According to Experts. The average build in man is not the best as regards longevity according to a statistical report. Overweight in youth and underweight in mildle and hare life will cheat "the grin resper" out of some years. Overweight is archous impairment among insured lives, for these persons more often succamb at an earlier age to the dis-enses of the heart or kidneys, to meu-monia and to disorders which reflect the vortoout machinery of the body. Overweight in younger yeans is an ad-vantage, for such persons have uni-formly a lover deuth rate from tuber-cuingls. It is after the sge of thirty-five that overweight, even in relatively small amounts, begins to be danger ous. The seriousness increases with udvancing age and with the amount of overweight, according to the lo-surance authorities. "Among short men," continues the report, "that is, thuse below five feet seven inclues in height, at the age per-relial 40 oper cent invection the attents in such individuals involves an indied mo-rulity of 30 per cent above the normal.
