

Members of Plymouth's Rotary club started their drive to raise \$25,000.00 this week, the funds to be dsed for the purpose of constructing a lighted football field directly in the rear of the present

The project, one of the greatest ever undertaken by any civic group, is now under construction and before the month is over Rotarians hope to have new grass growing on the field. In addition to a football and baseball field a running track will also be con-

structed within a fenced-in area on the property.

Plymouth's development of a lighted football field is not new to this area since most schools already have similar fields and Northville civic groups are completing a concrete stadium on the field that they constructed last fall.

School officials who are planning the grounds estimate that the actual cost of the ground work will be about \$3,000.00. 

### Potato Top-Soil

Rather striking news is that a few inches of top-soil can mean the difference of as much as 43 bushels of potatoes over yields obtained from eroded land. The findings of O. R. Neal of Rutgers university were that soils with six inches of top-soil or less averaged 194 bushels of petatoes per acre, while those with more than six inches of ton-soil accraged 242 bushels. They may be taught to turn away from the table or food when sneezing, to cover the mouth with a handkerchief when coughing, and never to cat food which has fallen upon the floor.

### Mending Art

Mending is one of the humbler arts. The type and thickness of thread to be used is related, of course, to the fabric on which the mending is to be done. 

# Ordinance No. 127

THE CITY OF PLYMOUTH ORDAINS:

Section 1. Section three of said ordinance is hereby amended to read as follows: At the time of issuing such license, the City Clerk shall deliver to the licensee a tag made of some durable material, containing the number of the license duly stamped thereon, the words "Licensed, Plymouth, Michigan" and the date of expiration. The shape and style of said tag shall be changed on June 1st of each year. For such license the City Clerk shall at the time of issuing same, collect from each applicant and pay into the City Treasury, the sum of three dollars (\$3.00) for each female dog and one dollar (\$1.00) for each male dog. The license fee for a de-sexed dcg shall be the same as for a male dog. If a certificate of vaccination for rabies, signed by a licensed veterinary surgeon, certifying that the dog to be licensed has been immunized against rabies, shall be presented, and such certificate shall not be dated more than iwo years prior to the expiration date of the license, said Clerk shall issue a license with the word "Vaccinated" thereon. Provided further that the licensing provision of this ordinance shall not apply to any dog under the age of six months. Provided further that for each license issued after June 1st of each year, except on dogs which have become six months subseguent thereto, but not more than thirty (30) days prior to filing applications with the City Clerk for such license, the City Clerk shall charge fifty cents (50c) in addition to the regular fee. With each license tag issued the City Clerk shall furnish a certificate showing a description and age of the dog, name and address of the owner,

The months of May and June are good months to begin the control of weeds in lawns with 2, 4-D, says E. I. Besemer, county agricultural agent for Wayne County. # Still Advancing

Shortage This Year

Fertilizer prospects for 1947 are about the same as for 1946. Careful planning and wise use of fertilizers will help stretch short supplies, says J. F. Davis, extension specialist in soils at Michigan State called igan State college.

More efficient placing methods will stretch limited fertilizer supplies. Experimental results show that for beans and sugar beets, fertilizer is most efficiently applied in a band approximately one inch to the side of and one and one-half inches below the seed level.

Certain crops used in rotation respond more to fertilizer than others. Fertilizer intended for the corn crop will be more effective if applied to sugar beets, legume seedings, tomatoes, or small grains. Fertilization is particularly important when seedings are to be made with the small grains.

If substitute grades of fertilizer low in potash or nitrogen are used, row crops can be side-dress-ed with these materials later in the season. Manure should be conserved and used carefully. Minor elements should sometimes be used in addition to regular fertilizer. County agricultural agents or the Michigan State college soils science department can make recommendations for their use.

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# Clean-Up Day Can Save Lives

Spring clean-up days may save your life or limb, or those of your

Pointing out this fact, Dr. William DeKleine, State Health Commissioner today advised, "Check up, clean up and repair for health's sake and to prevent home accidents."

