Teachers, Public Officials Must Pay Income Tax

Collector Kavanagh Advises About Proper Returns

gan persons who will file income tax returns under the provisions of the Public Salary Tax Act of 1939.

This law passed at the last session of congress puts to rest the old question of public salary taxation. The salary of federal employes has always been taxable, but until this year, beginning January 1, 1939, state salaries were not taxable under federal taxing authority. All public school teachers, all state and county officials, and city and village executives and employes must pay income tax. Some of them have been paying tax on income received from other sources, but until the current year have not been required to include the salary received as a teacher or public official. Married couples, where one or the other has income from the state or a political subdivision, must now combine their incomes to determine taxability.

For 1939 and subsequent years, the tax is upon the net income which is determined by subtracting the allowable deductions and personal exemptions from the gross income. Ordinary deductions are interest paid on indebtedness (like a mortgage on a home) all taxes paid. (except income and improvement tax) benevolences to one's church of any organized charity, bad debts which become worthless during the year for which the return is made, and 10% of earned net income. The personal exemption of husband and wife living to gether is \$2500, and an additional \$400 for each child under 18 years of age. 

"The voting frequency is low-set in the youngest age group and rises with each age group up to 60; until 70 the highest frequency is maintained," according to the study. An average of only 22 percent of the registered voters between the ages of 21 and 30 voted in ten elections from 1928 to 1932. Of the eligible voters between the ages of 31 and 40, the average was 32.8 per cent. In the age group from 51 to 60, the average was 42.3 per cent.

"These figures should make clear the very inadequate and unsatisfactory job which is done by our school system in developing in students a strong citizenship interest." Dr. Pollock says. "Even if young peoplee cannot be completely trained for citizenship responsibilities, at least they should as a result of their schooling have developed an interest which would cause them to become regular voters."

With regard to voting behavior in Ann Arbor. Dr. Pollock says that voting follows a rather uniform pattern. "Year in and year out participation in elections is low, so low, in fact, as to raise serious question as to the representativeness of the results, and as to the basis of the whole voting system. Large numbers of citizens do not register Larger numbers of registered voters do not vote. Only in presidential elections is the voting sufficiently high to deserve favorable comment."

Says Farm Income Also Drops

A \$53,000,000 Strike: According to figures prepared by statisticians, the recent Chrysler strike caused a loss of more than \$53,000,000. The \$55,000 employes involved in the strike lost 42 working days and \$18,000,000 in wages, it is estimated that Chrysler dealers lost \$18,000,000 in potential income and salespien for these dealers lost \$3,3\$0,000 in potential commissions. Workers employed in plants engaged in support of the second support of the sec dealers lost \$3.390,000 in potential commissions. Workers employed in plants engaged in supplying parts to the Chrysler Corportation are estimated to have lost \$5.900,000 in wages. And the Chrysler Corporation itself suffered an estimated loss in income amounting to \$8.360,000. In the settlement of the strike the only demand granted was an increase of three cents an hour. On the basis of this increase. Chrysler workers now must work 1,050 days, or more than four 50-week years, in order to make up for the wages lost in the 42 working days involved in the strike.

Herd of Elk Has Been Seen Near Vanderbilt During Recent Weeks

During Recent Weeks

A herd of 20 clk has gathered recently at a salt block placed near headquarters building in the Pigeon river state forest east of Vanderbilt. It is the first time so large a herd of the animals has been reported seen in the Pigeon river country in several years. In 1918 about 30 clk obtained from Jackson Hole, Wyoming, and from various zoos and parks were released in Roscommon. Otsego and Montmorency counties, nucleus of a herd which has been estimated to have increased to 500 animals. However, the elk are scattered over a large area and do not congregate in large numbers,







PLAYING POLITICS

A group of WPA workers in Lowell, Massachusetts, the Boston Herald reports, have accused the New Dealers in charge of that relief organization of forcing them to buy tickets to political banquets. Men and women making \$82.80 a month say that they were required to spend from \$1.50 to \$3.00 to attend gatherings of a purely political character. Other reliefers of the same city say they were given as many as ten \$1.50 tickets to a dinner to be held within forty-eight hours and told to sell them "or cise."
