THE QUEENSLAND—The trouble with many contemporary (modern) homes is that they range over so much territory that they are beyond the price level of the modern-inclined family that must build on a limited budget.

The Queensland is a contemporary home designed especially for those who must watch costs carefully. Under an attractive hipped roof its floor plan arranges logically in the modern fashion. The living room is large and open to light and air on three sides. The kitchen is in front looking out over the street on what, since the advent of the automobile, has become the least attractive outlook of most plots. Like most modern houses, this house need not have a cellar. An adequate heater room is provided in the first floor. For those who insist on a basement the detailed working drawings provide a cellar alternate.

From a flag stone terrace, one enters a vestibule equipped with a good coal closet. A turn to the right and one enters the large living room. The kitchen opens to the left of the vestibule and is large enough for a permanent dining alcove. This is attractively placed in the corner window giving unobstructed views up and down the street. To balance the corner window in the dining alcove, a similar window is placed in the bedroom on the other side of the house. The exterior effect achieves the symmetry of fenestration that is a fundamental of good architecture. And, on the inside the use of corner windows in two strategic spots helps to make the atractive arrangement of furniture easy.

That method gives the ducks no rest at any time during the hunting season.

Here's an idea that has been floating through our mind-why wouldn't it be better conservation to open the duck season for three days each week during the fall? That would give duck hunters three days to try their luck during each week and it would give ducks four days each week in which to do a little feeding. Aa it is now the duck hunters keep pestering the ducks so much that they do not have time to hunt for food on the lakes and rivers where they generally land on their southward flights.

Then, too, it would give the duck hunters a little better chance to get some good shooting. As it is now, ducks are kept all stirred up from the day the season opens until it ends, with duck hunters getting no good opportunities to do any shooting.

Maybe it would'nt work and maybe it would. At any rate something has got to be done, or else there will be no duck hunting in another half dozen years.



A. 1925, hereby orders that for a period of one year from October 1, 1947, it shall be unlawful to hunt, take, or kill or attempt to hunt, take, or kill any ruffed grouse in the part of the state south of the north line of Township 16 North, including all of Huron County, except during the period from October North, including all of Huron County, except during the period from October 15 to October 26, inclusive.

In all areas of the state open to the taking or ruffed grouse it shall be unlawful to take more than three ruffed grouse in one day, to have more than
