The treasury officials, estimating that the population has grown to 95,656,000 up to last Monday, say that a pro rata distribution of this money would give each person \$34,26, or sixcents more than a year ago.

MORE HOSPITALS ARE NEEDED

Situation Improved, but Further Work is Needed to Stamp Out Juberculosis.

Only four states, Rississippi, Nevada, Utah and Wyoming, have no beds whatever in special hospitals or

wards for consumptives. Eight years ago when the National Association for the Study and Prevention of Tubercu-losis was organized, there were 26 states in which no hospital or sanitorium provision for consumptives exist-

rium provision for consumptives existed, and the entire number of beds in the United States was only 10,000.

"While these figures would indicate a remarkable growth in anti-tuberculosis activity," says Dr. Livingston Farrand, executive secretary of the National association, in commenting on the subject, "there are still practically ten indigent consumptives for tically ten indigent consumptives for every one of the 30,000 beds, including those for pay patients. In other words, we have from 250,000 to 300,000 consumptives in this country too poor to provide hospital care for themselves.


