There are numerous failures, of course, but most of these failures are due to lack of understanding, loose business methods and want of intelligent feedings and sheltering. No other \$2,000,000,000 ob usiness in the world offers as wide field for the man whose capital is small. We recently read where a man in a neighboring state now sells over \$10,000 worth of chickens and eggs each year, and started in business with a dozen hers and two roosters, It doesn't require rich and fertile land upon which to raise poultry; in fact expert poultry men insist that soil filled with gravel and sand, though with some grass.







OUNTY ROAD COMMISSION PLANS EXTENSIVE IMPROVE-MENTS DURING 1924.

To a system of country pavements famous all over the world, Wayne County will add, during 1924, a large amount of further highway improvements, the cost of which will come close to \$4,000,000. In all three directions over which land traffic flows in and out of Detroit, improved gateways will be the result.

The southern gateway, toward Monroe and Toledo, is to become a 40-foot paveway from Wyandotte to Rockwood, and condemnation proceedings are now in operation to secure the 106-foot right of way needed. A 40-foot paveway will permit four lanes of travel on this highway, which is now one of the most seriously congested of Wayne County routes. Similar right of way is the seriously congested of Wayne County routes. Similar right of way is being secured for a pavement on Fort street, through Sibley, and affording an alternative route.

Widening of Michigan avenue, which already is a double paveway with car tracks in the middle, will be continued westward from Dearborn, the 1924 program calling for construction to Telegraph road. When completed, this highway will be in far better condition to handle the heavy traffic to and from the west.




