The Northville newlywed, Mark Porritt, 21, who was married last Friday night to the former Yvonne Simons, 16, of Flint, died in agony from gasoline burns a few hours after being admitted to Wayne County General Hospital last Saturday night.

Officers of the Wayne County road Patrol reported that Porritt's jeep collided with the auto of Harry Becker, 42, of Detroit, when Becker allegedly failed to heed the red flasher-calling for a full stop, at the intersection of Schoolcraft and Farmington roads.

Porritt was enroute to Northville on Schoolcraft, officers said, while Becker was traveling on Farmington.

Officers were at a loss to explain why the Wayne County Signal Department had eliminated a normal stopand-go system of traffic control at the intersection in favor of a red and yellow flasher system calling for Farmington road traffic to stop before entering or crossing Schoolcraft and cautioning Schoolcraft traffic to reduce their speed when approaching the intersection.

Deputy Sheriff Dan Evans, of the road patrol, said Poritt died in utmost agony after failing to lose consciousness from severe burns from gasoline-fed flames. Decuty Evans related how Porritt, his whole body soaked in flaming gasoline, crawled 20 feet from the wreckage of his jeep to a water-filled ditch and then lay nearly an hour before an ambulance arrived to take him to the

"Porritt was covered with burning gasoline and his clothing burned almost entirely off.

"Then he lay there in the water-filled ditch for 55 agonizlown. He just lay there and quivered like an injured puppy, but never making a sound. I'm telling you it was awful. You couldn't touch him, and there was nothing to do but wait for the ambulance," said Evans.

"He was conscious most of the time. He was so horribly burned that I failed to recognize him up-on reaching the scene, Evans continued. He knew me though and told me who he was."

Evans said when they finally moved Porritt "his skin came off his hands and arms like long gloves being removed."

Meanwhile Porritt's bride of less than 24 hours was driven to the hospital by his mother, Dorothy, police said. The girl-bride was in

Military officers who have carried full responsibility for directing invention and development in the atomic energy field, from its inception to the enactment of the new law, labored day and night to develop a substitute for the drastic, fully Sovietized, patent provisions above mentioned. They knew that the strength of its industry measures the power of a nation for war. They also knew that most of the inventions useful, either in industry or in war, come from independent inventors and those affiliated with Smaller Manufac-

The "atomic military" knew this harsh law would frighten American inventors and drive their inventions underground where secret foreign agents labor. A substitute, satisfactory to the atomic military, for the drastic patent section of the bill, was accepted by an overwhelming vote in the House. However, Senate pressures persuaded the House finally to pass the bill in its original form.

It was admitted by members of the Senate-House Conference Committee that the bill was bad. It was urged by them that a grave emergency existed, that the bill must be made at once a law to save the nation. They promised that the law would be repealed as soon as Russia agreed to international control of atomic energy and to unrestricted inspections within Russia.

Russian Gromyko, in Paris, waited only until the bill had become a law to boldly proclaim that Russia would never agree to international inspection. Never is a long, long time to be stuck

with the McMahon Atomic Energy Act.

And why should Russia cooperate—now that she is assured that most of the inventors of America will be afraid to think of atomic energy, except in bed with the covers pulled over their heads? And is it any wonder that top scientists are showing reluctance to go along with the Administration's drastic atomic program?

#### Early Chicks

Chicks should be started early be cause early chicks grow faster and have a lower mortality. Furthermore, the early cockerels can be sold while the prices are higher and the pullets will come into production early in the fall when high egg prices prevail. Chicks for flock replacement should be obtained from flocks which have been tested and found to be free of pollorum. The brooder house should be cleaned thoroughly and the brooder put into operation a day or two before the chicks arrive.

#### Home Tool Kit

Every family should plan to make household equipment last as long as possible. Daily care and needed repair of equipment will determine the length of its usefulness. The following tools will be helpful in making simple repairs at home: screw drivers, monkey wrench, knife, putty. knife, nails, tacks, pliers, hammer, ruler, brush, solder, ice pick, flat file, round file, whet stone, and oil can. Keep your home tool kit handy and ready for use.

#### Clean Stoves Cook Better

A valuable weapon in the hands of every woman doing war duty on the home front is the kitchen stove. If the family is to be well nourished for the duration, this important piece of household equipment must be kept ship shape. Any kind of stove will work better if it is clean and in good working condition. This is no time for neglect that may necessitate repairs and the use of vital defense materials.

#### Flu and Grippe

From a medical viewpoint, the terms flu and grippe are synonymous, says Dr. Rufus S. Reeves, Philadelphia director of public health, but the general public generally considers influenza as including along with the usual aching and elevated temperature, symptoms of running nose and sometimes a little sore throat and slight cough.

