Only a few sections produce a surplus above their needs. It is estimated that five per cent is shipped out of the county where produced. The quality of Michigan's 1923 corn crop is only 70 compared with 83 a year ago. Much of the corn was not fully matured and held a high per cent of moisture. HAY: Hay reserves on Michigan farms on March 1 are reported at 30 per cent of last year's production, which is equivalent to 1,174,000 tons compared with the heavy reserve of 1,694,000 tons shown on last March. Production last year fell considerably below that of 1922, and continued heavy feeding demands has resulted in lighter stocks on farms than one year ago. The amount estimated shipped out of county is only 20 per cent compared with 25 per cent last year.
