Jas. S. Ayres, a Michigan Boy, Murdered at the Capital A Woman in the Case

She Makes a Complete Confession-Attempted Assault Responsible She Says

Michigan Boy Murdered at the Capital James S. Ayers, aged 21, of Port Austin, who was employed as a clerk in the census office at Washington, was found dead in his room in the Kenmore hotel, acar the capitol, on the morning of the 15th. A revolver

containing three empty chambers was found near the body. The contents of the cartridges were later found in the dead man's body. One entered his left leg, another his left arm and the third one penetrated his breast in the region one penetrated his breast in the region of his heart. The murder theory is now being advanced, and it is alleged there was a woman in the case.

Later-The invstery which has at-tended the murder of young Ayers was solved on the 20th by a voluntary con-fession of Mrs. Lulu I. Bonnie, a married woman and a guest at the hotel. She says that the three shots which ended Ayers' life had been fired in a which struggle between herself and Ayers She also dec ared that he had m de an improper proposal to her and threat-ened her, and a scuffle ensued in which Ayers was shot.

Weather Crop Balletin.

The weekly weather crop bulletin of the U. S. climate and crop service, issued at Lansing on the 21st, says that in most sections of the state rainfall has been sufficient, but in the extreme southeastern counties of the lower peninsula the conditions are alwost droughty. Several sharp frosts occurred, which were quise general, hut the damage, in nearly all cases, was very light, and in most counties confined to low lands; strawberries, early gurden truck and early potatoes were affected most; in the extreme southern counties some early corn was cut down and will have to be replanted Wheat and meadows are generally im Wheat and meadows are generally im-provel; wheat continues very uneven, some fields being reported in fine con-dition, while others are very poor; oats and barley look healthy, have gener-ally made slow growth. Pasturage has improved. Rye is heading and in general promising condition. Early potatoes have gereintated nicely. Plow-ing for corn and beans is well ad-vanced in most counties of the lower reminsula; corn planting is oute genpeninsula; corn planting is quite gen-eral and in the extreme southern coun-tics nearly fini-hed; sugar beet seeding is well advanced and in Monroe count the early seeding is up, and being oul-tivated. With but very few exceptions, correspondents report that fruit prospects continue very good.

Explosion in a Mine Killed Six Men

Va, on the 15th. The miners work at a level of 253 feet below the surface. Fiftmen were assigned to a portion of the mine that has been worked for some time and the remainder were put to work on headings quite a distance away. One of the men in the rooms, it is alleged, had smuggled a torch into the mines as it gives a much better light than the safety lamps prescribed by the company. This is the most seri-ous explosion that ever occurred in the Fairmount coal region.

The Acquittal of Professor

Eastman. The acquittal of Prot. Charles R. Eastman of Harvard University of the charge of murdering his brother-inlaw, closes one of the most remarkable murder trials in the history of juris-prudence. The circumstances of the shooting, the high standing of the defendant in the educational and social world and the strange ante-mo tem allegations of the brother-in-law as he ay mortally wounded by a bullet fired during a Fourth of July target practice—all served to invest the trial with intense dramatic interest.

The verdict of acquittal in this case a somewhat remarkable considering he weight of purely circumstantial evidence with the average American jury when adroitly and powerfully handled by a lawyer of Attorney Gen-eral Knowlton's eloquence and abl'ity. But fortunately for American jur's prudence and justice the jury considered and weighed the testimony of witnesses and not the fervent orato y of Mr. Knowiton. To have convicted Eastman under such circumstantial evidence would have been a blot upin the jurisprudence of the old Bay State. In such a cost as this the ends of justice and of humanity are best served by giving the defendant the benefit of the doubt which any impartial student of the case must con-cede was present in every detail of the trial and which the state could not re-

If the accused in this case could have been hanged for murder the life of no person would be safe, no matter how remote might be his connection with a fatality. The bullet that killed Richard Grogan was no doubt fired from Eastman's revolver, but these was not sufficient evidence adduced to refute the claim that the killing was accidental

Was there ever a better illustration of what was true then and is true now-that that which is innocent may be made destructive?

What of a worldly nature is more important and strengthening and in-nocent than amusement, and yet what has counted more victims? I have no sympathy with a straightjacket relig-This is a very bright world to and I propose to do all I can to make it bright for others. I never could keep step to a dead march. A book years ago issued says that a Christian man has a right to some amusements. For instance, if he comes home at night weary from his work and feeling the need of recreation, puts on his slippers and goes into his garret and walks lively round the floor several times there can be no harm in it. I believe the church of God made a great mis take in trying to suppress the sportfulness of youth and drive out from men their love of amusement. If God ever implanted anything in us, he implanted this desire. But instead of providing this demand of our nature the church of God has for the main part ignored it. As in a riot the mayor plants a battery at the end of the street and has it fired off, so that every thing is cut down that happens to stand in the range, the good as well as the bad, so there are men in the church who plant their batteries of condemnation and fire away indiscriminately. Everything is condemned. But Paul the apostle commends those who use the world without abusing it. and in the natural world God has done everything to please and amuse us. In poetic figure we sometimes speak we sometimes speak of natural objects as being in pain, but it is a mere fancy. Poets say the clouds weep, but they never yet shed a tear, and that winds sigh, but they never "id have trouble, and that the storm nowls, but it never lost its temper. I project certain principles by which you may judge in regard to any amusement or recreation, finding out for yourself whether it is right or wrong. Our recreations are intended to build us up and if they pull us down as to our moral as well as to our physical strength you may come to the conclusion that they are obnoxious.

Live Within Yoar Means. Still further, those amusements are wrong which lead you into expenditure beyond your means. Money spent in ferresting is not those on the ferre recreation is not thrown away. It is all folly for us to come from a place of amusement feeing that we have wast-ed our money and time. You may by it have made an investment worth more than the transaction that yield ed you, hundreds of thousands of dol-lars. But how many properties have But how many properties have

been riddled by costly amusemonts. The first time I ever saw the city-it was the city of Philadelphia-I was mere lad. I stopped at a hotel, and I remember in the eventide one of these men plied me with his infernal art. He saw I was green. He wanted to show me the sights of the town. 
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
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

Nothing is more difficult in marketing than to tell whether a fish has been properly killed. It should be killed as oon as taken from the water, but too frequently it is allowed to gasp itself by right, too, with the advantages to death and then treated so as to ap that Western Canada offers to those pear properly slaughtered. The only absolutely safe way is to buy a live fish and have it killed before one's from whose letter we quote goes on to eyes. This is not always practicable, but there are certain rules which, if observed, will result in the purchaser getting fish of good quality. 


