RUSSIA AND FRANCE AGAINST GERMANY

RUSSIA PROMISES TO THROW ARMY ON GERMAN'S FLANK AND INVADE AUSTRIA.

WILL TAKE ACTIVE PART WAR IF GERMANY ATTACKS.

France Holds Troops Whose Term Have Expired and Are Gradually Massing Army Near Frontier.

Efforts of Germany and Austria to frive a wedge between France and Russia have utterly failed and if the Moroccan dispute results in war Rus-sia will be found as an active ally of

Moroccan dispute results in war Kussia will be found as an active ally of France.

M. Izvolsky, the Russian ambassador at Paris, has been authorized to tell France that her proposals to Germany are accepted by Russia as involving her full dutles as an ally should Germany follow its rejection by a belligerent act.

It is understood that Russia's strategy in such an event will be to hold a sufficient force on Germany's eastern rear guard as to keep half the German army there while an expeditionary army invades sustria through the North Balkans.

Before the czar left for Kien the German and Austrian ambassadors at St. Petersburg went aboard the royal yacht Standart and bade him a long leave. The farewells were ostensibly friendly but the ambassadors were hiding deep chagrin for they had been unable to carry out successfully a seen-laid and intricate intrigue which unable to carry out successfully a deep-laid and intricate intrigue which it was hoped to give Germany a free band to deal with France alone on land in event of war.



But why only see that their stock of clothes is complete? Clothes do not make the man. It is far more important to see that both mind and body are in the best condition possible for de-

Many a child is forced backwerd toward the foot of the class because of some minor ailment which might be easily corrected by proper treatment.

Do not neglect a child because he seems stupid. Then is the time that he needs attention. Any child who is weak or does not learn easily should be taken to a competent physician who can often find defects in the child, the correction of which will make the child strong and robust both-mentally and

If a child is unable to see properly it cannot be expected to learn its lessons. The concentration and application nec essary to accomplish this is impossible. And yet one-third of the school children are found to suffer from defective vision in various degrees. This is a condition which is easily remedied in majority of cases by proper treatment

One of the common causes of back-ward children are adenoids and tonsils. These are lymphatic growths in the throat which fill up the upper part of the throat and render breathing through the nose difficult or impossible. Such a child has a characteristic facial expression and is known as a mouth breather. Not only is the face affected but backwardness in the development the entire system is also caused. These are readily removed by a slight surgical operation.

A healthy start in life means health, wealth and happiness in later years. See that the child lacks none of the opportunities for this development.

If the child is frail or does not learn readily, look for a cause. There are many minor ailments and defects, the correction of which may be the turning point in the life of your child.

The best is none too good for him. See that no stone is left unturned in bringing the child to a healthy maturity and you will be astonished at the re-

Northville-Plymouth Road Finished

County Road Comm ers Hines Haggerty and Murdock have finished had just left the store g onstruction of a state reward gravel road between Plymouth and Northville, a distance of a little over two miles; with the one mile pre-viously constructed, this finishes the secondary roads connecting up the smaller centers of population in Wayne county to be finished. The entire road, and is the first one of the county to be finished. The steep-hills were cut down so that the grade at no point exceeds 6%, a bad curve straight ened out and the road widened. AMERICA NAMED BY GERMAN

Martin Waldscomuller Published First Map With That Title Given the New World.

In the interesting town of St. Die ly held a celebration of special inter est to the people of this side of the world, and in a lesser degree to Spain and Italy. It was in honor of the four hundredth anniversary of the publica-tion there of the geographical work of Martin Waldseemuller, in which America was suggested as the name of the New World.

There have fleen many theories and much controversy as to the origin of the name America, and not a few have the name America, and not a few have resented the slight which was put upon Columbus in this connection. Some have denounced Amerigo Vespucci—who, like Columbus, was an Italian sailing under the flag of Spain—for "stealing" the glory due the real discoverer.

But the chief wrong, if any was done was committed by the German

But the chief wroag, if any was done, was committed by the German geographer in the book. which was published in 1507, and on the map which he published a year or so later. On that map the name America was applied, however, only to the southern part of the New World. The northern part was called Parias.

It is possible, perhaps probable, that Vespucci, not Columbus, first reached the mainland of America; and it was Vespucci who grasped the important fact that a new continent had been found, and not simply a part of Asia. Of that fact Columbus died in ignor-

But rightly or wrongly, the name of Amerigo Vespucci, trader, traveler and writer, was given to the New World, and given to remain forever. And now a lofty tower rises among the hills of Lorraine to commemorate the suggestion which resulted in the designation.






