"I'll pack them in cotton, mail them to the treasury department in Washington, and by the use of special machines and lights they have, the treasury department will be able to tell exactly the amount of money there is in this roll of burned bills. It is nothing less than amazing how the department can do these things, but it can," stated

"After the count has been made, there will be returned to the bank new bills for the burned ones that were shipped to Washing-

No one who saw the roll of burned bills could tell the amount of a single one of them, but Mr. Daane says the department will return to the Wolf store the exact amount of money that there was in the bills that went through the fire. That's just one of Uncle Sam's many services to the people of this great country.

Col. Cass Hough Is BPWC Speaker

International relations night was observed Tuesday by the Plymouth Business and Professional Womens' Club at the dinner meeting held at the Episcopal Parish House. Guest speaker was Col. Cass Hough of the Daisy Manufacturing Company.

Col. Hough spoke of his experiences while stationed in England with the Army Air Forces. He paid great tribute to the civilian population of England and told how everyone not serving in the armed forces had to work.

Col. Hough vividly described the war work of women, especially those in the volunteer fire service groups and first aid stations. All, he said, were well organized before the first Nazi blitz

He also praised the English system of rationing. In contrast to the allowances our own rationing program set up the English were on starvation rations. Col. Hough said each adult was limited to a half pound of meat and one-eighth of a pound of sugar a week.

Col. Hough also pointed out that there was no wasted effort in English factories during the war. He also remarked about the neatness of the English towns and the staunch character of the people.

Now that the war is over, Col. Hough said, it could be revealed credit. that the Nazi robombs in nine weeks killed 700,000 civilians and the following: Estel Rowland, reduced 1,130,000 homes to rubble. Col. Hough concluded on a note of respect and admiration for such great fortitude.

and one years old, was created by following: Law of March 17, 1835, and the first Township meting was held on the first Monday of April at the "Tamarack School House" on John Joslin's farm, near the center of the town.

The name of the Township is doubtless derived from a province in Russia, which is strange, due to the fact that it owes much to New York state as well as Eng land for its ancestors. Many Ger mans settled here, however they did not play an important part in the politics or the running of the community until later years.

Frederick L. West, proprietor and manager of the Livonia cheese factory, was born in Oswego Co., N. Y., Aug. 15, 1830. When 17 years of age he began the life of a sailor. In May 1864, he entered the U. S. Navy, being assigned to the gunboat Kansas and continued in service until the close of the war.

He married Georgie Ann Herdman of Westburgh, N. Y. December 28, 1832; they had one child. Mrs. West died in 1865 and Mr. West came to Michigan in 1871 and had charge of the cheese factory for seven years. Most of the produce was sold to Detroit par-

A place known as Livonia City and located on the northeast quarter of Section 1. was platted, but actually no village existed, although a post office known as the Plank Road post office was located near by.

The town hall was erected in 1872 at a cost of \$635 and was located at the southeast corner of Section 16. The population of the township in 1850 was 1,375; in 1860, 1,665; in 1870, 1,679; in 1880, 1,638. The valuation in 1840 was \$184,885 and today is about \$8,-000,000 with a population of 100,-

Nankin, formerly Newburg was located on the river Rouge near Detroit, Lansing and Northern Railroads. Stark's post office was located on the railroad about one mile south of Livonia Center and was named after Levi B. Stark who situated here in 1858, however the station at that point was called Livonia.





Fly 'Em Safely!

Kite flying time is here again. A real sport for boys and girls everywhere! Yet there are certain dangers you must guard against if kite flying is to be all the fun vou want it to be.

The greatest danger to a kite flyer is an electric wire.

Fly your kite in the open-away from any wire. If

your kite swoops over and touches an electric wire, the electricity in that wire can cause severe burns or even death. Do not use a metal kite frame. Use only wood. If a metal kite frame touches electric wires, a short

circuit can result which can make the wires fall

and cause great damage to you and to other people Do not use wire or tinsel twine for a kite string. The metal or tinsel can carry the dangerous elec-

tricity down to your hand. Wet string can carry electricity too, so never fly a kite on a rainy day.

Do not climb a pole or a tree to get your kite down. You may be injured by electric wires or by a fall.



Babson Discusses Railroads

Babson Park, Mass., April 12 .-War came to the rescue of the railroads. The decline in traffic and earnings which had persisted since the 30's ceased. However, the real worth of rail securities must be judged, not on past, but on future. performances. Traffic Outlook

Volume of freight traffic varies in proportion to business activity. Before the war, their competitors (trucks, automobiles, pipe lines, shipping and airplanes) had cut into the railroads' revenues. However, the war helped the railroads and hurt the other carriers. The railroads, moreover, need no time to adjust themselves to peacetime operations. A pent-up demand for goods, with the greatest cash reserves in many years, should insure and business activity and the state of raffic should also be good of awhile in spite of

auto and air competition. The Federal Reserve Board's Index of Industrial Production shows an increase from 110 in 1929 to 171 in 1941. In line with these increases railway freight traffic jumped to a new prewar peak in 1941 with an increase of 25 billion ton-miles carried over


