It may be doubted whether such restraints would be enforceable. What we need at bottom is not 'anti-labor legislation' but the repeal of anti-employer legislation. People are not born employers; they become employers by choice, and they can quit by choice if too much discouraged. Unless we restore to the employer the freedom to select his own employes, the freedom to hire and discharge solely on the basis of what is good for the business, we cannot maintain discipline, efficiency, or production-which means that we cannot maintain living standards.'

A CONSERVATIVE VIEWPOINT.

Once in a great while the National Association of Manufacturers issues a public statement of more than ordinary importance. It did so the other day, when it pointed out the fact Plan Big Time that the financial situation of the people of this country is far better than painted by some of the bureaucrats in Washington. Says the National Association of Manufacturers:

The American people have considerably more 'spendable money' and potential purchasing power than the recent government survey of liquid assets in the hands of the public indicated, according to an analysis of the survey issued today by the National Association of Manufacturers.

"The government survey, made by the Bureau of Agricultural Economics for the Federal Reserve Board, indicated the total of 'personal liquid assets' amount to \$8 billion. The NAM experts believe this is far below the true figures, which may be more than double this amount when all forms of liquid assets are considered.

"The 'good theoretical work' of the survey, NAM analysts found, was offset by failure to take into account some important types of assets which represent huge holdings. For instance, government interviewers compiled careful listings of the amount of money in savings and checking accounts of Mayflower Vet Post individuals, but did not take into account their holdings in actual currency, although money in circulation stands at a near record peak. Other major omissions were the amount invested in corporate securities, insurance, etc.

"Another serious shortcoming of the survey, according to NAM, was that the interviewers generally talked to the man of the house. And the man in the American home frequently isn't the one who knows the answers about domestic finances, even how much money is in the bank and especially about plans for future spending.

School Teachers **And More Pay**

Taxpayers of the Plymouth school districts are faced with sity of raising about \$7,000 in additional taxes to take care of a demand that has been made by teachers for the payment of two weeks' salary they did not receive during the depression in 1933.

A petition signed by 16 teachers who were employed by the school district at that time and Plymouth school faculty, has been received by the board of educa-tion asking for the payment of these back wages.

The petition points out that inasmuch as the teachers in Detroit have secured from the supreme court a favorable decision upon a similar request which had been made to the school district in Detroit, they believe that the teachers who served here two weeks without pay, should also be paid for the two weeks in which they received no pay.

In addition to the pay for the two weeks, the teachers say they should be given interest at 6 percent, which the supreme court has allowed in the Detroit case. The teachers who signed the
