

ROAD PROGRESS





(1) Trugnus from school.—Cases are taken up in the justice count of the fault of parents. They are not Juvenile unless the act of the child leads to rebellion against order.

(2) Tardiness.—Often habits of tardiness are developed, which lead to indifficulties in school and later on in citizenship.

(3) Sometimes caused by uncongenial conditions, class does not fit child, uncongental teacher or school mates or perhaps home condition.

(4) Fallure of adjustment between the home and the school.




