





AGRICULTURAL NEWS IF YOU WANT TO SELL OR BUY Strychnine Used Practical Methods REAL ESTATE-SEE RAMBO of Wintering Bees to Destroy Mice Pack Hives in Cases and Damage to Crops by Rodents Frank Rambo Real Estate Co. Cover With Leaves. One of the best methods of winter-ing over bees is to fack them in cases, using leaves, straw or hay. Even oats may be used. Preparé an ordinary packing box so that it will hold about two hives. Set the bives so that the entrance will be clear. That is, ar-range it so that there can be ventila-tion through the entrance and then fill the space between the bive bodies and the packing box with material such as aswdost, straw, hay, etc. After your hives are well packed in the packing boxes, cover the boxes carefully with roofing paper or something of that na-ture to prevent the water soaking in on the packing material. A still simpler method, which is very successfully employed by many people, is to remove the cover from the hives and place a cloth over the frame, put on a super and fill with straw or chaff. Then place the regu-lar cover around the bottom of the hive, as well as the sides and top. Over this good, thick coating of news-paper tack prepared roofing cut to fit. This roofing may be fastened securely by means of strips of lath or some-thing of that sort. Or you can use cilcioth instead of the roofing if yon desire. As a further instance of pocket mice as a pest may be cited the case of two flower growers of Olympia, Wash. who reported that moles and mice were responsible for the loss of 500 flower buils during the spring. The loss was not noticed until the builse were dug for transplanting. Damage of this kind is usually done in the winter and early spring, so that it is not discovered ordinarily until too late to apply preventive measures.
