

Koncakov says he found in Central park, since his arrival, a tree that was to him the soul of a candle such as burned in the homes of thousands of Russians all over the world until last midnight in celebration of Russian Ensier week. He described it as a little tree, with its leafy crown flaring in the perfumed air of spring as a lamp in the incense-laden atmosphere of a cathedral.

Konenkov cannot understand why American sculptors do not express the spirits of their trees in wood carvings.



## Casa Grande Ruine Are Centuries Old

The Casa Grande reservation, one of he twenty-nine national monuments stablished by Presidential proclama-ions, consists of 480 acres of land in

established by Presidential proclamations, consists of 480 acres of land in south central Arizona at an altitude of 1,422 feet and is a typical spot of desert scenery, being level ground on the floor of the Glia valley, covered with a growth of mesquite, creosote and salt bush.

The Casa Grande, or "Great House," is a dismantled group of solid soube walls of a building which was at one time four stories in height. The standing walls are six feet thick at their base. The first recorded European to visit this section was Father Eusebio Francisco Kino, builder of the Tumacacori mission, who passed here in 1634 and wrote a description of the ruins, which had been standing for more than two continues. There are many ruins of other prehistoric dwellings.

The history of the rise and fall of the civilization which built and in habited the Casa Grande is only conjectural. When these people came into the valley they undoubtedly were nomads, but the opportunities for a settled life devoted to agricultural pursuits must have appealed to them, as their first step was the construction of an irrigation system, the remains of which are still visible. Then came the problem of housing and finally the need of defensive construction, for protection from enemies. The multi-story house, of which the Casa Grande is the highest development, was probably evolved as a defendive measure. As tion from enemies. As a watch tower it must have proved a good investment, for from its top a guard could cover the country for a radius of ten miles, which was a great advantage, for if the enemy could be sighted at this distance he, being on foot (the horse was not yet on the American continent at this time), would need nearly two hours to get to the village which gave time to get runners out into the fields and gather forces for the defonse.

It is probable that raiding Apaches hecame too strong for the valley dwellers, and year after year they lost a larger percentage of their crops and a large number of warriors, until at last they decided to abandon the country. This began possibly 700 or 900 years ago.

## THE WATER SITUATION

With the dry weather of the past few days there has come a shortage in the village water supply. So serious was the situation Wednesday morning that it was deemed advisable by the village manager to send out men from house to house to notify the water users that they must desist from using water for sprinkling purposes until further notice. Late Tuesday evening, there was no water available through the water mains, neither was there any water in the big tank in the village or the reservoir at Waterford. Although the pumps at the well were working, there was so little water coming into the well that pumping was of little use, causing air pockets to form in the pipe line, and the pumps were shut down until morning, when they were started again, and with the accumulation of water in the well during the night, the water pressure steadily rose until at II o'clock it registered 28 pounds, or nearly normal. There is a probability that the prison farm and the sanatorium at Northville, getting their water supply from this locality may have decreased Plymouth's water supply to some extent.

Engineer Decker of Ann Arbor, was called over Wednesday morning, and together with Manager Strong went over the situation at the springs and well. There seems to be a shortage of water at various places throughout the state.

It would seem to us that the question of our water supply is one that demands the most careful consideration and immediate attention of our village authorities. If there is a shortage of water at the source of supply, it will be necessary to take some steps to overcome this deficiency, which means much to the future progress and safety of our village.
