





The Panhandle Eastern pipeline company has been able deliver greatly increased amounts of natural gas daily to the Michigan Gas Storage company, a Consumers subsidiary which operates storage fields where natural gas brought by Panhandle from Texas, Oklahoma, and Kansas is held for winter use. Panhandle is not delivering the full 100,000,000 cubic feet per day called for by its contracts with Michigan Gas Storage, but deliveries during June have averaged 87,000,000 cubic feet per day.

Arrangements have been made to obtain larger deliveries of gas from the Howell field in Livingston county. Instead of only 4,000,000 cubic feet a day, period from October, 1 to March 31 daily deliveries may run as high as 10 to 12 million feet per

### **Canning Time**

IT'S TIME to roll up those sieeves again, and start taking out canning equipment. The corn is sweet and tender, the pea pods are full and green, and carrots are still in that nice young, crisp stage - all of which makes them can-worthy.

It's not a good idea to wait too long before putting up vegetables because the produce gets too old and, as you know, canning merely preserves, it works no wrinkle smooth or restores no color to old vegetables.

When you want a good product from the can, start with superior material. That means fresh from the garden produce, two hours from garden to can, if you can manage it. Here are some tips to select

good produce: Asparagus should be tender, green and freshly cut. If possible cut when it is no more than five inches tall so the ends of the stalks will have a minimum of woody

Only freshly picked green beans should be used as they dry easily upon standing. If you pick your own, then get them after the dew is off. Shapely, beautifully green ones can be canned whole.

Lima beans should be almost mature but still green in color as well as being very sweet and tender. It immature, they lack flavor; if too old, they are like dried lima beans.

Young beets, the size of a golf ball, are ideal for canning. Be careful not to break the skin or tap the roots of the boots in order to preserve the color.

Peas will not wait for canning because it takes only a few hours for peas to develop from the right stage, which is tender, sweet and slightly immature, to the point where they are starchy and not as good tasting. Gather pods early in in two or three pounds of the dethe morning, selecting those which are very green and crisp and well filled with peas.

PLAN TO HAVE all canning equipment ready by the time you go after your produce so that you can bring it into the house and start it on its way. If you just have to underprocess your food. go out into the garden to pick the Vegetables you can even start your water boiling for the precooking.

Fourth of July weekend accidents took 49 lives in Michigan last year. Holiday over-exertion and over-excitement doubtless took the other lives.

Automobile traffic took 22 lives; drowning and boating, 14 lives; and falls, 3 lives. Burns, suffocation, firearms, electrocution, gas poisoning, farming and trains accounted for the other accidental deaths on the three-day weekend.

Plymouth homemakers looking for main dish recipes which are filling and nutritional but inexpensive are offered 150 recipes and suggestions in a new booklet announced by Roberta Hershey, foods and nutrition extension specialist at Michigan State col-

Titled, Money Saving Main Dishes", the bulletin is offered by the Office for Food and Feed Conservation, at no charge to help ou save both money and scarce oods. The recipes were tested by the Bureau of Human Nutrition and Home Economics of the United States of Agriculture. You can get your copy of the 48-page sion office or from the Bulletin Office, Department of Public Relations, Michigan State college, East Lansing.

Secretary of Agriculture, Charles F. Brannan, states that day-to-day use of the recipes in the booklet may save you as much as 30 percent on meat alone. Suggestions for balanced, economical meals and tips for skill in cookery are included.

Following each "main dish" recipe are suggestions for other foods to complete the meal, and also for ways to vary the maindish recipe. ELTON R. EATON Every once in a while the Michigan Department of Health sends out a newspaper release that is worthwhile. The following is one of those "pieces" that is well worth reading

Page Isaac Walton! The Michigan Department of Health today came forth with at least five good reasons for going fishing.

"Fishing with its anticipation, enthusiasm, fresh air, sunshine, exercise, relaxation and good companionship can help a man live

happily and work well. A man needs a hobby. He needs pleasure. He needs relaxation and he needs to be out of doors. And then, too, the fish are good for him," the Department said.

