"I am not in favor of going to the Federal Government for a handout of federal funds for highways. I believe that Michigan is big enough and wealthy enough to finance its own highway system

without the strings that are attached to federal allotment. "The situation is this, however. The Federal Government collects 1½c a gallon gasoline tax which takes out of Michigan about \$20,000,000 per year. With their one cent a quart lubricating oil tax, they collect another \$8,000,000 per year, and conservatively figuring, from excise tax on automobiles, tires, parts, etc., another \$32,000,000 per year. This makes a total of about \$60,000,000 per year.

"As long as this is being taken out of this state, Michigan should not lose its allotted share of it for highway purposes. The allotment to Michigan under the post-war federal three year highway program is about \$16,500,000 per year or just a trifle over one fourth as much as the Federal Government takes out. As long as this Federal gas, oil, and excise tax is collected from Michigan motorists, we should demand, and see that we get every dollar of this back that we can."

If displayed either horizontally or vertically against a wall, the union should be uppermost and to the flag's own right; that is, to the observer's left. When displayed in a window of a home or a place of business, the flag should be displayed in the

If used on a speaker's platform above and behind the speaker. If appearances before the Rotary displayed flat, it should be placed staffed on a stage, speaker's plat-form or chancel of a church, it should occupy the position of honor and be placed at the cler-gyman or speaker's right, as he faces the congregation or audience. If used elsewhere than in the chancel or on the platform, it should be placed in the position of honor at the right of the congregation or audience as they face the platform.

The flag should not be flown during inclement weather, it should not ever be allowed to touch anything beneath it, such as the ground, floor, water, or merchandise. It should never be used as a drapery of any sort whatsoever, never fastooned, drawn back nor up in fold, but always allowed to fall free.

A nationwide crop disease forccasting service has been worked out by the U.S. Department of Agriculture and cooperative state colleges. Forecasting service in Michigan will apply particularly to the late blight diseases on pomany in Plymouth, and during tatoes and to-natoes. But it will also be concerned with such small grain diseases as blights, rusts, and smuts. As soon as any of these diseases appear in Michigan, farmers of the state will be notified at once.

Another Ford Ideal to Help Mankind Crumbles Little Dog Strays, to Earth With Closing of the Phoenix Plant But Not for Long

Only Women with Dependents Hired to **Operate Closed Factory** Which is Located in a Beautiful Flower Garden

These are not very happy days out around the Phoenix plant of the Ford Motor company. As a Ford industry, its doors have been closed for all time.

There is a bit of gloom and anxiety, too, in the homes of more than one widowed mother. Worry over what the future holds for them has come into the lives of daughters whose Ford earnings have been the chief support of aged, ailing parents. Why?

When the waterwheel stopped turning the other day out at the Phoenix plant and its equipment was removed and the doors locked securily, there passed into oblivion a truly remarkable humane ideal of the late Henry Ford—an ideal born with the object in view of creating for distracted widowed mothers a living of high standards and an income sufficiently large to bring up a family of fatherless children.

During his early days in the manufacturing business the late Mr. Ford discovered that there were bundreds of intelligent and highly competent women who were forced to become the bread winners of a family, often though

the untimely death of a husband.
Why couldn't the Ford organization find a way to provide employment for these women women who had to support children - women who had to support parents - women who had been called upon to carry the burdens that usually fall upon the shoulders of "the man of the house."

It was 26 years ago when Mr. Ford built a dam in the Rouge river a mile or so north of Plymouth on the Northville road. He built a factory there that year and named it the Phoenix plant of the Ford Motor company.

He equipped it with machinery for the making of a minor part of the Ford car. Then he directed that only family-supporting women be employed. A few men were engaged to do the "heavy" work around the plant.

He sent to Phoenix from his Highland Park plant Ivor Evans to act as superintendent of the new Phoenix factory. With Mr. Evans came Miss Frances Sullivan, another pioneer employe of ir. Ford in his o Highland Park.

Miss Sullivan was placed in direct charge of all of the activities of the 175 women who were

employed. A lover of flowers, she quickly transformed the grounds surrounding the building into a flower garden that would put to shame the Detroit flower show. 

To become eligible for benefits after a worker is disqualified for the duration of his unemployment he has to take a full-time permanent job and later become unemployed through no fault of his of the following grounds: new

However, if the claimant left one job to take a better one, and later is unemployed through no fault of his own, he may again become eligible for benefits, in proportion to the number of credit weeks he establishes with the new employer.

When he quit the first employer. he is automatically disqualified, but his credit weeks are reinstated, with the first employer, up to the maximum, as he stays on the new job. Should he earn 15 credit weeks with the new employer, he could pick up credit weeks with the previous employer, week of week, and be eligible for maximum benefits.

When a claimant refuses an offer of suitable work from the most recent employer, all credit weeks earned with that employer are automatically cancelled as of the date of refusal.

A claimant is automatically disqualified when his plant is shut down by a labor dispute in any of its departments.

He is also disqualified for any week in which he receives vacation with pay, or pay in lieu of notice (severance pay).

Woman claimants are disqualified for duration of unemployment when unemployment is

caused by pregnancy. A claimant is utterly disqualified and all credit weeks are cancelled if he makes a false statement, misrepresentation or conceals important information to establish benefits. He is also required to make restitution of illegally obtained benefits.

An employer, too may be penalized for making false or misleading statements or withholds information for the purpose of avoiding payment of benefits to a claimant. He may be penalized the amount of the total benefits

How do I request a redetermination?

In view of the above, I seriously doubt if the cost of building new houses will decline much for some years.
