the best."

Precincts: The numbers

Davis won in nine of the district's 18 precincts. Watts took six. Sheila Friedrich, the only candidate not present at the district offices Monday, won four.

Unopposed, Mardigian won her race in all precincts.

Ham-Kucharski did not win in any of the precincts or among absentee voters.

In the two-year race, 43 voters wrote in candidates; five write-ins were cast for the four-year seat.

In the four-year race there were 543 undervotes, according to Liz Adams, district elections clerk; 601 were cast in the two-year race.

Undervotes occur when a voters casts a ballot without completing all the votes possible. Those who chose to vote for only one candidate in the four-year race instead of two cast undervote ballots.

Some 716 undervotes were recorded in the March 1997 bond election and led to the lawsuit that has tied up that bond in court.

The March bond was a single-issue ballot, meaning that undervote ballots had no vote on them at all — so-called "lost" votes. Unlike the March election, Monday's undervotes don't suggest voter error, according to Adams.

When candidates run unopposed, as Mardigian did for the two-year seat, voters sometimes won't vote for anyone, according to Adams. "But they weren't lost votes," she

Chiefs win regionals

Hudson leads way again as Canton drops No.1-ranked Brighton; Chiefs now advance to state's elite eight

From here on out it will only get tougher. Or will it?

How much tougher could it be than Saturday afternoon?

The Chiefs were squaring off with Brighton, the state's number one ranked team with a 31-4 record, on Brighton's home turf. Brighton had shutout a solid West Bloomfield team 2-0 just hours before, and was hungry for more.

Canton had squeaked by Walled Lake Western, 2-1, in yet another defensive struggle, and their ace pitcher, Gretchen Hudson, had a "little injury" that could affect her play, according to Coach Jim Arnold.

Brighton had the experience, having made it to the state championship a year before. Canton was young. This was supposed to be their rebuilding year.

All factors pointed to a Canton defeat. All factors, that is, but one.

"They don't think there is anybody they can't play against," said Assistant Coach Larry Bober. "They think they can beat anybody."

And the young upstarts proved it Saturday, knocking off Brighton 3-2 in a stirring 11-inning game. Despite her injury, Hudson again led the way, pitching all 11 innings for the Chiefs, allowing only two runs on eight hits and a walk. She struck out seven.

It was a see-saw battle the whole way. Canton notched the game's first run in the fourth, and another in the fifth. Brighton fought back with a pair of runs in the sixth to tie it.

"(Brighton's) a very agrressive team," Bober said. "They tried to take advantage of every opportunity they could."

But with a stingy defense behind her, Hudson prevented those opportunities from coming long enough for Canton to get one more run.

It finally came in the 11th. With two out and Paula McKernan on second, Sarah Freels smashed a bullet "that almost knocked off the third basemen's head," according to Bober. The ball fell into left field and McKernan came around to score the eventual winning run.

Brighton threatened again in the bottom of the inning, but a double play ended the game, and Brighton's hopes for a second straight championship appearance.

Beside Freels, Liz Elsner and freshman

Kristina Kissel led the way offensively for the Chiefs. Elsner contributed an RBI and Kissel, a mid-season pull-up, went 2-4 with an RBI.

"She's a real dynamite fielder," Bober said of the freshman. "But lately she's been work-

Defensively, the Chiefs were again stellar. Although they committed two errors—their first in five games—they weren't affected by them. Bober pointed out the play of catcher Erica Hancz. She didn't throw anybody out," he said. "But she kept their agressive runners

New Canton football coach says conditioning is key

He's faced an uphill gridiron battle before.

When Tim Baechler took over Hudson High School's football program seven years ago they had been a pathetic 1-26 in the three years previous. In his first year he nearly got them to .500. In the next four years, they lost only eight more games, and won several league championships.

Now Baechler is looking to do the same thing with Canton. After Coach Bob Knoenle's unexpected retirement last month, Baechler now faces the challenges of rebuilding a team that went 1-8 last year.

