Entirely Remove Wax

Before revarnishing or reshellacking a floor, wash it thoroughly with strong soap suds, rinse well and dry. If there is any doubt that the wax is entirely removed by the soap and water scrubbing, the floor may be wiped over with turpentine or a turpentine substitute called petroleum spirits. To make sure that the wax is entirely removed, varnish one floor board and leave it overnight. If the varnish seems sticky the next morning, that is proof that the wax is not thoroughly removed and the floor must be recleaned.

Betty St. Clair, of Detroit, atended the bride wearing a dressmaker suit of light biege with brown accessories and a corsage of yellow roses.


The bridegroom was attended by Donald Atkinson, as best man, and the ushers were William Carpenter and Robert Martin, of Detroit.





avert possible trouble: (1) Empty the dust bag frequently. (It's a good idea to do this every time you use the cleaner.) Once a month, turn the bag inside out and brush it thoroughly. Do not wash the bag.

(4) See that the nozzle and brush are properly adjusted. (Improper adjustment may break the rubber belt, and new rubber belts are becoming increasingly