#### Cooking Frozen Foods

Frozen meats, poultry and vegetables can be cooked satisfactorily with or without previous thawing. All reports indicate that frozen foods require somewhat less time to cook than similar fresh products, except possibly foods cooked without previous thawing. Roasts, particularly, would require time to thaw as well as to cook.

During 1943, the total tonnage of steel products shipped from the mills exceeded 67,278,000 net tons, substantially above the previous record of 64,814,000 tons of shipments in 1942. In 1940, the first of the four record-breaking years, 48,585,-000 tons of steel products were

#### Lost Time

Workers' injuries since December 1, 1941, are responsible for the loss of four times as many man hours of production as lost by strikes. Damage and destruction of equipment in workers' accidents far exceeds the value of American cargoes that have been sunk.

#### Removes Blood Stains

Blood stains on washable material may be removed by soaking them, until the coloring is dissolved, in cold water to which household ammonia has been added in the proportion of one tablespoonful to a gallon of water. Then wash the article in lukewarm suds.

#### Warm Up

Muscles give their best performance when gradually and thoroughly warmed up. Muscle tendons are not likely to be pulled or torn when warmed up. Champion athletes in all sports first take sufficient time to warm up.

#### Spread Rot

Crates, baskets, bags, planters, diggers, and storage bins that have been smeared with ooze from a ringrot-diseased potato may spread the disease to healthy potatoes even four months after the original contact.

#### Major Disasters

#### Made for Rival, 'Pandora's Box' Blows Up Wife

Husband Made It for 'Other Man': He Warned Her, But Curiosity Won.

PORTLAND, ORE .- James W. Bowden, a steamfitter, acknowledged to police that he killed his wife with a "Pandora's box" filled with dynamite, but insisted that he had not meant to kill her but to blow up a rival for her affections.

Mrs. Bowden was blown to bits in the basement of her home when she opened a fiber suitcase which her husband had forbidden her to touch. Like Pandora of the classic fable who disobeyed the gods and opened the box containing all the world's evils, Mrs. Bowden was unable to restrain her curiosity.

Away on Fishing Trip.

Bowden, 47, was away on a fishing trip at the time. When he returned police arrested him and, Detective Captain Eugene Ferguson announced, he acknowledged having constructed the infernal ma-

"She was running around with another man," Bowden was quoted. "I decided to get him."

He refused to name the man. He said that he bought six sticks of dynamite and detonators from a contractor and set to work in his basement. He wired the detonators to the lid of the suitcase. "It would go off when the lid was

lifted, but it was padlocked with a combination lock," he stated. "I was afraid of it and it just sat Bowden said he put in the suit-

case a diary containing a chronicle of Mrs. Bowden's alleged affair with the other man.

Warned His Family.

His daughters, Shirley, 19, and Doris, 17, told police that their father had repeatedly forbidden their mother to so much as touch the suitcase. They were included in the prohibition. But when Bowden was away and her daughters were too, Mrs. Bowden evidently succumbed to curiosity.

Bowden told police that while he was working in the Aleutians as a civilian during the war he had sent his wife \$5,000, which she had "squandered."

"My wife filed suit for divorce," he said. "There was no motive after that. I didn't know what to do with the suitcase."

Mrs. Bowden's divorce complaint charged cruelty. The district attorney's office announced that Bowden would be charged with first degree murder.

New Air Torpedo With

Rocket Engine Announced SHARON, PA. - Rocket power, which scientists harnessed to propel planes and projectiles through the air, has been adapted for use under the sea, Westinghouse Electric corporation announced with approval of the army air forces.

A new aerial torpedo-called the hydro-bomb - uses the thrust of burning, expanding gases to propel itself through water instead of air and can stand the shock of being dropped 600 feet or more from a plane going 300 miles an hour, F. L. Snyder, a company engineering manager, said.

The engine of the hydro-bomb, he explained, is a large pipe packed with solid fuel which, when burning. creates expanding gases that are expelled through a nozzle. When the torpedo hits the water, the impact throws a switch that ignites the rocket motor's solid fuel. Electrical controls with a gyroscope keep the bomb on its path and special controls regulate its underwater depth.