Hoping to build agility and strength in his players, Baechler said he'll institute a weightlifting program this summer, three days a week.

"I'll make it mandatory without saying it's mandatory," he said.

Baechler added that no special favors will be made for star players. "I'm new here," he said. "And as far as I'm concerned, there are no starters. If a kid was a fifth-string player last year, that doesn't mean he can't start for us this year."

Baechler admitted that one of the most difficult aspects of coaching, particularly in a rebuilding program, is making players think like victors.

"I don't think anybody has ever put it in a bottle. It's hard to teach kids to win," he said. "If it's 4th and three, you want kids who want to make the play. But you can't have those kinds of expectations and feelings unless you work hard at it."

Besides confidence, the off-season conditioning should also help Baechler's plans for the offense. "I want to run the football," he said. "I never get bored of watching our fullback run for three yards. That's a good football play."

Whalers reload with Vernarsky

Plymouth gets center they wanted; trade Passmore for veteran

I've seen Plymouth Whalers' Director of Scouting Mike Sadler in hundreds of rinks over the last 15 years. We were in one of those rinks a couple of years ago when Sadler—who has an excellent eye for talent and isn't prone to overstatement said, "I got a player for you—the best player I've seen to come out of Detroit since Pat Peake. His name is KrisVernarsky."

So it should be no surprise that the Whalers used their first pick (15th overall) June 6th at the annual Ontario Hockey League Draft at the Barrie Molson Centre to select Vernarsky, a Warren native who played last season for the Ann Arbor-based U.S.A. Under-18 Team.

If the moves the Whalers' scouting staff and general manager Peter DeBoer at the draft are a mirror to the upcoming season, it appears Plymouth will make another run for a Western Division title. After selecting Vernarsky, the Whalers concentrated on filling specific needs, taking three goaltenders, five defensemen and eight forwards.

In addition, Plymouth traded popular second-year center Brian Passmore and a fourth round pick in the draft to Oshawa in exchange for veteran sniper Adam Colagiacomo. The Whalers also lost third-year defensemen Pat Parthenais in the expansion draft to the Brampton Battalion.

Passmore's trade helps clear up a Whaler log jam at the center ice.

With Dave Legwand, Harold Druken and Vernarsky all centers—and having no legitimate right-handed shooting right wingers—DeBoer felt it was best to move Passmore to a young team on the rise in exchange for Colagiacomo, a San Jose draft with a track record for scoring (78 goals with 90 assists over three OHL seasons).

"You can't trade for players like A d a m Colagiacomo without giving something up," DeBoer e x p l a i n e d . "Unfortunately (the




price) was Brian Passmore. If Passmore had been a winger, there's no doubt we wouldn't have traded him - he's a great kid. But with Legwand, Druken and Vernarsky up the middle there was no way Brian deserved or was willing to play a fourth-line role for us again next year. He's going to Oshawa and get a chance to play and be a number one or two guy, which he's earned. And we get a right wing we sorely needed."

Colagiacomo - taken fourth overall by London in 1995 - is excited to be back in the Western Division on a team that has a chance to win.

"This team's a lot older than I'm used to," Colagiacomo said. "I've always been on a real young team. Hopefully, we can play for the Memorial Cup in Plymouth. I just want to go out this year and help the team win. It's a fresh start and I'm coming somewhere where there's a lot of winning-tradition. They know how to win."

Cynics say Colagiacomo has underachieved. The truth is, he's never scored less than 25 goals in a season. He has Memorial Cup experience, helping Oshawa to the OHL championship in 1997. Colagiacomo will be closely watched by San Jose, who have a year to decide to sign him to a professional contract.

But the trade for Colagiacomo started with the acquisition of Vernarsky, who

scored 11 goals with 18 assists for 29 points and 97 penalty minutes for Team USA last season.

Vernarsky was surprised to hear Sadler's comment.

