It is not unusual for people to forget that lamps need cleaning quite as much as other articles in the room-they also collect dust. A neglected lamp may give only from a half to three-quarters of its rated candlepower.

There is a three-fold loss; loss of light absorbed by the dust; loss of eye-comfort from strained vision; loss of money paid for light not utilized.
