A 1948 construction and system expansion program amounting to \$40,681,600 has been approved by the board of directors of Consumers Power Company, D. E. Karn, vice president and general manager, announced today. It is the largest one-year construction program in the company's history.

"Use of electricity and gas in the territory served by the company has been increasing rapidly," Mr. Karn said "Expansion of our electric and gas systems has been restrained from keeping pace. For several years, wartime restrictions prevented expansion. Since then, construction work has been slowed by material shortages and other conditions. That I means that our construction program during 1948 and each of the next few years must be much

It is planned as a part of this 1948 program to invest a total of \$17,829,200 in the construction, enlargement and improvement of power plants. Much of this money will go into the new B. C. Cobb Plant, now under construction in Muskegon. The Cobb Plant is scheduled to go into service in September. At first it will have two 60,000-kilowatt generating units. Construction work will continue at the plant, and late in 1949 another 60,000-kilowatt unit is scheduled to go into operation.

Also in the program is major construction work at the John C. Weadock Plant at Essexville, near Bay City. A new 50,000-kilowatt unit at this plant will go into service in March, and construction work will continue, looking toward the installation of two more 60,000-kilowatt units, the first of which is scheduled to go into service late in 1949, and the second early in 1950.

Expansion of the Bryce E. Morrow Plant at Kalamazoo will begin early in 1948, and a new 60,-000-kilowatt unit will go into service, according to present plans,

"These seven new generating units—three at Cobb, three at Weadock and one at Morrowwill increase our electric generating capacity more than 60 per cent," Mr. Karn said.

The program includes 1948 and many substations. They are needed, Mr. Karn said, to facilitate the interchange of power between major population centers, to establish new power distribution centers and to serve large industrial customers.

To serve additional electric customers it is planned to extend and improve electric distribution lines throughout the 51-county area served by the company. The cost of these line extensions as estimated at \$10,650,000. They will take electric service to about 20,000 additional customers living in cities and villages and to additional customers in areas. It is expected that about 5,000 other rural customers, now living along existing distribution lines, will be connected in

Consumers already serves more han 90,000 farm customers—a larger number than any other company in America-and the 1948 program will bring the total to more than 100,000. The company operates 20,000 miles of distribution lines and will add 1,800 more in 1948.

Gas department projects, in-cluding many distribution system improvements and extensions in various areas, are estimated at \$2,227,800. These do not include the storage field (and transmission line projects of the Michigan Gas Storage Company, a subsidiary of Consumers, which is developing one of the Country's largest storage field projects in Clare, Osceola and Missaukee



Tells How Meats Can Be Stored

The home meat supply is important in these days of high prices for meat. According to E.

D. Farwell, animal husbandry specialist at Michigan State college, proper curing, smoking and storing are necessary to insure success with home butchering.

Figure the curing time as follows: Two and one-half to three days per pound per piece for hams and shoulders and two days per pound per piece for bacons. If using the dry cure, rub one-half the curing mixture on all surfaces of the meat, using a heavier layer on the thicker cuts. Pack the cuts in a clean wooden barrel or crock, being careful not to shake off the THE PROPERTY OF THE PROPERTY O curing mixture. After six to eight days, take the meat out of the and the contraction of the contr

After curing, the meat should be washed with warm water and soaked for an hour in cool water and hung in the smokehouse to drain for 24 hours before smoking. For smoking use any green hardwood. The meat should be hung six to eight feet from the fire and so the pieces do not touch each other. Smoke for about 36 hours with a slow, smouldering

In storing, the pieces of meat should be wrapped in grease resistant paper before being placed in a protective outer bag. The bags can then be hung in a dark, cool, dry, rat-free place

Fresh meat should be chilled promptly after slaughter to 36 to 40 degrees Fahrenheit and kept at this temperature during the curing process. Farwell recommends the following curing ingredients for each 100 pounds of meat in dry cure: seven pounds of salt, two pounds of sugar, and two ounces of salt peter. For brine cure, these ingredients can be mixed with four gallons of water for each 100 pounds of

cure and result the hams and shoulders with the remainder of the curing mixture.

If a brine solution is used, pack the fresh cuts in a clean barrel or crock and cover with the brine. Then place a weight on top to keep the meat from floating. In making the brine, boiling water that has been cooled should be used to avoid contamination. The meat in the brine solution should be overhauled three times at weekly intervals. When overhauling, turn the cuts over and place the cuts from the bottom of the crock or barrel on top.

Food takes a big share of everyone's income at the present time and naturally the homemaker will try to keep her grocery bills as low as possible. Economizing on food is smart only when it is done without sacrificing food value." Gambling with the health of the family is never wise.

Fortunately grocers' stocks will nclude foods which give the careful shopper a good return for the money. Often the main difference between choosing a food that offers a good value and one that is almost a luxury is only the matter of taking a less fancy grade.

This is a good season of the year for all kinds of citrus fruits so plentiful supplies of oranges, grapefruits and tangerines are in the stores. There will be much more juice for the money from the smaller and medium fruits-that means more delicious flavor and more vitamins A and C for the money spent.

To give the family the most good from the fruit chill the oranges and squeeze them just before serving. While there may be only a small loss of Vitamin C when the juice is stored in a TIGHTLY CLOSED jar in the refrigerator even that loss is important in these days of high food costs. Then too the flavor of freshly squeezed juice is definitely better.

After the rich foods of the noliday meals the tart sweetness of oranges makes them tempting for dessert as well as for the breakfast eye-opener. Their ease of preparation appeals to homemakers who are ready to take things a bit easy after the holiday

enameled container. Cook slowly until tender, from 2 to 21/2 hours. Measure cooked fruit and divide into batches of about 2 quarts each. Bring to boiling point and di cup sugar for each cup fruit. Boil rapidly until mixture jells, from 30 to 60 minutes. Pour into sterilized glasses and cover at once with thin layer of melted paraffin. When cold add a second

thin layer of paraffin.

For people who like a more tangy spread the combination of citrus fruits in marmalade is at-

Citrus Marmalade One grapefruit, 1 orange

lemon, water and sugar. Wash fruit, cut into quarters and cut into thin slices discarding core of grapefruit and seeds Measure and add 3 times as much water. Let stand overnight in earthenware, glass or enameled container. Next morning boil for 10 minutes. Let stand overnigh' and boil for 2 hours or until ten-

Measure cooked fruit, dividing into batches of about 2 quart each. Add an equal amount of sugar and boil until mixture jells. for about 1 hour, stirring occasionally to prevent scorching Seal in sterilized glasses.

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

Beginning February 1, the conservation department is shifting responsibility for field activities from its office in Lansing to regional offices in Marquette, Roscommon and Jackson.

Regional administration should provide faster and more efficient service for the public, P. J. Hoffmaster, conservation director, said in announcing the change. After 27 years' steady development, the department has outgrown its original centralized organization, he said.

Provisionally named as regional chiefs are Dorias J. Curry for the upper peninsula, Harry L. Aldrich for the northern half of the lower peninsula, Harry L. Aldrich for the northern half of the lower peninsula, and Paul F. Hickie for southern Michigan. Curry and Aldrich now are regional supervisors for the department's field administration division in their respective regions, and Hickie is a former upper peninsula game division supervisor who recently returned from Japan after serving as chief forester on the staff of General Mac-

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


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
