



Lord has put two years of planning Into the work now being carried forward. All he had to beein with was a drydock, Wooden shapbuilding at the yard ended 50 years age. These were augmented with mavy yard workers, specially qualified.

Where it lies in drydock now the disnantled buil of the famous fighting ship is almost lost behind a screen of scaffolding and bracing. A cradle had to be thrust tightly about her bottom to hold her firmly together—a new method.

#### Lime Sown in Fall Make Better Crops

BACTERIA NEEDED IN GROWING LEGUMES MUST HAVE PROPER SOIL CONDITIONS.

Application of limestone in the fall has several advantages over placing the material on the ground in the spring immediately preceding the eding of legumes.

provement of sail conditions for th bacteria that are needed to make the growing of legames a success, and the longer the limestone is on the soil be-fore seeding the greater is the improvement in these conditions, in the experience of the Michigan State Col

loge soils department.

Spring grains usually yield best on fall plowed soil, and on these soils the limestone can be applied during stack periods in the fall or winter. The soils soil soil to be soils soil soil to be soils. limestone can be applied on which are being fitted for fall grains, but should not be applied after the grain is sown.

Tests for soil acidity should be made before the lime is applied. A large percentage of Michigan soils are acid and will require from one and one half to three tons of limestone to cor rect the acid condition. The county agricultural agents all have soil testing outlits and will test soil for the owners in their counties, or the farmer bim self can obtain one of the testing out

The one hundred and fifty farms in the state upon which Michigan State College conducts lime and fertilizer tests have proved that the use of lime is profitable in the production of grain crops and necessary for growing le-gumes. Where marl is available, it may be used to replace other forms of






