IRON FIST RULE OVER LABOR

The so-called "Little Wagner Acts" were passed by several states applement the National Act's purported aim to protect the rights

of labor.

From New York state we get an excellent sample of how these rights are being protected. In a recent election to choose a collective bargaining agency for employes of a grocery store chain, 531 employes voted for the C.I.O.; 421 voted for the A.F. of L. union, and 626, a substantial plurality, voted against being represented by either of these unions.

And what happens to this plurality? Simply that the State Labor Relations Board straightway teaches it the error of its ways by ordering another election at which only the names of the two unions will be on the ballot.

In other words, 826 American citizens are being told—"You'll accept a union and like it!"







Annual meeting of School District No. 1 Fractional. Townships of Plymouth and Northville. Wayne County, Michigan held on the 18th day of June. 1938.

Shall School District No. 1 Frl. of Plymouth and Northville Townships, Wayne County, Michigan, assess, collect, and place in the Building and Site Fund one mill on the taxable property of the District during the year 1938.—Yes, 78; No. 50.

It was then moved, seconded and carried unanimously that the meeting be adjourned.



Economic conditions are affecting the supply and demand of rural teachers according to Dr. Elliont. Superintendent of public instruction. A survey made one year ago by the department of public instruction showed a shortage in the number of eachers available for rural positions.
