### TO CERTIFY POTATOES THROUGH STATE BODY

CROP IMPROVEMENT ASSOCIA-TION TAKES OVER NEW FIELD-M. S. C. TO SUPERVISE INSPEC

The Michigan Crop Improvement association, nationally known cooperative farmers' seed improvement grapes. body, will in the future be the cer-tifying organization for Michigan potatoes, as well as for other field was made this week from the office of the farm crops department at the Michigan State College, and the ac-tion is said to follow requests from the various potato growers organizations of the state.

The new plan will provide stand-ardization of the potato certification requirements for the entire state, and throws the force of the Crop ready eveloped by the potato groups thems lves. Improvement of the mar-ket quality of the state tuber crop is said; to be the good back of all the eloped by the potato groups

The statement given out by Prof.

J. F. Cox, head of the college farm crops department, summaries briefly the new certification system: "The Michigan Crop Improvement Asso ciation will be the certifying organ laation for potatoes. The farm crops department of the Michigan State College will supervise inspection and the Michigan Potato Growers Ex change of Cadillac, through a pool-ing arrangement with the Michigan Certified Seed Potato Growers Asso-ciation will act as official sales agent for certified seed potatoes, a function

cared for by the state farm bureau seed service with other field seeds. "The action taken by the board of directors of the Michigan Crop Improvement Association and the Farm Crops Department of the Michigan State College automatically makes all Michigan growers of potatoes, who have applied to the State College for inspection, members of the Michigan Crop Improvement Association and entitled to all benefits of the latter organization."

The new plan does not interfere with private sale of certified seed potatoes by growers who wish to market that way, it is said. H. C. Moore, potato specialist at the college, will continue to supervise the potato inspection work for the state.