Protein Diet A diet rich in protein may compensate partially for a deficiency in the B vitamin, pantothenic acid, it is indicated in rat experiments at the University of California. The researchers fed one set of rats on a pantothenic acid deficient diet which contained 64 per cent casein, and another set on the deficient diet containing only 24 per cent casein. The rats on the high protein diet grew much larger and lived longer than those on a low protein diet. One explanation is that in the very high protein diet there is necessarily a decreased level of carbohydrate, and it is believed that pantothenic acid may be used up in the process of the body's utilization of carbohydrates. Other possible explanations are that factors in the casein, such as traces of pantothenic acid, amino acid, phosphorus, or unknown constitutents, may promote the compensation.

#### Peruvian Paint

Paintings in color have been found on prehistoric buildings in Peru, and in modern times paint manufacture is making rapid strides in the ancient land of the Incas. A recent report says that there will soon be 14 paint factories in Peru and that Peruvian factories are now producing almost three-fifths of the paint consumed in Peru. The types produced in Peru are oil, water, emulsion and marine paints, common enamels, nitrocellulose lacquers and spirit varnishes. Figures from five paint factories give the following production percentages: Oil paints, 50 per cent; water paints, 25 per cent; emulsion paints, 8 per cent; marine paints. 2 per cent; enamels and lacquers, 10 per cent, and varnishes 5 per cent.

# Trees Autumnal Color

Left-over sugar is mainly responsible for many of the brilliant shades of autumn foliage, according to the department of agriculture. Many suppose that frost is responsible for the color changes, but colors change before cold weather as the trees prepare for winter.

All during the spring and summer, the leaves have served as factories, where the foods necessary for the tree's growth have been manufactured. This food-making takes place in numberless tiny cells of the leaf and is carried on by small green bodies which give the leaf its color. These chlorophyll bodies make the food for the tree by combing carbon taken from the air with hydrogen, oxygen and various minerals supplied in the water which the roots gather.

In the fall when the cool weather causes a slowing down of the vital processes, the work of the leaves comes to an end. The machinery of the leaf factory is dismantled; the chlorophyll is broken up into the various substances of which it here is composed, and whatever food there is on hand is sent to the body of the tree to be stored for use in the spring. All that remains in the cell cavities of the leaf is a watery substance in which a few oil globules and crystals, and a small number of yellow, strongly refractive bodies can be seen. These give the leaves the yellow coloring so familiar in the autumnal foliage.

It often happens that there is more sugar in the leaf than can readily be transferred back to the tree. When this is the case, the chemical combination with other substances produces many color shades.

#### Michigan Cities Adopt Standard Traffic Laws

A unique traffic law enforcement plan designed to save both drivers and police from a labyrinth of confusing regulations was activated recently in five Michigan cities. The new plan involving use of a standardized traffic violation ticket in Saginaw, Bay City, Jackson, Battle Creek and Kalamazoo is aimed at reduction of accidents by making violations and penalties for reckless driving uniform over a multi-city area.

Use of the plan in more Michigan cities is anticipated following the experimental period during which some changes in details may be expected. Out-of-town drivers will profit by knowing from experience at home what regulations and enforcement procedure to expect in other cities. The plan was devised by the Michigan police chief's association in co-operation with the state safety commission and other agencies.

Implementing the plan is a new traffic violation ticket listing six principal violations which have been found to account for more than 80 per cent of traffic accidents. These include speeding, improper passing and disobeying stop sign or light. Each violation has a hazard rating allowing numerical tabulation of the seriousness of any infraction.

Nutrient X Research on Nutrient X-still a puzzle to food chemists and nutrition workers-is leading to a better understanding of eating habits and how the body makes use of foods. Nutrient X is a food factor that scientists have not yet been able to isolate in pure form. It seems to have the properties of a vitamin and apparently plays an important part in the palatability of food. "Palatability" of food, as regarded by science, depends not only on the "taste" of the food offered but also on the need of the body for the food and the use the body will be able to make of the food if it is eaten. This is how the white rats used in the Nutrient X studies have reacted: Lacking sufficient Nutrient X stored in their bodies, these rats would not eat enough of a diet deficient in X to keep them growing well. Supplied with Nutrient X, the rats ate more of the same diet and grew better. It was not necessary to add the Nutrient X to the diet. It could be fed separately or injected into the rats. If they were sup-

plied with Nutrient X the diet

proved more palatable.

Corn Borer Reports of the development of a corn said to suffer no damage from the European corn borer are unduly optimistic, say agronomists of the department of agriculture. For many years the department has been attempting to develop a corn resistant to this insect, and as a result many different strains have been tested, and some have been found to suffer less injury under borer attack than others. In general, say the agronomists, strongstalked strains are less likely to lodge under heavy borer infestations than weak-stalked strains. Since most good hybrids are more resistant to lodging than open-pollinated varieties, the hybrids, as a class, they say, have suffered less damage than open-pollinated corn. Some day, say the corn breeders, hybrids immune to the corn borer may be developed, but for the present farmers should grow strongstalked hybrids and follow the recommended farming practices if they wish to keep borer dan a practical minimum.

