At a recent meeting of a group of local people interested in the affairs of the Plymouth school system, Michael J. Huber and Wallace W. Laury, who are candidates for the School Board; stated some of their views:


- 1. The School Board is responsible to the people.
- 2. The superintendent is responsible to the Board.
- 3. The Board must set the general school policy.
- 4. The public should be welcomed at all Board meetings.
- 5. To keep the public informed about school affairs, all minutes of School Board meetings should be published.
- 6. Elementary class rooms should have no more than one grade.
- 7. There should be no more than thirty pupils in each class.
- 8. In the new building program, first consideration should be given to the completion of the two elementary schools.

At present there are 640 pupils in Central and Mill street schools from Kindergarten through fifth grade. It is estimated that there will be an additional 200 or more Kindergarten children and others during the year. This will make an average of about 30 children per room in the two new elementary schools when completed. The annexation of two districts, which will be voted on Monday, seems questionable at this time.

# This House Was Built **Three Times**

at least the same kind of a house from the same plans was built in Plymouth in three different places . .

# Can You Remember?



Have you ever seen this house before? Well, really you have because up until just a very few years ago three of them all just alike, were located in. three different places here in the city. Today however, only one remains and that has a tag on it for moving or being torn down within the next few months.

This particular picture, taken about the time our bank was founded, is of the former Charles Greenlaw residence which stood next door to the hospital on Main street until it burned a few years ago. It was built by L. H. Bennett, one of our first directors, from plans he had drawn by an architect in Ypsilanti and the house at one time proudly boasted the first gasoline lights ever installed in a home in Plymouth.

It was a most pretentious home for its day with its underground gasoline storage tank in the back yard to fill the hanging lamps throughout the house and its interesting winding circular stairway in the front hall. These two features were firsts for the fast growing village of Plymouth. The house, property and barn were sold to the Greenlaw family for \$2,500.00 many years ago.

Soon after the Bennett house was completed, W. O. Allen, another officer in our bank, was so fascinated by its interior and exterior design that he borrowed the plans and moved on up Main street to complete another exactly the same. This house is the one purchased this last year by the Board of Education and will soon be torn down to make way for a new addition to the high school. It stands today, the only one of the three, directly next to the High School Commercial building.

The third house in this series was the product of Will Scotten of Detroit and nephew of famous old tobacco man Daniel Scotten. On one of his visits to Plymouth he was very much impressed with the village decided he would like to live here. So when he had purchased his property on the point at the corner of Main and Starkweather avenues he decided to borrow the Bennett plans and build a third home exactly like the first two that were already

That home stood until a year ago when it was torn down to make way for the new Hi-Speed gasoline station now under construction on that corner. The last of the three will soon disappear and only this picture will remain to inform future generations of the house that was built three times.


