## Heighten Mealtime Interest with Stuffed Rib Pork Chops

Experienced cooks know that pork chops may be depended upon for satisfying serving any time. But for a tempting variation, fill plump pork-chops with a savory bread starting.

For the bread stuffing, two cups of toasted bread crumbs are combined with 1/4 cup finely chopped onion and 1 tablespoon of chopped green pepper. The mixture is seasoned with celery salt and combined with 1/2 cup milk and one slightly beaten egg.

Chopped celery may be added to this stuffing if desired. Or for a complete change, pork chops may be filled with a whole kernel corn, cracker crumb and green pepper combination.

Fruits present even more stuffing possibilities. Sliced tart apple may be used alone or combined with prunes. Dried apricots and raisins are equally as appealing with the flavor of pork.

When chops are to be stuffed it is best to choose double thick rib chops. A pocket is made in each chop by cutting from the side along the bone. Cut from this side, the edges hold together, partially closing as the chops cook. A whole kernel corn and cubed ham casserole provides an unusual dish for the homemaker to serve. Pale green lima beans are added to the mixture which is moistened with orange juice. For seasoning, ground clove is sprinkled over it, then a bit of brown sugar. The casserole is placed in a slow oven until the mixture is heated through. Near the end of cooking time crushed corn flakes are placed over the casserole, then it is returned to the oven just long enough to give them a light browning.

## Rolled Lamb Shoulder Makes Jender Roast

Menu planning is a simple matter whenever the homemaker serves a lamb roast. One choice she may make is the rolled lamb shoulder. Since this tender roast is boned, it is especially easy to carve.

For perfection in roasting the rolled shoulder is seasoned with salt and pepper, then placed on a rack in an open roasting pan. No water is added and the pan is left uncovered throughout the entire cooking time. A lamb roast should be cooked in a 300° F. oven. The rolled roast requires from 40 to 45 minutes per pound cooking time.

A roast meat thermometer is of great aid in determining the exact degree of doneness that the homemaker desires. The thermometer is inserted so the bulb is in the center of the roast. It will register 175° F. when cooked medium done and 180° F. when lamb is well done.

Minted pear halves may be used to decorate the serving platter (canned pear halves heated in melted mint jelly). Other menu suggestions include green peas and creamed new potatoes.
