Voters Elect Brisbois, Stark to School Board

District Casts Largest Vote In **Recent Years**

Electors Vote For Lot Transfer And **Board Salaries**

Two new members, Dr. Harold J. Brisbois and Howard W. Stark, were elected to the board of education by the voters of Plymouth school district in Monday's election. The total number of votes cast was 234, the largest vote at a regular election in recent years and the highest since the special election on bus transportation in 1940 when a total of 247 votes were cast.

Dr. Brisbois received the highest vote with a total of 171; Stark was awarded 143 votes and George Burr, in-cumbent, received 127. The Eaton Reveals an alley at the rear of Adams street was given overwhelming approval with a vote of the termine approval with a vote of 191 in favor and 17 against.

Local citizens purchased a total of \$69,193.75 worth of bonds and stamps, to help Michigan go to one of the top places in the nation during the May drive.

Of this total, \$4,045.45 were in war stamps, which will shortly be converted into war bonds.

One of the amazing things about the situation in this city is the fact that month after month the average purchase of defense bonds runs much higher than in many other communities of similar size.

Then, too, Plymouth does not secure credit for all the bonds and stamps that are purchased in this city. There are large numbers of Plymouth residents who are participating in payroll deduction purchases in factories that are located outside of the city limits. With the exception of the Wall Wire Company, these credits go to Detroit.

It is a remarkably good showing, and one that Plymouth can well be proud to constantly contend for.

Every Employe Of New Factory Must Pledge To Buy War Bonds

When the new Pilgrim Products company plant goes into operation within the next few weeks, every employe on the payroll will have signed a pledge that he will give ten percent of his salary to the purchase of war defense bonds, stated R. N. Green, president and manager, yesterday, or he will not get a job.

"We are going to produce material for the government. In fact, for the duration of the war everything we produce will be for Uncle Sam. We are not, therefore, going to have any one on our payroll who is not willing to help the government carry on this war," stated Mr. Green.

"It is essential that we win the war. If we don't we won't have anything to work for, that's why we are going to insist that every one who works for us, does his part to help lick the Nazis and the Japs," he said.

Mr. Green also announced the appointment of Patrick McGuire. of Massillon, Ohio, as assistant to the superintendent. Mr. McGuire is well known in the cold drawn steel industry. He will move his family to Plymouth in the near future.

GOOD WORK

A final check of the work of a group of some 50 Plymouth "minute women" who gave their time to the recent canvass of the city of Plymouth to secure pledges for the purchase of war bonds and stamps, shows that exactly 1640 pledges were secured in this city. That total represents practically every home in Plymouth. It makes this city as near a 100 percent "pledger" as there is in the country. The total amount of pledges for the next year is close to a quarter of a million dollars. From reports made by leaders of the "minute women" there were less than a dozen rejections, and most of these cases were people who were, because of illness or unemployment, unable to sign a pledge. Plymouth is truly one of America's most patriotic cities.

RAYMOND CLAPPER SAYETH SOMETHING

"There is no excuse for (gas) rationing in the Middlewest and it should not be accepted," said Senator Prentiss M. Brown the other day after Governor Van Wagoner had protested against rationing for this part of the country.

Raymond Clapper, writing in The Detroit Free Press, said senators and congressmen believe it is popular with their constituents to scream against gas rationing. "None of us like rationing," wrote Clapper, "and we all want to drive our cars."

But "driving must be curtailed on the basis of the present rubber outlook. Therefore, national rubber rationing on a sensible basis must be given serious consideration," reported a senate committee recently after it had investigated the rubber shortage.

Again wrote Raymond Clapper:

"When I said the other day that what you hear in Congress is 90 percent tripe, ignorance and demagoguery, pos-sibly I was unfair. * * * Senators and congressmen who know they are in bad with the public, are now taking the cheap way to curry favor. * * * Maybe I was wrong. Maybe what you hear in congress isn't 90 percent tripe, ignorance and demagoguery. Maybe it is 95 percent."
