Where the letter is old, or cannot be procured, they may be examined on their christian experience and so received. Church letters should be presented, promptly so that the member may at once come under pastoral oversight and into church fellowship. Members received June 26th, will be publicly acknowledged at the communion service held Sunday morning, July 3rd.