#### Penicillin Proves Effective

Treatment for Anthrax Penicillin has come to the aid of

workers whose occupations bring them in contact with animal hides or other animal products. This antibiotic drug has been found effective in the treatment of a burrowing infectious disease of the skin known as anthrax, according to an article in the Journal of the American Medical association. The anthrax bacillus is transmitted to man through contact with diseased animals or infected animal products. Anthrax is characterized by a gangrenous carbuncle-like lesion surrounded by swelling and an abnormal accumulation of water in the tissues. The disease is always

Reporting on 25 cases, the authors say that in several patients the infection occurred at sites of previous wounds. One of these lesions appeared at the site of a cigaret burn on the face, two developed at sites of abrasions on the fingers and one occurred in a hangnail. Among the remaining 20 patients several believed that they had had ordinary pimples at the sites where anthrax lesions later

Treatment was begun as soon as diagnosis was made, the article states. All patients were treated with penicillin in total dosages from approximately one million units to over four million units. The authors find it significant that in 22 of these cases the anthrax bacilli disappeared from the lesions in 24 hours or less.

#### Unpleasant Speaking Voice Can Be Corrected

To some persons, voice is a great asset - to other it is a definite handicap. But in most cases, an unpleasant speaking voice is the result of bad habits, such as speaking from the throat in a high, thin voice, rather than from the diaphragm. Effort spent in breathing control and in keeping the voice pitched low, will often bring all the improvement which is needed.

Another common mistake, especially for teen-agers, is the tendency to slur words together and to be lazy about enunciating properly. Speaking slowly, and being conscious of enunciating distinctly, is probably the only practice necessary for correction of this had

Many persons have a tendency to speak with a nasal quality which is very unpleasant to the ears. Just breathing from the diaphragm in order to bring the more natural voice out rich and full.

#### Cracker Box Gave

Medern Packaging Start Modern packaging of consumer goods in folding paper cartons,

which has had a profound influence both on American business and homemaking, is really only a little older than the airplane. Although folding paper boxes were known as early as the Civil war, it was not until the 1890s that they came into

use on a nation-wide scale. Today thousands of products of widely diversified industries ranging from food to hardware are packaged in paper cartons. Annual production of folding paper boxes totals approximately two million tons. Demand, running well ahead of supply, is more than 50 per cent greater

than before the war. A soda cracker indirectly provided the impetus for this modern development in packaging. In 1896 the manufacturers of a new type cracker realized their product would not remain fresh if marketed in the old-time cracker barrel, exposed to air, moisture, dirt and breakage. A folding paper box was devised, having a printed decorative overwrap bearing the product trade name. The new carton sealed the crackers in, kept them fresh and sanitary. It was easy to carry, to open, and to store in the pantry. Besides, it speeded shopping. Clerks did not have to weigh and package each purchase. Mod. bring results. ern merchandising of non-durable consumer goods in paper cartons carrying prominent brand and manufacture identification is generally conceded to date from this event. which was advertised nationally.

#### Farm Real Estate Taxes Take Big Jump in 1945

Average farm real estate taxes per acre for the nation as a whole in 1945 were more than 10 per cent higher than in 1944. This is the largest year-to-year change in more than a decade. Taxes per \$100 of real estate value declined slightly in 1945, principally because of rising land values. Changes in taxes per acre for the individual states were characterized by a wide range of increases. In only two states did taxes per acre decrease from 1944, the decline being small in each.

The pressures that led to increased taxes in 1945 are similar to those which brought sharp increases during and immediately after World War I. But there are certain significant differences between the two periods. These differences relate particularly to the position of property taxes in the state and local revenue systems and to the allocation among the levels of government of fiscal responsibility for various functions.

In contrast to the situation during the World War I period, many states have been relying heavily upon motor fuel, income and retail sales taxes. Rising price levels tend to increase the revenues from taxes such as those on incomes and retail sales and to that extent to reduce the pressure for increases







Army to Raise Food . Guatemala plans to have its army raise at least 50 per cent of the food it consumes, according to a report received from the Middle America information bureau. The reasons given for this are twofold. First, by growing its own food, this army will help conserve the world food supply by permitting the food it would ordinarily purchase to be consumed within the contry or to be shipped abroad. 5 cond, the soldiers of this Middle American republic will learn modern farming methods in preparation for their return to civilian life. Guatemala like the other ten republics of Middle America, is predominantly agricultural and it hopes to assure its prosperity by teaching scientific farming to its future landowners. Main crops are coffee, bananas, sugar, essential oils and cacao. In addition, there are the vast rubber, chicle and mahogany forests.

