



Postmaster Hill informs the Mail that there is very little likelihood that there will be any extension of the city delivery service for the present at least, as he is unable to get an increased appropriation for the local office that would make any additional service possible. As is additional service possible. An in-spector was here recently, and be in-formed Mr. Hill that an increased appropriation for the local office could not be looked for at present. There are several localities about the village, where the residents have been asking for and are entitled to mail delivery, but without additional help it is not possible to give this service, with the present number of service, with the present number of carriers. We understand that in some places, even larger than Plymouth, carriers are only making one mail delivery a day in residence districts. Postmaster Hill is desirous of giving the patrons of the local office the best service possible, but with the present working force, and his inability to get additional funds to hire more help, finds himself seriously handicapped in extending the city mail delivery service, much as he would like to do so.

PLYMOUTH AT REDFORD

The new addition is a piece of strap rail that was used upon the Michigan Central railroad back in the year of 1840 or thereabouts. 
