

CONGRESSIONAL NEWS.

The long heralded Neill-Reynolds report on the conditions at the Chi-cago packing houses was sent to congress by the president. With it came a message urging that the Beveridge meat inspection bill be passed as a means of remedying the conditions said to exist in Packingtown.

Orders Further Investigation.

When my attention was first directed to this matter an investigation law was made under the bureau of animal industry of the department of agri-culture. When the preliminary state-ments of this investigation were brought to my attention they showed such defects in the law and such wholly unexpected conditions that I deemed it best to have a further im-mediate investigation by men not conwholly nected with the bureau, and according appointed Messrs. Reynolds and ill. It was impossible under the existing law that satisfactory work should be done by the bureau of animal industry. I am now, however, examining the way in which the work examining the way actually was done.

Before I had received the report of Messrs. Reynolds and Neill I has rected that labels placed upon had di any package of meat food products should state only that the carcass of the animal from which the meat was taken had been inspected at the time of slaughter. If inspection of meat food products at all stages of preparation is not secured by the passage of the legislation recommended I shall feel compelled to order that inspection la-bels and certificates on canned prod-ucts shall not be used hereafter.

Packing Houses Unreasonably Dirty.

The report shows that the stock The report shows that the stork yards an packing houses are not kept even reasonably clean, and that the method (of handling and preparing food products is unchanty and dan-gerous to health. Unler existing law the national government has no pow-er to enforce inspection of the many forms of prepared meet food products forms of prepared mest food products that are daily going from the packing houses into interstate commerce. Ow-ing to an inadequate appropriation the department of agriculture is not even able to place invectors in all comblishments desiring them. The present law prožibits the shipment of uninspected meat to foreign countries, but there is no provision forbidding the shipment of uninspected meats in interstate commerce, and thus the ave-nues of interstate commerce are left open to traffic in diseased or spolled If, as has been alleged on meats. means, it, is has been alreged on seemingly good authority, further evils exist, such as the improper use of chemicals and dyes, the government lacks power to remedy them. Spain's King and Queen at a Gory Bull Fight. The royal bull fight Saturday was the climat of the spectacular magnifi-cence attendant on the marriage of King-Alfonso, and for the time being Madrid forgot the horrors of the at-tempt on the lives of the royal couple amid the excitement of the national pastime. It was feared the event would give another opportunity for outrage, but everything passed off aus-piciously. King Alfonso and Queen Vic-toria being continuously the center of popular ovations. Prof. Marvin does not believe the origin of the latest earthquake was on the American continent. There have been more records of earthquakes made this year than in any previous year.

In this field they have come 'into direct competition with a great number of butch-ers who operated in a limited field. The scope of the business of the latter is largely local and the cattle they slaughter come from a limited area in the vicinity of their abattoirs. During the strike of the packing house employ-es it was argued that the cessation of business in the packing centers would be met by an increase of small local establishments and so far as the con-suming public in this country is concerned the big packing establishments would not be missed, although an industry of enormous, proportions would be lost. 



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
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
