# Lessons from the Life of John Huss

On July 6th the church celebrated the 500th anniversary of the martyrdom of John Huss. In that date, 1415, in the city of Constance, Switzerland, where 50,000 church prelates and men of affairs in the courts of Europe were gathered to discuss the problems of church and state, one lohn Huss, deposed rector of the University of Prague and ex-priest of the Bethlehem chapel in Prague was publicly diagraced and condemned to death, on a charge of heresy.
