

Tuberculosis is one of the most serious public health problems of the Orient. Active organizations to fight this disease have been formed in Japan, the Philippines, India and Australia. A movement is on foot for a national organization in China and in a number of cities local work has been started. While no accurate figures are available, those who are in position to know claim that consumption takes annually from 50,000 to 1,000, lives in China alone. In India the death rate is fully as high, and on account of caste distinctions and native superstitions, the problem of prevention and treatment is paculiarly difficult. The Japanese government has taken a hand officially in the control of tuberculosis, and is co-operating with two well-organized private associations. The death rate, while very high, is lower than in China and India. Under the direction of the United States public health service a movement for the prevention of tuberculosis in the Philippines has also been organized.



The lakes of the region where the grebe makes its home are full of large reeds known as tules. For years these plants have filled the shallow ponds, new stalks annually shooting up and forcing down the crop of the previous season until the old reeds are matted into solid floating islands. For its nest the grebe shapes a quantity of tules luto a platform and hollows out the center enough to receive its three or four eggs, Hecause of the incressant raids made on its habitations, the grebe has become very sby. This characteristic coupled with its ability to dive suddenly and remain under the surface for some time, and to swim so low in the water that it is hard to fit with a gun shot, forces the marksman to use a blind in hunting the valuable fowl. 