The annual spring housecleaning and lawn clean up offers every householder an opportunity to eliminate health hazards and causes of preventable home accidents and deaths. Rats, houseflys and mosquitos are known health hazards; they should be killed and their habitats removed. Accidents do not just occur; they goes without saying that no gasoare caused. To prevent accidents it is necessary to recognize when and how they occur. A check up can then reveal remedial hazards which may save life and limbs.

Rats, we are told, have killed more people than all the wars of history. They carry deadly fleas which transport disease into pantry, kitchen, dairy, cellar or granary. The rat thrives on open garbage or uncovered food or vegetables. Homes should be ratproofed. This includes elimination of small holes around pipes, durable screening for basement windows, and gratings for ventilators and sewer openings. Metal

cause practically as many deaths as all motor vehicle accidents Home accidents took 1385 Mich-

igan lives in 1946. More than half of these deaths, 751, died as the result of falls; 252 died from fires, burns and explosions; and 109 died from mechanical suffocation. Of those who died from falls, 669 were over 65 years of age and 105 were from from 45 to 65 years and explosions were distributed through all ages with the fewest occuring between 15 and 25 years of age. Of the deaths from mechanical suffocation, 85 were among children under five years

Firearms accidents took 38 lives of which 13 were between 5 and 14 years of age. Poisons killed 35 in their homes. Twelve of these were under five years of age. Poison gas caused 34 deaths of which 20 were of persons over 45 years of age. All other home accidents took 92 lives. Thirtyeight of these were children under five years of age.

"During the coming year many hundreds of people will suffer injuries or lose their lives while at home. Whether your house will contribute to this number depends on your own action, now. A room y room check during clean up

days can uncover remedial hazards and save life and limb", Commissioner DeKleine said. The kitchen is the most dangerous room in the house. Gas stoves

and electrical appliances should have their annual inspection. Drawers for sharp cutlery should be out of reach of small children. Insecticides, ammonia, cleaning fluids, silver polish, lye and bleaches should be put on a shelf out of reach of small children. Cleaning with gasoline or inflamable material in the kitchen or enclosed area should be avoided. Care should be used that pails or tubs of hot water are not left unguarded, and that handles or pans containing hot fluids are turned away from the edge of the stove. Care should used in selecting wax for the floor, and the linoleum should lie flat. It line or kerosene should be used to start a range fire. Insecticides should not be used near uncover-

Bathrooms are also hazardous. No electrical appliances should be used in the bathroom, because of danger of shock. Contact with electrical fixtures while hands are wet or any part of the body is in water should be avoided. This goes for turning on bathroom lights, electric sweepers or electric razors. ### How to Rid Your Home of Moth Pest

Many new preparations are on the market today to rid your home of moths, but your first method of attack should be good

housekeeping.

Ray L. Janes, Michigan State college entomologist, believes that regular and thorough cleaning of closets, carpeted floors and places where lint collects is very important. Wall to wall carpeting is very likely to become infested with moths.

On sunny days hang clothing, carpets and rugs out-of-doors. Beating rugs is another way to control moths because it kills them in different stages of development. Frequent brushing is helpful for clothing.

After you have taken all the clothing from our closets to air and sun it, apply a five percent DDT refined kerosene solution to the walls and ceiling. Use a coarse spray and don't run the liquid from the walls.

Clothes which are stored between seasons should be given chemical protection. Alternate layers of clothing with layers of PDB (paradichlorobenzene). Separate the chemical from the clothing with layers of paper.

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

# YEARS Heavy Winter Loss of Bees

Reports coming into the apiary office, State Department of Agriculture, from honey produc-ers and Department Field Inspectors indicate a much heavier winter loss in bees than normal, especially in the north and northeast part of the state. Winter losses of unpacked bees are reported all the way from 15% to 50%, and from 5 per cent to 20 per cent in these that were packed. Reports would indicate the heaviest loss in the Thumb area among unpacked bees.

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
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
