

The salary schedule as submited for an adjustment of only the minimum salary, increasing it from \$2,300 to \$2,600. It left maximum salaries at the former level, and stated that other salary increases would conform to the schedule previously used.

In presenting the salary request of the teachers, Mr. Bentley pointed out that a straight \$300 increase per teacher plus their regular \$100 schedule increment, which they are asking. would place local teachers on a salary par with 19 other schools in this area.

The reason the artists, music critics, scenario writers and poets of the N. C. of the A. S. and P. don't like war is because they must, of course, do all the fighting. The farm boys, the young laborers, clerks, Wall Streeters, small town youths and college boys, always evade the draft and compel the arts and sciences to do the dying on the battlefields. As a matter of fact, wasn't it the very group which entertained Mr. Shostakovich at the Waldorf which won the last war?

As we look over the list of "American" sponsors for the recent blistering expose of our imperialistic country, we must feel deep shame that these pariots were compelled by the American passion for blood to join the peace lovers of the Kremlin in this brave attempt to make us see the light and give up our craving for slaughter. The advice of these men on any or all fundamental subjects. it would seem, should be followed without question or quibble. They are the "real intelligentsia."

Sometimes the words "intelligentsia" and "ruts" get confused.

1 piat fresh strawberries 13 cup sugar

- 1 baked 9-inch pie shell
- 3 egg whites 6 tablespoons sugar
- 1 teaspoon lemon juice 1 pint vanilla ice cream Hull berries, wash and drain.

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Fair in the Light of Memory Shines



The design selected for the Federal "duck stamp" to be used during the 1949-50 hunting season will feature goldeneye ducks says Albert M. Day, Director, Fish and Wildlife Service. All duck stamps how wild ducks or geese of different species in some characteristic flight phase. The design for the 1949-50 stamp is the work of "Roge" E. Preuss, free lance artist and decoy designer of 3618 First Avenue South, Minneapolis, Minn. The original sketch, a black and white wash drawing, shows a male and female goldeneye winging into a quiet cove to view the courtship antics of two male ducks on the water. Sixteenth in the series, the new migratory bird hunting stamp, generally called "duck stamp", is now on its way to the engravers and will be available to hunters and philatelists at all first- and second-class post offices on July 1. All migratory-waterfowl hunters over 16 years of age are required by law to purchase and have a stamp of current issue duly signed when hunting.

Sold for \$1, the duck stamps provide funds that help finance the Federal Government's wildlife refuge program. Ninety percent of the money realized from the sale of the stamps is used by the Fish and Wildlife Service to supplement other funds for the purchase and maintenance of waterfowl refuges throughout the country. The remaining 10 percent is used for printing and distribution of the stamps, enforcement of the Migratory Bird Hunting Stamp Act, and other Federal activities for migratory bird conservation. During the 1947-48 season 1.722,677 duck stamps were sold, a decrease of 294.142 from the all-time high record sale of 2,016,819 stamps during fiscal

Requests for tree planting stock for the spring season, exceeding 4.630,000 trees so far, have exhausted the Michigan conservation department's stock of both two- and three-year-old red pine. While the department's forestry division has been offering the largest supply of seedlings since the war, it only has about 750,000 two-year-old ack pines left for distribution.

Doc Ace Williams takes exceptions to claims made in this col-umn by Matt Powell last .week that Florida catfish have more horsepower than do Mississippi river catfish. Doctor Williams who was brought up on the end of a fish pole down along the banks of the Mississippi at Vicksburg says a Mississippi catfish has more horse-power than even a Missouri mule, pound for pound. But that's getting into deep water, so it might be well to change the subject.

Although Arizonia is the Nation's leading producer of copper, exceeding that of Michigan, its mines also yield silver, gold, lead, zinc, and practically all major nonmetals, the Bureau of Mines reports. Because industrial diamonds are sensitive to radioactivity, they

Between 1923 and 1946, production of iron ore in southwestern Utah totaled more than 10,139,000 tons, the Bureau of Mines reveals.

New and tastier ways of preparing suckers and carp obtained in the spring runs are explained in colorful leaflets which are available without charge from both the Michigan State College experiment station and the state conservation department. The dipnetting season on these fishes runs from March 1 to May 15 and the spearing season from April 1 to May 15 in the southern peninsula, throughout May in the northern peninsula.

With the recipes tested at the college, more persons are being encouraged to try these food fishes which have long been underrated in the market though appreciated locally.

Conservation officers will advise which local waters are open to dipnetting and spearing.

He was so fired with indignation over this trait of the average man that he dashed off an article about it, dashed it off on the spur of the moment, at white heat. It struck home to thousands and thousands of readers, employers and employees alike.

Readers of his little magazine in which the article appeared sent for extra copies, dozens of them. Charles H. Daniels, general passenger agent of the New York Central railroad at the time, ordered thousands of copies for the employees of the railroad. Twenty years later, the publicity department, recalling the good that article had done, repeated that act.

From Russia came a big order, a copy for every soldier engaged in the war with Japan. Within a few years forty million copies had been printed. This article is called "A Message to Garcia." If you haven't read it, do so at once. No doubt your public library has it.

Now, check your associates. You will find that the man who has enthusiasm is forging ahead. He may not be vociferous, he may be a very quiet type of man; it isn't necessary for enthusiasm to make a noice. But if he hasn't enthusiasm, he will fall into a rut.

Next, check yourself. Do you want to remain all your life just where you are now? It's up to you! Just do good work, do what is expected of you, and you'll probably hold your job as long as you want it. But develop enthusiasm, do more than is expected of you, and the chances are that given time you will 'increase your income, your influence and power. A

There's really so little enthusiasm extant that it gets a lot of appreciation. Now be careful. I don't mean noisy talk. I mean true enthusiasm, a real and true liking for your work.

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

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TB Officials Warn of "Sure Cures"

Everybody knows the amateur dietician who composes reducing menus for her friends, relates just how to "feed", a cold or tells you what food to eat to prevent | 14 Ibsen greying hair. Among the more dangerous "food prescriptions" of such a person is her "sure cure" for serious illnesses. She will tell a tuberculosis patient how to cure his illness by diet with the same assurance as if she were telling a child how to tie his shoelace, a report issued to Plymouth residents asserts.

There is no set diet or any one food item which can "cure" tubereulosis, despite some superstitions and false notions about the diet of tuberculosis patients which still exist, the local release continued.

Once it was believed that the tuberculosis patient should drink as many quarts of milk as he could hold. 