The Department enjoined everyone who enjoys the sport to get out on the opening day or week end, but it also added some advice. Check your boat to be sure it is solid and will not leak and that its motor is in safe working order. Do not overload it with gear or people. Don't stand up in it or change-places while on the water. If you fish at night be sure you know the water on which you are fishing. Don't go out when a storm threatens or waves are high.

booklet from your county exten- If you can't swim to shore, you might take along a life preserver. Watch out for sunburn and sunstroke. Wear a hat, long sleeves and long trousers. The sun's rays, reflected from the water, are doubly potent so take along some sunburn lotion. Don't overdo and don't get over-excited.

Take along an insect repellant. Don't drink lake water; carry your own safe water.

Treat fish hook wounds, blisters and other injuries at once. A first aid kit is well worth the bother.

Don't lean way out of your boat. It is better to lose rod, reel and

than your life. If you are going to do any drinking, do it with your fish dinner

rather than when you are enroute to the lake or on the lake. . If you catch any fish, eat them. With their proteins, fat, calcium, iron and vitamins including A, thiamine, raboflavin and niacin, to to say nothing of their flavor, they're good for you.

There is no immediate hope of controlling the sea lampreys which are fast destroying the big lake trout of the Great Lakes. Michigan's department admits so in a recent press release. It does say that control of sea lampreys is shaping up as a Michigan-Wisconsin-Ontario problem, as the other six states bordering the Great Lakes are suffering so little damage from the parasites they quick stew with hamburg. With are less inclined to spend time and money in research on them.

The 1948 report of the Great Lakes sea lamprey committee reyeals New York, Pennsylvania, Ohio, Indiana, Illinois and Minnesota do not regard the sea lamprey as a serious threat to fishing in their waters at present. All are alert to possible changes, however, and Ohio fisheries research men are working on a key for identification of immature lampreys,

Michigan, Wisconsin and Ontario all are observing lamprey runs in streams, trapping lampreys at weirs on their spawning runs and studying the lamprey life cycle. The common fund of information about these undesirabel emigrants from the sea is growing, but fisheries men of the Michigan and other conservation departments recognize it may be years yet before enough is learned for practical control measures.

Wisconsin noted that the lampreys shun polluted streams. The U. S. Fish and Wildlife service, in interviews with commercial fish-July 4 weekend.

> The Wisconsin conservation department still believes in planting fish in its lakes and streams. While the Michigan conservationists do not profess to be against

fish planting, some of the leaders every once in a while raise a question as to the benefits of re-planting fish.

Wisconsin, without question, has the best muskellunge fishing in the country. The nearby state's conservation department has just announced that it has planted 410,000 muskellunge fingerlings in an effort to sustain the "population" of this most prized game fish.

We've never heard of any such planting in Michigan.

Last year 227,000 musky fingerlings were planted in Wisconsin to set an all-time record up to that time. More of the fish are still to come from the pends for stocking in musky waters and the total to come from the ponds for stocking in musky waters and the total plant this year is expected to more than double last year's produc-

The department pointed out that it is simple to produce and stock newly hatched musky fry but that the production of hundreds of thousands of musky fingerlings this year ranging in sizes from two to four inches has been a huge undertaking. Fingerlings necessitate both an extensive feeding program and pond room. Two new musky ponds are in operation at the Spooner state fish hatchery

The muskellunge is king of the inland waters sport fishes and the department points out that Wisconsin's musky fishing is un-rivaled by any other state. Every effort, it said, is being made to hold Wisconsin's musky supremacy.

"Waterfowl populations in northern Canada generally appear to be about the same as last year," Robert H. Smith, flyway biologist for the Fish and Wildlife Service, has advised Director Albert M. Day in a progress report for Northwest Territories on June 7.

In continuing their surveys of the Canadian waterfowl breeding grounds, the observers covered an area of about 22 miles in the Lake Claire marshes of Alberta where they found the population of ducks to be a little more than 50 per square mile. This was a slight increase over last year.

To the north, in the Athabaska delta, the population dropped to only 25 ducks per square mile. Continuing north through the aspen park country, from Ft. Smith to Great Slave Lake, the observers found less than one duck per square mile.

Water levels are high—in some places abnormally so—the same as in the prairies, Mr. Smith reported. Many lakes and sloughs in northern Saskatchewan have water for the first time in several years. The Athabaska delta in northern Alberta is completely flooded.

The Athabaska delta in northern Alberta is completely flooded although the Lake Claire marshes to the west have optimum water levels for duck breeding. "This abnormally high water will affect the waterfowl crop adversely, particularly in the Athabaska delta."


