

Sickened by the atrocities committed upon civilians and soldiers, he deserted after several months service and finally made his way to the United States. His disclosure of the unspeakable crueities perpetrated by the German soldiers, under orders from their officers, is one of the most sensational documents

Russia, England and Italy, the coun-try had as little thought as it did of any participation of the United States. All thought only of the promenade to Paris, which, to the disappointment of the speople, and also, surely to the disappointment of the autocracy, has been longer drawn out than had been wished for.

Where the enemy toward which we were to polot our bayonets was we had not the slightest idea. All we did know was that we had to be trans-ported somewhere to protect the bor-der. There were stirring times as we started out. Tens of thousands of people threw flowers at us and all wanted to shake hands. All-even soldlers-crited! Mang embraced their wives or young brides. The bands played farewell songs and people laughed and crited all at the same time. Strangers embraced and kissed Old Christmas Day. Old Christmas day is, according to the Julian calendar, observed by Rus-man and the Greek church, and differs from the Gregorian calendar by 13 days and is celebrated on January 6 and New Year's day on January 13.






People Giving Less Consideration to Little Things.



ROADS TO SPEND \$937,961,318

Michigan Lines Well, Taken Care In Allotmonts for Year.

Washington-Railroads under gov-ernment operation this year will spend nearly \$1,000,000,000 for additions, bet terments and equipments, or approxi mately three times as much as in any one of the last three years. Total capital expenditures approved by the railroad administration as an-nounced are \$937,961,318. Of this sum \$440,01,000 will be spent for additions and betterments, \$479,-685,000 for equipment and \$18,203,000 for track extension. The figures disclose Director Gen-eral McAdoo's determination to let the railroads make many improvements which they had neglected during the last three years. Extensions, however, are not encouraged. The railroad administration elimi-nated \$349,247,000, or mearly one-fourth of the railroad's proposals. The following allotments were made to Miehigan Central, \$20,027,000; Pere Marquette, \$3,419,000; Ann Arbor, \$2, 075,000, and Detroit Terminal, \$356. Washington-Railroads under gov
