

We feel quite sure Plymouth people do not appreciate the talk they hear these days shout a white paper shortage. They buy a tablet for the school child or a faw sheets of writing paper for themselves occasionally, and imagine that as long as those articles can be had this talk of a shortage mast be overdrawn.

In fact, postoffice figures show that since January I alone more than 900 papers have been forced to suspend publication because of their inability to get white paper. And the big city papers are forced to cut in size and raise their advertising rates, sometimes doubling them, to get out regularly.

With papers in towns of this size, the latter cannot be done. We must struggle along, for a time at least, for the present small ad rate. We tan only skimp and save every sheet imes now the price we paid for white paper two years ago. Not only is it three times as high, but it is almost impossible to get it at all. Not only do we pay three times as much as we ever paid for it, but you still get it on subscription at the same old rate.

There is but one ray of hope to the paper shortage. And that is that every subscriber will keep his subscription paid up, or for a year in advance, as the publisher able to offer cash is the first to get white paper now. A dollar on account from you and from your neighbor will go far toward helping us to solve our end of the shortage. And in the face of everything that seems a little enough thing to ask.



The next objective will be Pentecost Sunday, May 23rd, when it is expected fully seventy-five people will take the vows of full church membership.



A WORLD REBUILT

By the Golden Rule not by the rule of Gold

THIRTY denominations of the Church are uniting in a simultaneous campaign in the week of April 25th-

They are uniting because the task before the Church is too great for any one denomination; because there must be no duplication of effort; no waste.

These churches know that the world needs many but it needs Faith most of all.

They know that there can be no final solution of our economic problems that is not a spiritual solution, based on the teachings of Jesus Christ and His Golden Rule.

They have had the conrage to survey the whole task They have had the courage to survey the whole user, and to ask for a budget large enough to sustain (1) the work abroad, (2) the work at home including the church's part in the huge task of Americanization, (3) the colleges and (4) hospitals supported by the Churches, (5) the religious training of the young, and to provide (6) a living wage for the Church's ministers.

The budget is large in the aggregate; yet if each person who loves America would increase his contribution by only a few dollars the whole amount would be easily subscribed.
