### CONSTITUTION AND OUR FLAG

Judge Estee of the U. S. Supreme Court Renders a Decision.

#### FORMER DON'T FOLLOW FLAG.

The Four Paterson, N. J., Flends Hav Been Indicted-A Mine Explosion in West Virginia Caused 14 Deuths-Spain Trepared for Trouble.

Active Scouting in the Philippine

According to a dispatch from Manila the week past was devoted to active scouting. The insurgents, having failed to crush a single garrison, are now experiencing a reaction. Lieuts. Wilson and Dority of the 45th volunteer infantry, destroyed large stores of four granaries and a barracks men of the 37th volunteer infantry, attacked 190 insurgents under Col. Val-encia, recovering two American prisoners and captured a considerable quantity of ammunition and supplies native orchestra lured the troops from their quarters near Dagu-pan while the insurgents attacked the rear, killing two Americans and wounding three. Senor Baencamino, representing the

principal ax-insurgents in Maniis, has requested Judge Ta t to forward to Washington a signed expression of their loyalty.

Spain Prepared for Trouble. A dispatch from Bourg-Madame, Eastern Pyvanees, France, dated the 3d. says: Spanish officers and soldiers on vacations have been ordered to rejour their regiments immediately. The carbineers in the vicinity of the French border have been ordered to retreat upon Puycerda at the first warning. A column of infantry and detachments of cavalry have been ordered to Puycerda and Sao De Urgel.

Another dispatch from Madrid bearing the same date says the situation is calmer. 

Harvard's Great Electric Plant,

Prof. John Trowbridge has recently had installed at Harvard university the most powerful apparatus in the world for the production of electro-motive force. The plant comprises 20,000 stor-ings dells giving 40,000 electrical units of pressure, and this can be increased to 3,000,000 volta. But in order to ebtain the full effect of so enormous a pressure, Prof. Trowbridge says it would be necessary to remove the apparatus into the center of an open from the ground in order to avoid loss from the inductive action of floors and walls. 

Harnessing a Waterfait.
The harnessing of one of Sweden's large waterfalls has just been accom-plished. The water power lies at Quarnsveden and the electric current is conveyed to Domnarfeet, about three miles distant. The power station, ginerators, cables and transformers are all from German houses. For conveying this current 46,000 pounds of copper wire is used. The waterfall, which is one of the most powerful and continuous in the kingdom, is estimated to contain 18,000 horse power, 8,000 of which is utilized to operate the saw-mills of the company, while 10,000 is used for the generation of the electric current.

Squahine and Sugar.

The experiments of the French grape growers in Algeria have shown that too much sunshine is unfavorable for the making of good wine. In the more temperate climate of France grapes possess a proper proportion of sugar to acid for wine-making, but the hot Algerian sunshine induces so active an assimilation by the vines that the quantity of acid is reduced and that of augar increased. In consequence the wine makers of Alger's are driven to many devices for improving the flavor and lasting qualities of their





#### JAMAICA FROGS

Seven of One Hundred and Fift

Survivo Sea Voyage. The bloiogical department of the Johns Hopkins University has a num-ber of interesting specimens of zoology, some of which will be of value in the higher research work more Sun. The summer vacation is usually a time for collecting queer creatures and plants for winter in-vestigation, a students' trip to Jamaica last summer being especiaaly productive of such rarities. Dr. Lawproductive of such rarities. Dr. Law-rence E. Giffin and Mr. W. C. Coker left last June for Jamaica. Among other things they collected 150 bullfrogs. They were unable to stand the voyage to this country, and the seven that survived are now at the university in an emaciated condition Jamaica product is not a real bullfrog. but a toad. They were brought to Jamaica from Barbadoes under the Jamaica from Barbadoes under the impression that they would kill rats. This was found to be a mistake, and the toad remained and is now quite common. They are of a dark brown color, with a body the size of a large builtrog, but with short legs like a toad, and are not edible. Like all toads, they are not aquatic. A handsome feature of the Jamaica collection is a set of fine tortice shell trailer. is a set of fine tortoise shell turtles all beautifully mounted. A crocodile skelcton was also procured, which will prove an object study for the minor classes in osteology. The Jamaica crocodile is more vicious than the Florida variety, living on fish or an occasional native who is unwary. It is also not so sluggish as other varieties, and is peculiar in having no sleeping time
