Farmers around Plymouth will be interested in knowing that splendid progress in live stock and poultry breeding by boys' and girls' clubs is reported from many sections of the country, and made the basis of an interesting report by the government.

The department of agriculture is interested in these clubs, and reports that in seven states last year there were 1186 of them, with a total membership of 28,490. Of this number 12,786 made reports, showing that 731,709 eggs were set. From these 510,478 chickens were hatched. The value of these products sold was set at \$94,791.32, while the value of the stock on hand was estimated at \$94,791.32, while the value of the stock on hand with 5,615 competitors participating. The prize money divided among the winners amounted to \$9,881.14.

The department urges farmers throughout the United States to lend every encouragement to the boys and girls, and to assist them in forming live stock and poultry clubs whenever possible. They are the one who will be running the country in a few years, and there is nothing more important than implanting in their minds now the dignity and opportunities offered to intelligent men and women in agriculture.

Anyone interested in promoting this work in this community will find plenty of help, advice and encouragement if they care to write the department of agriculture at Washington and ask for it.


