No Word Received By Relatives From Any of Them

The fate of many Plymouth boys, who are known to be members of the Pacific fleet suddenly attacked Sunday morning by the Japanese navy and air forces, is still unknown by relatives and friends. The fact that no advices have been received, indicates that all are probably safe.