"I'm very shocked. I just go out and play my best every shift and work hard. I'm very thankful that people think of myethat way," Vernarsky said. "I like to play both ways of the game - the grinding and offensive part. I don't mind getting into the scruffs and I don't mind scoring goals."

Vernarsky's father, Steve, used to flood the backyard for all three of his sons, Mike (21), Ryan (15) and Kris (16). Kris is a veteran of the Detroit amateur system, starting in novice leagues in Fraser and moving up from there.

"We knew early on that Kris had a special drive," Steve Vernarsky said. "We knew that he could be successful because of that inner drive that some kids don't show. Each year Kris took it to a new level. Early on, the college route was considered, but a couple of years ago Kris really wanted to become an NHLer and felt this was the best way to go. As parents we try to support him and give him the best

opportunity we can."

"We think we got the best player in the draft in Vernarsky," DeBoer said.

In the second round, the Whalers took grinding left wing Kyle Chapman, from Stoufville (Ontario) Jr. A. Chapman smiled when asked about skating with skilled players like Legwand, Druken, Vernarsky and Colagiacomo.

Long files charges against **Boulerice**

Injured hockey player Andrew Long has filed felonious assault charges against Plymouth Whaler forward Jesse Boulerice for an on-ice stick-slashing incident that occurred April 17 at Compuware Sports Arena, according to Plymouth Township Police.

The incident left Long with facial fractures, a blood clot, and a severe concussion. He spent two days in the hospital following the incident and was unable to play the rest of the season.

At first Long said he hadn't expected to file a complaint, but after viewing a video tape of the game he changed his mind.

"I had no clue it was that bad," Long said. "I thought maybe it was just a reaction. But after viewing the tape, I saw that it was much more careless than that."

Long also said getting his health back was the main priority. "My father and I agreed I should just get better first," he said. "It was really rough after it happened. One minute I would be all right, and the next minute it was like someone turned the switch off on me."

In filing the charges, Long sent a written statement of the incident to Plymouth Township Police last week.

"Next think I knew I was fighting for my life," he said about the moments following the slash. "I didn't really know what happened, but I knew I was in a lot of trouble. I was choking on my own blood and my nose was broken.

Scouting rankings last year - I just went out and played my best and whatever happens, happens. I'm a defensive, stay-at-home defensemen. I'd watch the Whalers after our games last year and it was really nice to play in the same rink."

The Whalers took the first of three goaltenders in the fourth round when they selected Dwayne Bateman from Trenton (Ontario) Jr. A with the 67th overall pick. At 18-years-old, Bateman is older than most picks in the early rounds and is expected to compete in training camp with holdovers Scott Holsinger and Brandon Sacco for playing time in goal.

DeBoer was happy after Plymouth's first four choices in the draft. "I don't think we could have predicted the selections any better," he said. "We got three players in the top three rounds we feel can step in and play right away, which is rare. And we thought we got the best-prepared goaltender available in Bateman, which is mandatory on our team with Robert Esche graduating. He's a big goaltender, like Esche, who covers a lot of net. He took his fourthplace team to his league's finals last year, so that says he a playoff

Looking for additional depth in goal, the Whalers took Robert Zepp (Newmarket Jr.A) in the 5th round and Mike Betz (Pittsburgh Hornets midget) in the 11th round.

In what was considered a weak draft by many scouts, the Whalers look to fill out the depth chart in the later rounds. Plymouth's most intriguing pick was re-selecting last year's second round pick, Jeff Jillson, in the 10th round (210th overall). Jillson is slated to play for the University of Michigan next season, but in drafting him again, the Whalers retain Jillson's OHL rights should he decide to play junior hockey.

Jillson's re-selection is the first time the Whalers have ever drafted a player twice.

Next up for the Whalers: The National Hockey League Entry Draft, held Saturday, June 27th in Buffalo at the Midland Marine Arena. Whalers centerman David Legwand is expected to be taken first or second overall.






