Experimental Station for Plymouth

George W. Hood of the horticultural department of the M. A. C. at Lausing, was in town the first of the week and met the committee of the the Tomato Growers Association who had the mather of establishing an experimental station here in charge. It was decided to establish a branch experimental station here for tomato culture, on the farm of George A. Raviller on the Plymouth road. One sore will be devided into plots of ½ sore each and will be devoted to fertilizer experimenta, while another agre will be devided into plot of ½ acre each and devoted to while another acre will be devided inte-plot of ½ a cre each and devoted to spraying experiments for the control of the blight, which has caused consider-able trouble to grawers of tomatoes here. The experiments will be watched with considerable interest by the grow-ers of this vicinity, and there is little doubt but what the establishing of the branch station here will be of great benefit to those interested in tomato culture.
