City Rations Coal Supply *inEmergency*

\$2.00 Per Year In Advance

The city commission declared a state of emergency in Plymouth in view of the serious coal shortage affecting the city. Following the special commission meeting last Monday night immediate action was taken to exercise the commission's emergency powers in order to safeguard the city's health and welfare until the settlement of the coal strike.

The city police were authorized to ration all coal deliveries. Members of the police and fire departments have made a survey of coal supplies in all sections of the city. Over 200 emergency calls have already been received at the city hall and anyone in serious need of coal should contact the police department. They will check the need and fuel will be given for vital services only.

The city has made possible the contracting for 40 tons of coal from the Plymouth Tube comnany. At the time of the meeting Eckles Coal company had 50 to 60 tons available; Roberts Coal company. 20 tons, and the Plymouth Lumber and Coal company, 60 tons. Shipments of coal to the companies were promised but no guarantee of delivery was

An offer was accepted by the city for wood to be taken from the Hough woods south of Ann Arbor trail. The offer was made by Cass Hough, city commissioner, and the commission passed a resolution authorizing the city manager to take charge of the cutting of the wood. The delivery and sale of the wood will be made by the Eckles Coal company and the proceeds less delivery cost will be remitted to the city. It was estimated that the cost of the wood will be about \$10 a cord. If necessary, cutting will begin this weekend.

Starkweather school, the only school in the area burning coal. has less than an eight day supply. 

Down Under The Florida Palm Trees With The Mail's Roving Wolverine



Nothing like a "cold wave" up north—with its snow, sleet and icy highways—to spurt up the Florida tourist business.

What had looked like a rather "off" year for tourists in some parts of Florida, took a decided turn for the better when newspapers reported some real winter weather up north.
While the central part of the state has been

enjoying a better-than-usual season, down along the southern east coast, there has been some complaining up until a couple of weeks ago. Then the rush started—and it has not yet ended. It's beginning to look as though March is going to be a good tourist

month for all parts of the state.

There is much to indicate that the west and east coasts of Florida are having some real competition from the interior of Florida for the tourist business. A trip to the central part of the state indicates that it is enjoying without question the best tourist "crop" it has

George M. Foster, one of Plymouth's well known citizens who much prefers the interior of Florida to coast areas and who thinks Orlando is about the best city in Florida, has sent to "The Roving Wolverine" a clipping from one of Orlando's papers, which tells of this winter's big tourist rush in Orlando. It follows:

Some of Florida's more glamorous resort areas may be bewailing the lack of tourists—especially the heavy-spending variety this season, but not so with Orlando. According to figures released yesterday by A. C. Slaughter, secre-

tary-manager of Greater Orlando Chamber of Commerce, the City Beautiful is enjoying its best crop of visitors in 10 years.

Registration at the C of C information desk indicates that so far at least 16,820 persons have come to Orlando for part of the winter. Last year, as of February 1, the total was about 25 per cent

In January alone 6.504 sun-seekers arrived as compared with 5.076 a year ago. They came from 41 states, England, Sweden and Canada. There were 14 from California, of the total, 726 are visiting

Then why are there some vacancy signs still hanging out at guest homes and motor courts? Because this question is so often neard, the chamber and the Orlando Property Owners Assn. explain

Accommodations have expanded. And the building program in the past year or two around Orlando has far surpassed even a signifi-

cant gain in the number of winter visitors. Then too, they say, a lot of folks who previously stayed for weeks and months in a hotel or tourist home, living in one room, have decided that they can live more cheaply in a small cottage and efficiency apartment where they can cook their own meals

The C of C says that February will undoubtedly be the neaviest tourist month of the season again this year, especially if the weather turns blustery in the North and Midwest. This year, more than ever before, Orlando has scheduled more

entertainment for its visitors and is doing everything to make their

Sunshine Park, popular center for those who like lawn bowling, shuffleboard, roque and other games, was repaired and renovated at a cost of \$10,000 after being taken over by the City Recreation Department. It is now one of the finest recreation spots in the South.

Under the direction of B. H. Overpeck, there are regularly scheduled card parties, dances and variety programs several times a week

plus Sunday afternoon band concerts. At a nominal sum, tourists can go on a tour of Orlando, Winter Park and a large citrus packing and canning plant two mornings

Concert and lecture series, forums, special films and other cultural activities are planned to coincide with the tourist season. Virtually every kind of sport—both spectator and active—is provided in or near Orlando including dog-racing, golf, tennis, harness horse training, boating, swimming, fishing and others.

