# CITIZENS FAVOR PARK PROPOSAL

## **VOTERS ALMOST UNANIMOUS** IN FAVOR OF PROPOSAL

Six Hundred and Fifteen Voters Out of Six Hundred and Sixty-one Were in Favor of Proposition.

That the people of the village of Plymouth Boy of the proposal to transfer the so-Plymouth tourist property to the Wayne County Board of Park Trustees for improvement and development was indicated by the ALLAN STRONG AWARDED JOHNS and development was indicated by the advisory vote taken in conjunction with the primary election last Tues-day. At a meeting of the village, commission Wednesday evening it was decided to accept the result of the ndvisory vote and to incorporate the same into the official record. Also, it was voted, in recognition of the overwhelming sentiment in favor of transfering the property to the Wayne of the four prized scholarships.





Of the estimated 12,000,000 Americans, most of them newcomers to

cans, most of them newcomers to speculation, who are "playing the mar-ket," the 5 per cent of winners is made up almost entirely of hardened. mane up almost entirety of narrower, experienced speculators who have plemiful capital, Mr. Kelly finds. They forget the stranded hordes before the studio gates.





Rome.-Recent statistics show that Rome.—Recent statistics show that was called the game of games—playing state botto—has lost its hold on all but the poorer players. It is tone that thousands play in different clites, but the frenzy of prewar players, ready to stake everything on their weekly gamble, has disappeared. At the same time it continues to be to-day one of the greatest sources of recome the state has, It has been called the tax on the poor, as by means of it a very substantial revenue is taken in.



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


