garage, now in the final stages of construction, is to be heated by the modern radiant floor heat system. It is believed to be the first such heating system installed in Plymouth.

In brief, the system is a regular hot-water heating plant minus raditators. The coils, or pipes, all are installed in the flooring of the structure. In addition all joints are welded so the entire system is actually one continuous coil. A booster pump is used to keep the water circulating. In the case of the West Brothers an oil burn-

er will heat the boiler. The pipes in the garage are being installed on a bed of pea gravel, five inches in depth. When the installation is completed and the welding all done, the concrete floor will be poured right over the pipes, or heating coils.

The system is the latest in heating methods and has become quite popluar for commercial structures, the West Brothers report. Installation of the system is progressing slowly due to the

difficulty experienced in obtaining the materials. Providing no more delays are encountered the garage should be ready to open early this spring. The structure is 82 by 100 and will house the West Brothers implement sales and service plus a modern farm supply store.
