Both newly elected commissioners have lived in Plymouth for a number of years; 16 for Mr. Latture and nine for Mr. Goddard. The former is on the teaching staff of Plymouth High school, holding the title of debate coach and instructor of government. He resides at

Mr. Goddard is affiliated as an engineering executive with the Goddard and Goddard company of Detroit. He and his family reside. at 1227 West Maple. City Manager-Harold Cheek states that the number of voters taking part in the balloting was good in view of the fact that it

was a city election, with only one issue up for vote. He also revealed that of the 1,000 votes cast, 15 were spoiled and one was blank.

In the primary election, when the water improvement program as well as the nominating of commissioners appeared on the ballot, a total of 768 votes were cast, falling 216 short of the valid number in Monday's polling. The cause of the increased number of ballots in the recent election may be attributed to the weather, or it may indicate increased interest on the part of Plymouth voters concern-

ing their city government. Commissioners whose terms are currently ending are Mayor Jack Taylor, who declined to run for reelection, and Dunbar Davis, who was defeated. Other commissioners serving Plymouth at the present time are William Hartmann, recently appointed to replace Robert Lidgard, Frank Henderson, and Ruth Whipple.

As parents are you concerned about the radio programs which your child listens to in the evening? Do you wonder if so many programs of horror and crime will have a harmful effect on your child?

Some critics feel that these programs can be the cause of delinquency and severe emotional disturbances. Others feel that such programs offer outlets for suspense, adventure and aggression. Mrs. Lennah K. Backus, child development specialist at Michigan State college, feels that you should consider whether the programs over-excite your child.

Exciting radio programs may tend to be too exciting for your child's point of view and being of some positive help to him is to listen with him to some of all, they are concentrated into an hour or an hour and a half of continuous programming. 

Michigan's department of con-servation announces that it will points out, Italy and Greece now soon begin planting one million legal size trout in the trout streams of Michigan. While many states are following this practice, there has been some question as to the benefits of it.

In fact at the recent Wildlife conference in St. Louis, it was pointed out that the practice was both expensive and of not much

In the Michigan legislature this week, a number of law-makers made it evident that it was their intention of recommending to the department more stream improvement and not so much planting. Meanwhile trout planting will continue in Michigan.

In the ordinary season the fisheries men can count on about 75 days suitable for trout planting, from shortly before the season opens in April to mid-August. On these 75 days the crews must average more than 13,000 legal size trout per day, in addition to other fish planting and routine hatchery work.

Even distribution of the big trout over thousands of miles of stream requires truck travel over remote trails seldom used by any vehicles other than light passenger cars. The planting operation itself takes considerable time, as the trout must be spread along the stream in likely places where they can find food until the angler finds them. The longer it takes for back roads to become passable, the greater the load on planting crews in midsummer.

Except for the lower part of Black river in Mackinac county where rainbow trout fishing starts April 15, the state's trout streams and trout lakes are open




