Rep. Pray, of Eston county, has introduced a bill intended to fit in with the Webb interstate shipment act recently passed by congress. The Webb act does not absolutely prohibit the shipment of liquor from a wet state to a dry state, but rather takes away the protection the United States government has herestore given interstate shipments of liquor even after they entered the state and until act-nally delivered to the consignee. Now the state can control all intrastate shipments of liquors.

The purpose of the bill introduced by Rep. Pray is to prevent shipments of liquors whether intrastate or interstate to persons who hold U. S. internal revenue receipts, druggists of course, excepted. It also prohibits persons and transportation companies from keeping Hquors at any other place than a private residence, and contains regulations to prevent shipments in violation of the spirit of the bill. The bill is not aimed at the person, who gets liquor for personal or family use, but the one intends to violate the law.
