

ORDINANCE NUMBER 164

An Ordinance to amend Ordinance No. 141, entitled "An Ordinance authorizing the acquisition and construction of additions, extensions and improvements to the water supply system of the City of Plymouth; authorizing and providing for the issuance of self-liquidating revenue bonds for the purpose of defraying the cost thereof under the provisions of Act 94, Public Acts of Michigan, 1933, as amended: Providing for the fixing, collecting, segregation and disposition of the revenues of said water supply system and payment of said bonds out of the revenues thereof; creating a statutory lien on such revenues and providing for other matters relative to said bonds, the water supply system and the revenues therefrom.

THE CITY OF PLYMOUTH ORDAINS:

Section 1. Section 8 "CONNECTION CHARGES" (a) and (b) of Ordinance No. 141, an ordinance entitled "An ordinance authorizing the acquisition and construction of additions, extensions and improvements to the water supply system of the City of Plymouth: authorizing and providing for the issuance of self-liquidating revenue bonds for the purpose of defraying the cost thereof under the Provisions of Act 94, Public Acts of Michigan, 1933, as amended, providing for the fixing, collection, segregation and disposition of the revenues of said water supply system and payment of said bonds out of the revenues thereof; creating a statutory lien on such revenues and providing for other matters relative to said bonds, the water supply system and the revenues therefrom", is hereby amended to read as follows:

Section 8, CONNECTION CHARGES (a) Charges for water service connections to users within the corporate limits of the City of Plymouth shall be Fifty (\$50.00) Dollars for all connections up to and including 34 of an inch. For connections exceeding 34 of an inch in size, the charge shall be including the \$50.00, the actual cost of making such connections, plus

(b) Charges for water service connections to users outside the corporate limits of the City of Plymouth shall be the actual cost of making such connection, plus 15%: PROVIDED. HOWEVER, that said connection charge shall not, in any event, be less than Sixty-five (\$65.00) Dollars.

Section 2. Section 8, with the exception of the aforesaid amendment is to stand without change.

Section 3. This ordinance shall take effect twenty-one (21) days from and after the date of its passage by the City Commission.







ar; cream together. Add egg and blend thoroughly. Sift dry ingredients together and add to first mixture alternately with milk. Fold in raisins and nuts. Place in greased loaf pan: let stand for two minutes. Bake in a moderately slow (325°F.) oven for 1-1/4 hours.

Any material which has acetate present in it should be ironed care fully with a warm iron, which means using a temperature of less than 300 degrees F. Higher temperatures tend to melt or fuse the acetate rayon fibers.

When ironing rayon crepes and jerseys, iron with the grain of the fabric on the wrong side. Do touchup jobs on right side using a pressing cloth.

"In order to save money for the school and the city, we recommend that the city purchase the gravel for the school, supervise its spreading, and assume the grading costs as part of our maintenance operation.

The City committee pointed out that eventually we would have considerable expense for providing a sidewalk on Sutherland street. Ross street will require storm sewer, gravelling and grading for a distance of 300 feet. We also have an investment in the improvement of Sutherland street amounting to about \$3400 of which only \$1300 is assessable. We therefore recommend that the city assume \$25986 as their share of the cost of the new street abutting the Smith

Wins Prize For Writing Letter on U of M Ruling

the Daisy Manufacturing company, was a winner in the recent Free Press letter writing contest. The Free Press had invited readers to submit letters for publication setting forth their opinions on the University of Michigan ruling to not televise football

Of the hundreds of letters the paper received only three approved of the university action and of the 15 letters that were published Mr. Daane's was one of the contest winners. His letter follows. "To the Editor:

"I have strongly protested the ban on TV by the Big Ten since their policy was announced last January, even to the point of discussing it with one member of the Board of Regents for the University of Michigan.

"Many people, now elderly, some of whom are hard of hearing or find it hard to get around as they formerly did, made possible the construction of the stadiums through the purchase of stadium bonds.

"In return for their investment they were to get nominal interest and a preference in seats at football games. This was fine for a while, but, when capacity crowds provided a cash surplus, the bonds were retired and the investor lost the nominal income as well as the seating preference. It should be mentioned that the bonds were actually not callable at the time but a very tactful and appealing letter was sent the bondholder by Mr. H. O. Crisler and the bondholder surrendered:

"Now these same people who made the stadium and the gate receipts possible are being denied the right to see the games on their own TV sets. It would appear that Mr. Crisler was willing to co-operate when he needed funds, but now that the shoe is on the other foot, it is apparent that he cares little for the former bondholder or for the taxpayer or for the goodwill and public service that telecasting of games would generate.

"As taxpayers the people of this State are entitled to watch the games played by the team supported with their tax dollars.






