UNIFIED MILITARY FORCES.

A thoughtful reader of The Plymouth Mail the other day sent to the office a folder strongly advocating a single department for national defense. So much common sense was contained in the material that we are reprinting a portion of it Plymouth Girl Scouts are sponfor the benefit of our readers.

In part it follows:

"Both military policy and grand strategy are directed at increasing the EFFECTIVENESS of the Armed Forces. A business organization is never efficient if it is not properly organized, yet the biggest business in the country—the Armed Forces of the Untied States—is in the hands of two departments of equal authority, each of them often in complete ignorance about what the other is doing, and frequently in virtual defiance of the other. Each, for example, has its own Air Force. While carrier-based aircraft should continue to be an integral part of the fleet, the nation can no more afford the waste and inefficiency of two complete and independent Air Forces than it can afford two independently run armies or navies.

"Under the strain of recovering from the tremendous expenditures of war, military planning is faced with constant demands of ECONOMY. But with both the Army Air Forces and the Navy spending large sums of money for identical things, billions of dollars will ultimately be wasted. You can provide your own examples of expensive, unnecessary duplication between the Air Forces and the Navy. You can remember from your own experience the duplicated air strips, aircraft and aircraft equipment, air transport systems, training of pilots and air crews, hospitals, food, and many other

"Our national defense is based on military policy. Like our foreign policy and domestic policy, the military policy of the nation should reflect a majority view of the best methods for a unified effective fighting force in the advent of war. With an Army on the one hand and a Navy on the other, each planning in secrecy, securing separate appropriations and conducting duplicating efforts, intelligent over-all military planning is impossible.