In a postscript Mr. Foster says that "flowers are blooming every-where and the orange trees are blossoming earlier this year than usuals."

Under the heading "Racket" a writer in The Miami News a few days ago said: "Lessees of Miami Beach ho room rentals from northern tourists, then run out leaving the tenants subject to eviction by the property owners unless they pay room rent a second time are getting more bad publicity for the Beach than news stories of gambling and hoodlums.

A few nights ago Miami Republicans held a Lincolf day ban-quet which was said to be the largest attended Republican affair ever held south of the Mason Dixon line. Nearly a thousand crowded into the Miami convention hall-something unusual for this port

One speaker declared that the "rights" of the people so much talked about in Washington should be termed the "snide rights." Another said there are over 50,000 Republicans in the Miami area who are registered as Democrats. This is done, it was explained, because of the fact up until recently, it wasn't a good thing for any one to openly proclaim himself as a Republican in Cracker Florida. But that is rapidly changing and Republican speakers pointed to the large attendance at the banquet as evidence of the fact that Republicans are again daring to express their beliefs in the open.







Fair in the Light of Memory Shines

As far as known the only copy of the first city directory issued of the city of Flint is now in possession of the New York Historical society at Albany. It was issued in 1872. First directories of Lansing and Port Huron are also owned by the New York Society.

Oregon's Klamath County School system has started a longterm conservation education program to indoctrinate future citizens with ideas concerning the need for the preservation and restoration ing in a few days for a visit with of natural resources, the Wildlife Management Institute reports.

In order to give this program the atmosphere of a game rather than the drudgery of an added classroom assignment and to give additional incentive to participants, contests are being used. For the present year, bird conservation has been chosen as the basis for the annual project. A poster contest, an essay contest, and a feeding and shelter program contest comprise the major divisions of the year's work. To avoid unfair competition between children in upper and lower classes, a division of three groups, each comprising three school grades, has been made. The feeding and shelter contest encourages school boys and girls to get away from purely academic aspects of conservation and puts them in actual contact with wildlife under field conditions. A group of nine qualified speakers is giving lectures at the various schools at regular intervals.

Sponsored by the Conservation Education Section of the Oregon State Division of the Izaak Walton League of America under the chairmanship of Kenneth McLeod, Jr., the program will be continued in future years using a different major subject annually. Mr. McLeod hopes that the more basic resources of soils and water may be handled soon. A lack of trained personnel competent to discuss these subjects prevented their use this year. Full participation of the Klamath County School district has been pledged for the future by Carroll B. Howe, superintendent of schools, and his principals.

This program is an excellent example of what can be accomplished in the field of conservation education at the county school system level. While Virginia, Pennsylvania, and other enlightened states have used similar programs on a statewide basis, few individual school systems have taken the initiative in starting such progressive programs without full encouragement from state agencies. This sort of project, whether at state, county, or local levels is something which deserves and needs the full support of organized sportsmen.

Fluctuating water levels on inland lakes may enlarge or reduce that strip of land along the shoreline, but regardless of its size, it is not a beach area open to the general public in most instances.

The conservation department's lands division, which regularly gets letters conveying a contrary opinion, advises persons confused on the matter to check the deed or the recorded plat of the land in question for possible exceptions. Local county records show plat dedications.

Usually the riparian owners own all the land down to the waters edge on inland lakes, and also a proportionate share of the submerged lake bottom lands fronting the property. Thus, whether above the waterline or below at any one time, it is still the same person's property. In the case of a round-type lake, this submerged share is roughly shaped like a wedge of pie.

The department's lands division points out that the only excepions exist where there are reservations in the landowner's deed or in cases of platted property where the recorded plat shows certain areas such as parks, roads and promenades along the lake which are dedicated to public use. Reservations or restrictions may appear in the chain of title, and in the case of platted property, on the plat.

The same general ruling applies to privately owned land bordering Michigan waters of the Great Lakes except that submerged land is owned by the state of Michigan. That is—the title is held in trust by the state for use and benefit of the public. Again in the case of Great Lakes, there is no public strip of land along the edge unless there is a reservation in the chain of title, or public use dedications are recorded on the plat, in the event the land involved is platted property.

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

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
