

Plymouth is only 17 miles from the University of Michigan, but not until a news item came from the University news service a few days ago did we know that there is a zoo at the University which men have succeeded, the fastest houses representative specimens of every fur-bearing animal that time being made by Venceslas

The little zoo is almost hidden by shrubbery in back of the swam it in 10 hours and 45 minfamous University of Michigan Museum building.

The present population includes four black bears, four red foxes, three badgers, and three raccoons. Also included is a wolverine, but actually this resident hails from Alaska and is not a

Money from a man in Detroit who desires to remain anonymous made it possible, back in 1929, to create the zoo. University

President Alexander G. Ruthven had been insisting a museum should have living animals. The zoo is a center of interest throughout the week but on Saturdays attendance jumps to about 150 and Sundays bring 300 or more spectators. Brother and Sister, two huge black bears, are chief attractions at the zoo. Miss Crystal Thompson, curator at the University Museums, has an interesting story to tell about Brother and Sister.

She has seen them grow from tiny black balls of fur that could be held in the palm of her hand to their present rather formidable proportions-Brother weighs 800 pounds and Sister 500. Brother and Sister arrived at the University in February of 1933 with their eyes still closed and weighing less than a pound apiece since they were less than a month old. Their trip to the campus resulted from a visit to Luther, Mich., by one of the Muse-

ums employees. His father, a conservation officer, had the two cubs which had been turned over to him by two woodchoppers. For eight weeks, Miss Thompson had to bottle feed the cubs taking them home with her each night, since the milk had to be given them every two hours. Finally, Brother and Sister were big enough (18 inches tall) to be put in the animal house. But they still insisted on bottle feeding and were indignant over an attempt to switch a larger size bottle to eliminate some of the work of filling

from 10 to 12 nursing bottles at one feeding. But one day Brother saw the 14-quart pail of hot milk which was brought to the zoo for the bottle filling project at each feeding. He dropped his bottle and stuck his head into the pail. That ended the bottle feeding. Since then,, the bears have thrived on admiring attention and a varied diet of bread and milk, carrots, apples and green corn with some candy and raisins for their sweet tooth. Miss Thompson reports Brother and Sister, despite their huge size, actually have dainty manners in eating.

The recent rains gave an additional boost to the peach crop in most of the peach growing areas of Michigan and, more than likely, will help Michigan break all peach production records this season. Charles Figy, Director of the State Department of Agriculture states that according to the Federal-State Crop Reporting Service, last year's record peach crop of 4,400,000 bushels, which broke all previous records, is expected to be exceeded this year. Their estimate as of August 1 shows 4,428,000 bushels. If this record production materializes, it will be 70 per cent over the 10-

This year's crop will be of especially good quality. New methods have been developed which have aided materially in the control of brown rot of peaches, and the dry weather has helped control insect pests and diseases.

The early peaches are now being harvested. The harvest of the major portion of the crop in southwestern Michigan usually starts this week, with the peak of the season around Labor Day. Now is the time for consumers to be making plans to secure their supply of quality Michigan peaches.

Urban real estate prices are rising more because of actual shortages of housing and commercial buildings than because of inflationary "boom" factors, believes Dean Russell A. Stevenson, of the University of Michigan School of Business Administration.

Land prices have gone up sharply in urban areas, but there is little indication that real estate debacles, like that of the Florida land boom of the twenties, are in the making, he commented. Today's prices are based upon demand from people who wish to build homes and business establishments and not upon demand from

speculators, he explained.

Land-owners may be encouraged by the fact that assessments rise more slowly than land prices, but usually drop almost immediately after prices fall, the dean said.