Peshtigo Fire

The Peshtigo fire-so called for the town in Wisconsin near where it started-broke out October 8, 1871, a few days before the Chicago fire. Though less known than the latter conflagration the tragedy of Peshtigo took a greater toll of lives and the fire roared with hurricane speed over 1,280,000 acres of forests. It burned up towns, villages, sawmills and farms. Peshtigo, a busy logging town of 2,000 people, was reduced to ashes. Some of the town's people, mostly women and children, were rescued by ships on Lake Michigan and other people crowded into a river that ran through Peshtigo and escaped by ducking under water when the flames leaped out from the river banks. But 600 men, women and children died horrible deaths when the town turned into a furnace. It all happened in just one hour's time. In all. 1.500 persons in the region lost their lives.



#### Providence Mapping 'Desire Lines' for Traffic

A detailed "crigin and destination" traffic analysis of Providence, R. I., is forming the basis of the city master plan for thoroughfares by determining "desire lines"those lines along which traffic would flow if facilities were available. The American Society of Planning Officials reports that the thoroughfare plan is designed to serve as the framework for a 20year redevelopment program in which the traffic network forms both the circulatory system and the skeleton on which the "Providence of the Future" will be built.

The Providence city plan commission considers traffic of primary importance to the overall master plan not only in terms of present traffic angles to be unsnarled but also because the proposed expressway system will serve as the framework within which neighborhoods and districts can be developed into a congruent community

Recent origin and destination surveys to discover traffic "desire lines" have disclosed that mounting traffic congestion in Providence -typical of so many cities in the postwar period--is caused almost altogether by local rather than through traffic. Only 21/2 per cent of the 418,000 or more vehicles moving daily within metropolitan Providence are bound from one point outside the city to another

#### Fire-Proofing Furnishings

Reduces Fire Hazards Fire - proofing curtains, drapes and some other types of household

fabrics as well as certain kinds of clothing will go far in reducing fire hazards in many rural homes, especially those where open flame lamps and heating stoves are used. One of the best fire-proofing solutions for household fabrics and clothing consists of seven ounces of borax and three ounces of boric acid dissolved in two quarts of hot water. Both borax and boric acid may be obtained at any drug

Materials may be treated with this solution by simply dipping them or spraying with a common garden sprayer. While treated fabrics will char when exposed to a flame, they will not flare up. Fireproofing fabrics with this solution has no effect on their appearance and they are made more resistant to the injurious action of sulphur gases given off by burning coal and illuminating gas. Fabrics so treated must be treated again after being laundered since the chemicals will be removed during he washing process.

#### Gem Fortune Returned

To Yank Owner in Japan TOKYO.-A lost packet of jewels valued at several million yen was recovered for its owner-Henry T. Trinke, civilian employee of the U. S. 46th engineer construction bat-

A Japanese truck driver found the paper bag of treasure and turned it in at police headquarters.

Trinke, who gave the finder a 30,000 yen (\$2,000) reward, acquired the jewels legally in the United States, the Allied headquarters public relations officer explained.

Trinke, World War I veteran whose home is Racine, Wis., could not be reached for comment. He earns \$1.49 an hour on his job here. His personnel records list a wife and three children in Racine, the army reported, and recount among previous jobs the presidency of an ice cream company in Burlington, Wis., and work as a contractor in Racine. He came to Japan as chief

cook on a merchant marine ship. Headquarters had no information on his fortune in jewels, except that had been legally acquired in America. The packet contained one platinum broach studded with 175 diamonds, one gold ring and seven diamonds, one platinum ring with a diamond and 226 small diamonds.

#### Seize Estate of Il Duce.

Ignore Pleas of Widow ROME.—The properties of Benito Mussolini have been confiscated on

behalf of the Italian people. Overruling pleas of Il Duce's widow, Donna Rachele, and of his children that they would be left without means of support if the entire estate were taken for Il Duce's sins, the 10th section of the supreme court agreed with the finance ministry's contentions that everything should be taken. The court gave no indication of the size of the estate.

It reserved the right to investigate the economic status of the family, and if their situation proved desperate, make provision for it.

Representatives of the family, during the court session, formally denied dispatches from Naples published here that Mussolini's younggest children, Romano and Anna Maria, had opened a cabaret in a fisherman's hut at Ischia.



Admitting Crime.
